LISTEN TO LUKE

The end - or a phase of it - of the dream of many local citizens was realized this week in the opening of the Trans-Terrell Medical Center and the use of it by Dr. Jeff Flowers.

This entire project took a lot of work, a lot of thinking, and a lot of cooperation on the part of those who made it possible. From the giver of the least, to the doer of the most, it was an exemplification of what can be done with people working together for a common good.

We now have a facility and a doctor, both of which are able to adequately take care of all but very unusual medical needs, and it is hoped that the people will realize the worth of the two to the area. Isn't this what we were working so hard to get?

One of the great movements going on now, in our opinion, is the "Up With People" group that is traveling over the country. The group is primarily composed of young people who are interested in what many people think are some of the basic needs of this country --- more patriotism to the "Americanism" heritage in a strict interpretation of the term, an opposition to the off-beat movements that have developed over the nation since their approach to all things is more to the negative side, and the idea that joyful songs is a means of promoting some closer relationships between people.

Another means of accomplishing this would be for local participation in about the same thing - a community choir. The group has gotten together for the Thanksgiving and Christmas programs for the community religious observance of these occasions, and it has been a pleasure for those who were singing together, not so much for their own pleasure, but for the fact of the observance of the two seasons. There has been quite a bit of interest on the part of the public to attend the two services, but a public participation of such things could be, and in our opinion should be, much stronger.

An example of this is the Veterans' Day observance Saturday morning at the corner of the courthouse block where the War Mothers' Memorial and flag pole are. This occasion was not advertised, except by word of mouth, which could attest for the small attendance, but a lack of interest probably could also account for some of the sparse crowd.

We would wager that if "As The World Turns" was going to be on Saturday afternoon and it was made known Saturday morning that Lisa was going to tell her secret to Dr. Shay that the news would be all over town in 10 minutes at the outside. The reason, probably being that some of the stories on television - especially those with a "tinge" of "acceptable hankie-pankie", are a little more interesting than a veterans' memorial service.

The bear pictured above was taken in a trap by Clyde Smith, according to information available to The Times. Smith, who ranches on the Rio Grande just west of Terrell County, had his traps set for large predators and the bear took the bait, according to the story. Medical Center Open House Slated For December 10

Open house for the Trans-Terrell Medical Center is set for Sunday, December 10, according to an announcement by Sig Harkins, president of the board of directors of the executive committee of the organization, and Dr. Jeff M. Flowers.

The date was set to allow the installation of equipment that has been ordered, and to notify all who may have an interest in viewing the facility.

At the meeting of the Commissioners Court Monday of this week, that group authorized the purchase of X-ray equipment, equipment for administering anesthetics, and other equipment for obstetrics, surgery, and emergency work.

The completion of black-topping of the parking area will be delayed until spring, but the work of grading and installing a base on the area has been completed.

A curb and walk is being installed in front of the building and Dr. Flowers stated that it was his idea to slant the walk so that in his old age he would be able to get into his office.

Moving of the equipment and furnishings of Dr. Flowers was completed Sunday, the installation of telephones and complete occupancy of the building by Dr. Flowers was effected on Monday.

The doctor stated that he was very proud of the building and hoped to be able to serve all of the people of the area in his role as general practitioner.

Wildcat Staked On ACC Ranch

Humble Oil & Refining Co. has staked location for a wildcat 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of section 13 in Block 128, T&St. L Survey in Terrell County. Location is on the Abilene Christian College land, the ranch formerly owned by Bill Edwards. The well will be about 28 miles northeast of Sanderson and is 10 miles east of the Grey Ranch (Ellenburg, Devonian, and Wolfcamp) gas field.

It will be known as the No. 1 Abilene Christian College. The hole is scheduled for a 18,000-foot depth.

School Bonds Sale Approved By Board

At a special meeting of the school board Monday evening, approval was given for the sale of \$375,000 of the school bonds to R. K. Dunbar and Co. and Columbian Securities Corporation of Texas at the average rate of 4.51 per cent.

The sale of the bonds now permits the asking of bids on the construction of the new junior high school building. As soon as the architect completes the plans and specifications for the building, the request for bids will be sought, according to Ken McAllister, superintendent.

The tentative date for the asking of bids is about the middle of January.
