If we had the money, getting a dam built would be a small problem, but controlling water in that quantity would be something else.

We are happy to see them here and hope their stay here is as pleasant for them as it is fruitful for us!

Sanderson residents were much concerned over the welfare of Tommy Hodgkins since his accident last Saturday morning and we are glad to hear that he is doing as well as the reports indicate.

We are glad that his injury was no more serious.

Some progress is being seen in the plans for the new junior high school building, although they are not complete by any means. The building is getting a lot of going-over by those who are responsible for its construction with the full redization that changes now are the least expensive.

As soon as the board and adminstration settle on some definite plans we will let you know.

Some erroneous or faulty information has been given concerning the proposed building and it is hoped that this will not be confusing to the interested school patrons when a definite plan is worked out.

Consideration is being given to the use of the house on the ground acquired by the school, the one on the east end of the block, for an administration building, which would make a few changes in the proposed new building necessary, other considerations are room arrangement and use in the octagon-shaped building.

Sheriff, Ranger Rewarded By Postal Department

Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey and Texas Ranger Alfred Y. Allee Jr. were rewarded by Postal Inspection Service for their efforts in apprehending a man who had robbed a post office and once seriously wounded Cooksey.

Each was presented a check for \$200 by Lester Biggers, postal inspector from San Antonio. The presentation was made last week at the regular meeting of the Sanderson Rotary Club.

The reward was for the capture of Alfredo Amador Hemandez, the "cave man", who had been accused of robbing the Pumpville postoffice and shot P. R. Bradford in the leg at the time. Bradford was the postmaster at Pumpville.

Hernandez was apprehended in Dryden in August of last year and is currently serving a 99year sentence for armed robbery.

Seven men arrived in Sanderson Sunday evening to begin work on the planning of sites for the construction of waterflood control structures on Sanderson and 3-Mile Canyons above Sanderson.

Philip B. Grazier, acting watershed work plan staff leader, of San Marcos; Charles D. Clarke, geologist; Joe B. Camp, civil engineer; Allan B. Colwick, hydraulic engineer; Robert Rubel, economist; Terry Reynolds, and John W. Hart, cartographic technicians, all of Fort Worth, are currently working on the project.

A preliminary site for twelve structures on both watersheds above Sanderson have been established and on-site survey and coordinated aerial photographs will determine feasibility and possibility of each site. A study to determine distances and elevation of the entire watershed



Airplane Prop Injures Youth Saturday Morning

Tommy Hodgkins, 20-yearold son of Ray Hodgkins, narrowly escaped death or serious injury when he was hit in the back by an airplane propeller about 4:00 a.m. Saturday on the Jack Deaton ranch just west of Sanderson.

According to a story related by Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, Hodgkins and Don Deaton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Deaton, were in an airplane belonging to the Diego Ranch Enterprise of Mexico and piloted to Sanderson by Jimmy Merritt of Ciudad Acuna. They saw headlights approaching the landing strip and when Hodgkins jumped from the airplane he was somehow hit in the back by the

Hodgkins was brought to Sanderson where Dr. J. M. Flowers attended him and he accompanied the ambulance, driven by Cooksey, to San Antonio where Hodgkins received surgery.

The latest report is that the young man is recovering satisfactorily from the surgery.

It is reported that the propeller barely missed the spine, but cut some ribs and muscle and nerve damage resulted.

ASC Balloting Due By Sept. 20


