

Well, Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith told a Friona audience some two weeks ago that trouble might be brewing concerning the state's need to re-district for congressional purposes. Just about a week after he hinted at it, the pot pretty well boiled over.

It was stated by the lieutenant governor that the reapportionment issue might be one reason for a possible special session by the Texas legislature. Last week's decision by a federal district court bore him out.

The court ruled that the present congressional districting law favors rural voters and discriminates against urban voters. (It is law that the state should re-draw congressional district lines after each federal census, but this was not done at the last session).

In his speech here, Smith told of the redistricting suit which was pending, and predicted that the court would rule as it did. Smith pointed out that the present law provides for no more than one representative for each county. Under this set-up, such counties as Dallas, which has a population of some 950,000, comprises a district, while other districts in the state have as few as one-fourth this number of residents.

Should re-districting be accomplished as the federal district court would have it, such urban areas stand to gain representatives, while such areas as our own might lose. Counties such as Dallas and Harris (Houston), for example, might get three or four representatives, while rural districts would have to be spread out even more than they are now.

At the present time, Parmer County is a member of the 18th Congressional district, which comprises 28 Panhandle counties, joining Parmer in the district are Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Potter, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Donley, Collingsworth, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Hall, Childress, Motley and Cottle counties.

Texas gained a representative because of the 1960 census, and since the legislature did not redistrict, candidates for the extra position had to campaign throughout the state for the "at large" seat.

Hints from the ruling last Saturday were that all 23 congressmen might have to campaign as "at large" representatives, which would make for mass confusion, to say the least. As of this writing, Governor John Connally plans to appeal the ruling, in an attempt to stall off a special session. It will be interesting to see what develops. One thing for sure, Parmer County's future political alignment rests in the balance.

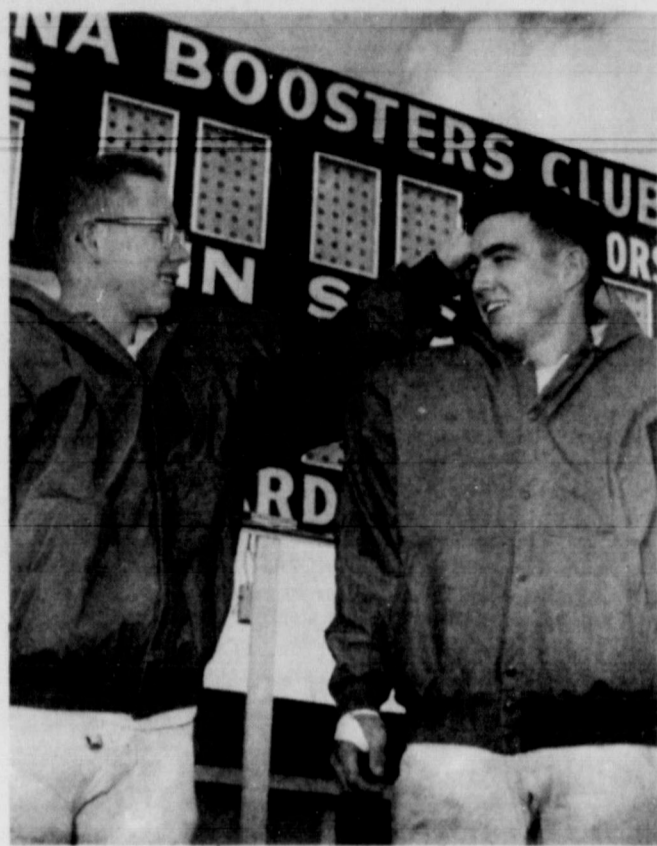

DISTRICT OPENER

Chiefs Seek To End More Streaks At Dimmitt Friday

The Friona Chiefs, who have reversed a losing trend at Friona in football this season, have their sights set on snapping a couple of other streaks Friday night by adding a very "rare" win to their collection.

The Chiefs travel to Dimmitt for their opening game in District 3-AA action. Here are some of the streaks Friona will be out to reverse in Friday's game:

--A 16-game losing streak in district play, dating back to 1959. The Chiefs have not won a district game since they upset Dalhart, 13-6 in the last game of 1959. This is their only conference win as a class AA team.

--A long losing streak to Dimmitt. The Chiefs have not beaten the Bobcats since 1945. Although the two teams have not met every year in the period, Friona has not been able to win a

game. The losing streak now stands at 13 games. In addition, Friona will be attempting to add to their own

streak, which currently stands at six consecutive wins for the 1963 season. The Chiefs with one more win will equal

the best season since 1952, when the team had a 7-2 final record.

Dimmitt won the game here last year, 48-6 at Friona's homecoming celebration. The Bobcats do not have nearly as impressive a record this year as last. They have won two games while losing five -- but their opposition has been pretty good.

Wins were 24-18 over Lockney and 8-2 over Floydada. Losses have been to Canyon (14-8), Hereford 26-14, Dalhart (44-0), Tulia (33-0) and Olton (13-0).

"Dimmitt, without a doubt, is the toughest team we have played this year," Coach Don Light told the Friona Booster Club Monday night.

"Their record is not too impressive, but they have played a pretty tough schedule," he said.

Light indicated that he felt Friona had better overall speed than the Bobcats, but that Dim-

mitt had the size to contain the Chiefs.

"They are capable of controlling the football. Their tough slot-back, Jim Aldridge, has been injured, but will probably be in better shape this week than he has for some time," Light continued.

The Friona Coach indicated that the team was going to Dimmitt with every intention of winning. "It is going to require a fine effort on our kids' part. It won't be easy," he said. Light said the squad had two good workouts Monday and Tuesday, especially Monday, and seemed to be fired up and ready for the district opener.

Coach Don Light encouraged as many fans who would like to attend the school pep rally at 2:45 p.m. Friday at the auditorium. A special section will be provided for townspeople who will attend the pep rally.

Students Plan Candy Drives

The Friona High School Student-Faculty Congress is once again sponsoring a candy sale and trick or treat event for Halloween. It was announced this week.

Upon recommendation of the Foreign Exchange Student Committee, the S-F-C will sponsor a candy sale Monday night between the hours of 6 and 8 p.m. Net proceeds from the sale will go to the Foreign Exchange Student fund.

The candy to be sold will be individually wrapped "Brach" candy, sacked in one and two-pound bags. It will be sold at 50 cents per pound.

Some 25 members of the Student Council will choose a team to work the town.

The council also sponsors the annual trick-or-treat special drive on Halloween Night, in which grade school rooms compete in a drive to collect candy, which is sent to the State Hospital for Epileptics in Abilene.

A contest will be arranged in the first eight grades, whereby the rooms collecting the most candy will receive cash prizes.

"We hope the community will again cooperate with us on the drives. They are for good causes," commented Raymond Cook, high school principal.

Top Grades Set Parent Nights

"Back to School" nights for parents of students in grades seven through 12 will be held Monday and Tuesday nights in Friona schools. Parents will have an opportunity to return to the classroom for a night, and go through the schedules their children follow each day.

Seventh and eighth grade parents will be guests on Monday night, while high school parents will "come to school" on Tuesday night. Both programs will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Principals Raymond Cook and Tom Jarboe state that the main reasons for the program are (1) to give parents an opportunity to meet those who teach their

children and (2) to acquaint them with a general outline as to what will be taught in each class.

About 20 minutes will be allotted to each "class" period. This type of program was conducted in high school during Public Schools Week last year, and also has been carried out successfully in the lower grades this year.

"Those who attended the program in high school last year said they enjoyed it. Also, the turnout for the programs in the lower grades has been good. We only hope that the enthusiasm hasn't run out by the time the parents get to the upper grades," Cook stated.

Three Pick 10 Correct Games

For the first time in the 1963 Cotton Bowl Football contest, someone correctly picked 10 games, and when it happened, three people did it the same week.

Kenneth Watkins, his wife Thelma, and C. H. Veazey all correctly picked the 10 games in last week's contest, and placed first, second and third according to their tie-breaker scores.

Watkins was judged first place, missing the Farwell-Kress tie-breaker by just three points. Actual score of the game was 42-0, in favor of Farwell. Watkins guessed it at 45-0. Mrs. Watkins was second. She missed the tie-breaker by 24 points, picking it Farwell 30, Kress 12. Veazey had to settle for third, missing by 28 points. His guess was 28-14.

Contestants had much better results on the average in last week's contest. Besides the three with 10 correct, 11 contestants got nine right, and several picked as many as eight. "The experts must be getting better," commented John Getz, contest manager.

With four weeks remaining in the contest for two tickets to the Cotton Bowl Game in Dallas January 1, Watkins, on the basis of his good week last week, has forged into the lead with a score of 53 for the season.

Three contestants are three games off the pace with 50 correct. They are Clarence Monroe, Jimmy Maynard and Dennis Howell.

Mrs. Jack Clark and C. H. Veazey are next with a score of 49. Four are tied at 48. They are Karen Agee, Martell LeVeque, Thelma Watkins and Waymon Wilkins.

Over 160 contestants have entered the contest so far. It is sponsored by eleven Friona merchants.

Fund Drive Hits \$10,000

About \$10,000 has been collected for the Parmer County Community Hospital building fund, according to Charles Allen, drive chairman.

Allen this week urged team captains and drive members to press toward their goals of \$5,000 per team.

Farmers who have a portion of their crops out should be able to tell how much they can give to the drive, and it is hoped that the harvest will not be used as an excuse to put off giving, since work needs to be started on the hospital at the earliest possible time.

West Texas Cattle Tour Stops In Friona Tues.

From 150 to 200 persons interested in the cattle industry are to visit in Friona and Parmer County next Tuesday, on a livestock feeding tour which will

cover the Lubbock-Clovis-Amarillo triangle.

Men from various parts of the nation, representing industry as well as agriculture are expected to be among those on the tour. Sponsor is the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The tour will originate in Lubbock on Monday. While there, the group will tour Lewter's Feed Lot, the largest

in the area. Enroute to Clovis, the group will see feeding installations at Littlefield, Sudan and Muleshoe. It will spend the night at Clovis Monday.

The delegation is expected to arrive at Friona Feed Yard, Inc. about 10:15 a.m. Tuesday. A stop is also scheduled at the Anthony Feed Lot north of town, as the bus caravan heads for Hereford for a lunch break at 1 p.m.

Frior to coming to Friona, the buses will make their first stop of the day at Farwell Feed Lots and Castor Feed Lots south of Farwell.

The delegation will spend Tuesday night in Amarillo, and on Wednesday head southward to Lubbock, visiting feed lots on the way, including lots at Tulia and Plainview.

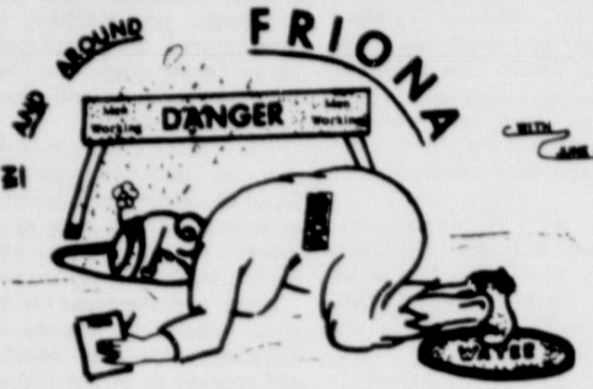

A lot of people younger than Grandmother Parker would never think of using the mode of transportation she generally uses. She doesn't get out a lot, but when she wants to go to the post office or the hospital, she walks even though members of her family object.

Much of her childhood was spent on a ranch near Jalisco, New Mexico and there she learned to love the outdoors, to ride horseback with a side saddle and to be self-reliant.

Riding a conventional saddle is something I can understand, but a side saddle has always been a mystery to me. During an interview with Mrs. Parker, I asked how a person managed to stay in the saddle—on it would probably have been a better way to have expressed it.

With a twinkle in her eyes, Mrs. Parker replied, "I didn't always stay on the horse. One time I was riding a mare and leading a young horse when the wind blew something by and scared my mount. She began to run and I turned the young horse loose hoping to be able to control the mare. Before she stopped, she threw me off between the rails of a railroad track."

Perhaps a brisk walk of ten or fifteen blocks seems like a small accomplishment to a person who has had the experience of trying to ride a run away horse in a side saddle.

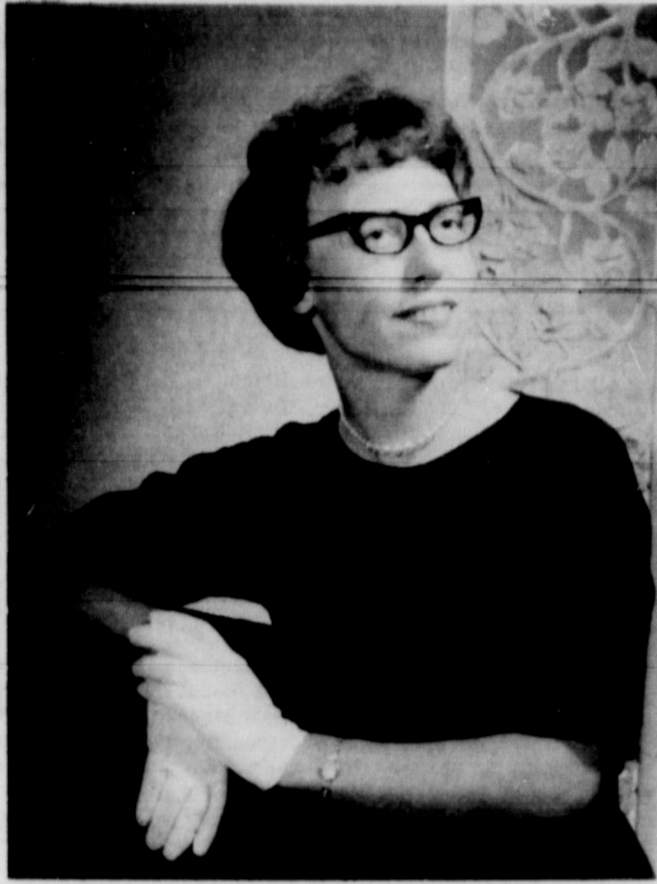

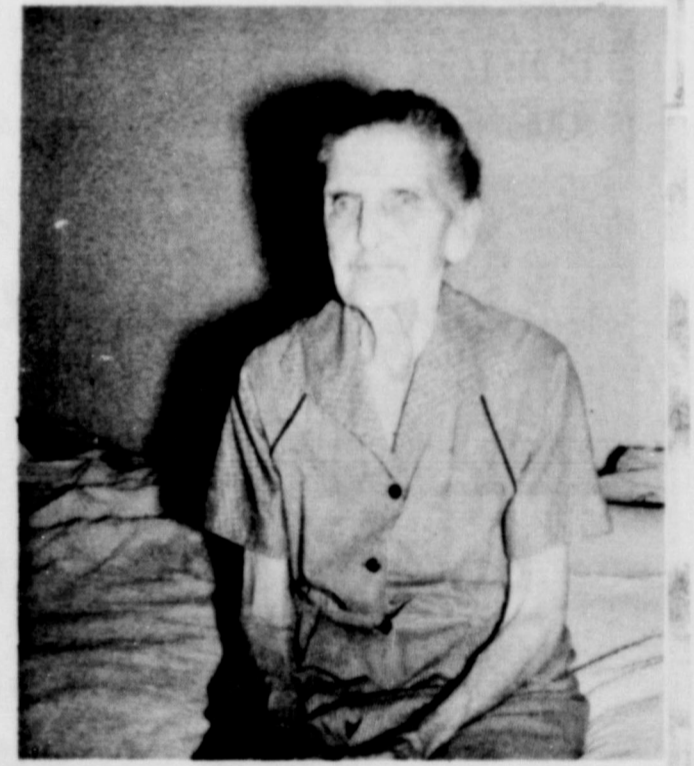
Mrs. Parker Has Birthday

Pheasants Need Cover, County Agent Says

County Agent Deryl Coker this week encouraged farmers, especially those who had turned pheasants loose on their farms, to leave some stubble during the harvest operations for the birds to use for winter cover. "Farmers should leave some stubble and other cover, for the birds to protect themselves from wind and moisture during the winter," Coker said. "If everyone takes care of the wildlife, then we can build up some game in the county," he added. The county agent pointed out that this winter is a critical one, and a good start is necessary. He pointed out that he had seen several of the pheasants, some with young birds, so it appeared that they will multiply in the county. Coker reminded persons who purchased birds who still have the crates to return them to him or one of the committee members, so they can be returned to the game farm from where they came. Also, he added, he urged farmers to watch out for snipers, and get a tag number if possible. "It's against the law for anyone to shoot the pheasants," Coker reminded.

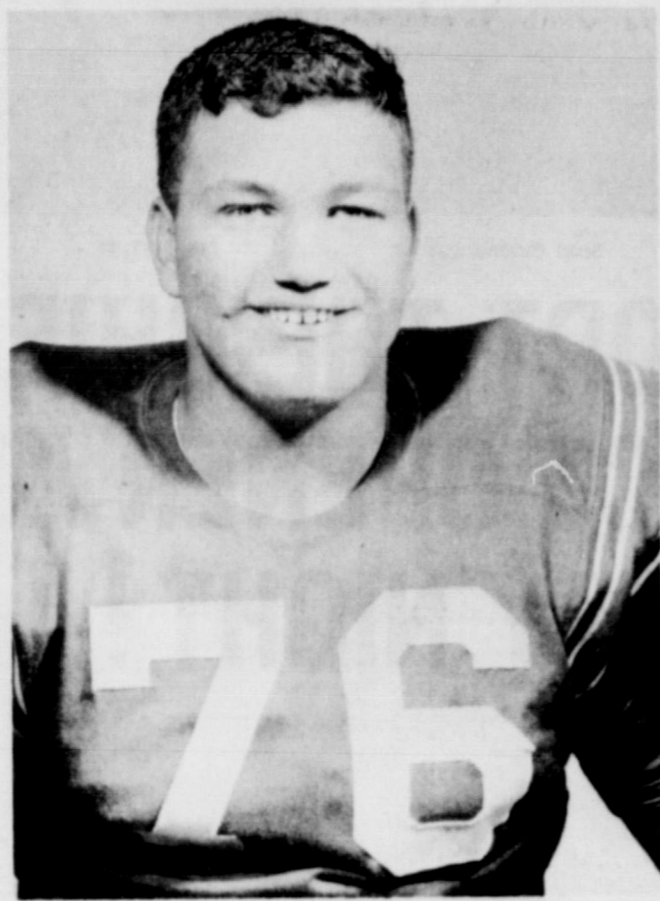

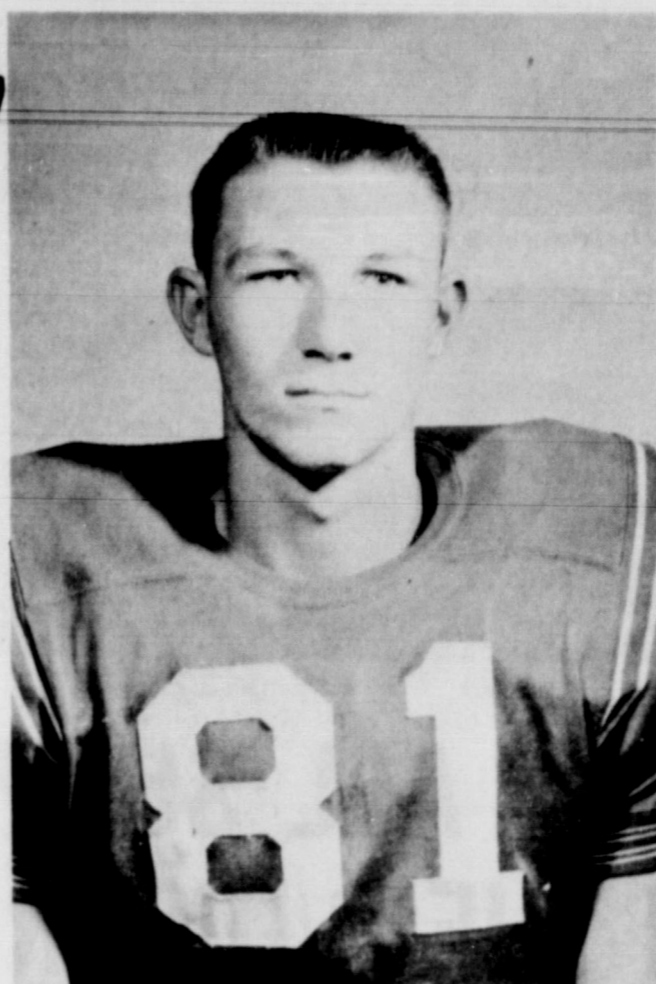

NON-DISTRICT STATISTICS

Chieftains Hold Wide Lead Over Opponents

The Friona Chieftains hold a wide statistical edge over their non-conference rivals, as would be expected from their 6-0 record going into district play.

The Chiefs have racked up 100 first downs, an average of 16.6 per game, to 48 for their opponents, or eight per game. The home team has gained 1895 yards on the ground, an average of 316 per game, to 617 for the opposition, which has averaged 103 yards per game.

Passing, the opponents hold a slight yardage edge over the Chieftains, who haven't had to resort to passing to any great extent in games so far. Opponents have outgained Friona, 288-265 through the air, or 48 to 44 average yards per game.

In total offense, though, Friona has amassed 2,160 yards, an average of 360 per game, to 905, a 151-yard average.

Friona has had to punt just nine times, and averaged 38.2 yards per kick. Opponents have had to kick three times as often, 27, and have booted the ball 951 yards, an average of 35.2 yards.

Most first downs this season (23) were racked up against Bovina, in which game the team also had its high yards rushing (Continued on Page 4)

FOR NON-DISTRICT GAMES

Four Players Share Lead In FHS Football Statistics

Four different players lead the individual statistical departments for the Friona Chieftains in non-district play, according to statistics compiled by the Friona Star.

The four are Milton Hargus, who is the yards rushing leader, Gary Renner, passing leader, Everett Gee, scoring pacesetter, and S. D. Baize, top pass-catcher.

Hargus, who has been tops in the yards gained rushing department all year thanks mainly

to his long touchdown bursts against Farwell and Sudan, saw his average yards-per-carry fall below ten for the first time after the Bovina game, but he still has a healthy 9.0-yard average with 560 yards gained on 62 carries.

Gee is second in the rushing department, with 524 yards picked up on 78 tries, a 6.7-yard-per-carry average. Doug Dodd is third with 311 yards and a 5.9 average.

Renner has completed 40.7

per cent of his passing attempts, clicking on 11 of 27 tries, for 265 yards through the air. Included are four passes for touchdowns.

Gee is narrowly the leader in a balanced four-way scoring race on the team. The Chief fullback has 38 points, Hargus and Renner have 36 and Dodd has 34 points, 16 of his coming on extra points.

Baize is the leading pass receiver on the team with six catches good for 203 yards, an

average of 33.8 yards per catch, including two touchdowns. Gee is also the punting specialist on the team this year, with eight kicks for 301 yards, an average of 37.6 yards per kick. He has two 56-yard punts to his credit, one against Happy, and another against Bovina.

Longest run from scrimmage has been 92 yards, accomplished by Muleshoe, 6-0 here Tuesday.

Seventh Grade Extends Streak

Friona's seventh grade football team remained unbeaten during the past week, with two wins, beating Morton, 13-0, last Thursday, and whipping Muleshoe, 6-0 here Tuesday.

Mike Dukes, quarterback, scored for Friona on a keeper in the second quarter for Friona. In the fourth quarter, with Johnny Barker quarterbacking, he plunged across for a touchdown. Sahara Gonzales booted the extra point following the final TD.

Against Muleshoe Tuesday, Dukes scored again on the option play from five yards out for the only tally of the game.

Lazbuddie had a 14-6 lead in the first half, it was tied 14-all at halftime. Score at one point was 22-22 in the latter stages of the game.

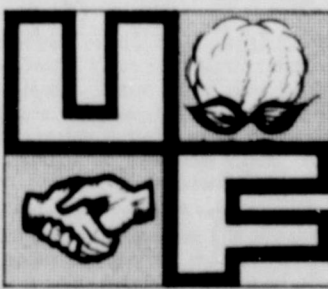

total (412) and total offense (451). Lowest first down and rushing count came against Plains, with 10 and 98 yards respectively.

Bovina and Happy have the fewest first downs against Friona in non-district play, six, while Farwell and Plains have the most, 11. Bovina was held to the lowest rushing total, 31 yards, and Plains gained the most, 154.

Friona's biggest passing total was 95 yards against Memphis. Lowest was no yards against Farwell, although one pass was completed for no net gain. Sudan gained the most yards passing against the Chiefs so far, 107 yards, while Plains had the least passing yardage, none.

The Chieftains' largest total offense (rushing plus passing) game, as stated, was against Bovina, when 451 yards were gained. Their lowest game was at Plains, when a total of 229 yards were racked up.

County rivals hold two distinctions on the defensive total offense department. Although the Farwell Steers had the bitter experience of being the team Friona snapped its 27-game losing streak against, the Steers salvaged a little "face" by racking up the most total yards of any non-district opponent, 211. On the other hand, Bo-

vina, the other county neighbor met this season, had the least success against the Chiefs, with only 53 yards gained rushing and passing in their game here.

Friona has rolled up 180 points on 27 touchdowns and 18 points by conversions, averaging 30 points per game. Prior to last week's games, the Chiefs were the highest-scoring class AA team on the Texas South Plains, according to figures compiled by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

Chieftain opponents have been held to ten touchdowns and 68 points, an average of 11.3 points per game. Friona's scoring has been fairly balanced throughout the game on the average, although their 20-point outburst in the final period against Bovina made that quarter the most prolific, with 53 of their points coming in last-quarter play.

The Chieftains have been stingy in the last half of their games. They have yet to be scored upon in the third quarter in a game this year, and have given up just 19 points in last-half play this year.
