Word was received from the office of U. S. Representative Richard C. White last Wednesday that Terrell County had been placed in an emergency feed loan status.

Ranchmen in Terrell County, along with those in 45 other Texas counties, are eligible for 3% loan on feed for livestock purposes. The loans are available from the FHA for eligible ranchmen, according to Conroy Bryson, representative of Cong. White.

It was stated that due to the drought, hail, and heat in Terrell County, the emergency status was declared.

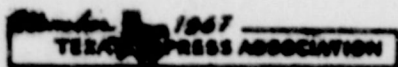
