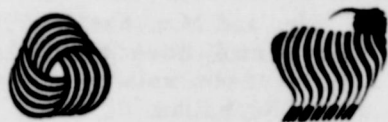

These two symbols on materials indicate that they are made of wool or mohair.

Recently the mohair producers adopted an advertising program aimed at increasing the desirability of mohair products over synthetics. The same type of program has been underway now by the wool producers for several months.

Lots of people do not stop to realize the value of the wool and mohair industry to this nation and to this part of the state. Lots of people do not stop to realize the value of wool and mohair over other materials in so many of the cloths that are used today, from carpeting up.

When you are about to buy a garment or a piece of material from the carpet up, think of the possibility of buying wool or mohair, whichever is best suited for that particular need. It is probably your best buy.

In a conversation we had last week, it was also brought out that there was a need for the expenditure of some money in advertising the goodness of goat meat to the nation. This program has been done with lamb and there are some results from it.

No one is trying to steal the thunder of the beef producers. Their product is about as good to eat, when it is good meat and fixed properly, as anything you can put on a plate. But a variety of meats is good, and a need exists for a place to sell more lambs and kids for good eating.

There has been some more vandalism locally that is causing some concern.

Hoses cut from gas pumps, butane trucks rolled away from their parking places, sacks of beer cans and bottles - usually broken - dumped on the streets or in yards, changing of outdoor signs to make vulgar phrases, all adds up to nothing good.

A large swastika has graced the highway east of Sanderson at the second bridge for some time now, and new paintings crop up here and there, showing that the energy of someone is not being used in a constructive way at all.

Outside of the fact that such actions cause an unsightliness, or are destructive in nature, or are costly, there is an element of danger involved that lots of people do not consider, and that is the danger of getting hurt or causing someone else to get hurt if and when someone may be caught in one of those acts.

And besides, it's against the law!

Any excuse that one may give for doing such things, other than malicious, willful, vandalism or destruction or defacing of public or private property, is incorrect.

All of the citizenry should be alert to this vandalism and try to stop it.

## Deer Season Set For Trans-Pecos; Limits Raised

Deer season in the Trans-Pecos was set for November 25 to December 10, according to information received recently.

The opening day is a Saturday and the closing day is on a Sunday, making the season extending over three weekends.

Included in the season setting was an increase in the limit from three to four animals, details of which are not clear at this time.

Deer season east of the Pecos River will be mostly from November 11 to January 1, with some exceptions.

The white-wing dove season will be from 1:00 p. m. to sunset on September 2, 3, 9, and 10 with the bag limit 12 and possession limit 24 in 21 counties, including Terrell County.

Congressman Richard C. White has announced the authorization by the Department of Agriculture for planning assistance on the Sanderson Canyon Watershed Project. The Soil Conservation Service is now authorized to assist local organizations in preparing a watershed work plan under the authority of the Watershed protection and Flood Prevention Act.

## TSG&GRA Meeting To Feature Mohair Marketing Expert

A South African mohair expert will attend the 52nd annual convention of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association in San Angelo July 24-26. He will tell Texas growers what South African producers did to lift their mohair out of the doldrums and make it the highest-selling in the world. Texas mohair has been moving sluggishly the last couple of years, dealing a severe blow to the agricultural economy in areas where Angora goat production is particularly important.

The speaker will be Dr. C. C. Kritzing, manager of the Mohair Advisory Board in South Africa. He came to Texas once before, in 1964, to study the Texas mohair situation.

American mohair growers -- 97 per cent of them in Texas -- recently approved a deduction of 1 1/2¢ a pound from mohair incentive payments to finance a mohair promotion and product development program which could rejuvenate the industry. Now they are trying to decide how this money might be best spent. Dr. Kritzing's experience with a similar situation in South Africa is expected to get strong attention.

Under this Act, the Department of Agriculture can give technical and financial assistance to organized groups of ranchers living in small watersheds where floods, drought, and soil erosion are causing serious damage. In addition to the requirement of sponsorship by a local organization, each application for watershed assistance must be approved by a designated state agency before such assistance can be provided. The application has been approved by the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

The three-county project to be located in Terrell, Pecos, and Brewster Counties involves an estimated 135,040 acres. It is sponsored by local organizations including the Terrell County Commissioners, Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil and Water Conservation District, Big Bend Soil and Water Conservation District, Pecos County Commissioners Court, Brewster County Commissioners Court, and Trans-Pecos Soil and Water Conservation District.
