New Ambulance Put In Service Here This Week

The new ambulance for Terrell County is expected to be put into service this week, according to an announcement by the committee, Judge R.S. Wilkinson, Troy Druse, and Herbert Brown.

The 1968 model Buick, the same body style as the previous one, a 1964 model, has been undergoing some modifications and the installation of equipment by Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg for the past several days.

The new vehicle was ordered by the commissioners court several weeks ago, on the advice of the committee, to try to insure the maximum safety and dependability of transporting Concer Drive Here sick or injured patients to a hospital. The only difference between the old and the new vehicle - other than the year model - is that the new ambulance has an automatic transmission. The vehicle, purchased by. the Terrell County Commissioners Court, is under the supervision of the ambulance committee for maintenance and repairs, billing for services, etc. The drivers for the ambulance are volunteers and are Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, Deputy Hogg, Druse, Darwin Schrader, and L. E. Muller.

A. Escamilla Dies At Work Tuesday **Morning Early**

Funeral services were held on Thursday for Alejandro "Hondo" Escamilla, 60, at the St. James Catholic Church With Rev. Dau Dierschke officiating. The body was taken to Monahans for interment.

Escamilla, who was a machinist's helper, died suddenly on the job just west of the SP Depot Tuesday morning about 8:00 o'clock, apparently from a heart attack.

844 Voters In **Terrell County** Are Registered

There are 844 registered voters in Terrell County, according to Mrs. Tol Murrah, deputy tax assessor-collector.

This is lower than in 1966, according to Mrs. Murrah, and there are very few eligible voters in the county who are not registered, she concluded.

This is the first year for a registration of all eligible voters in the state as a prerequisite for voting, and the first time that the number of eligible voters could be known, since registering by person over 65 was not required in the past in smaller counties.





The jcakets will be of black leather with a black "S" edged with orange trim. Each senior this year will have four stripes inscribed on the "S" representing four high school years in the band.





At the stock show in El Paso the fine wool champion lamb shown by Mark Wheelis of Marfa was bred by N. W. Carroll.


Last week a Dorset-cross lamb winning 27th place out of 200 at San Antonio was also bred by Carroll.


