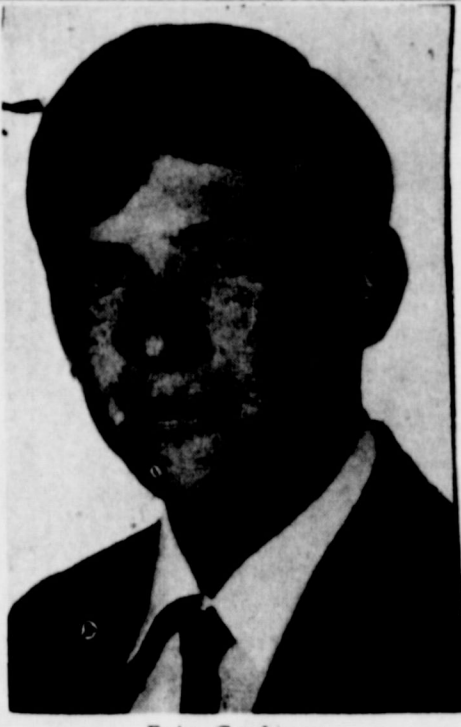

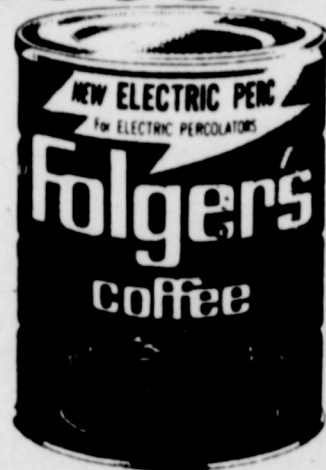

The weather has been moderate for this time of the year.

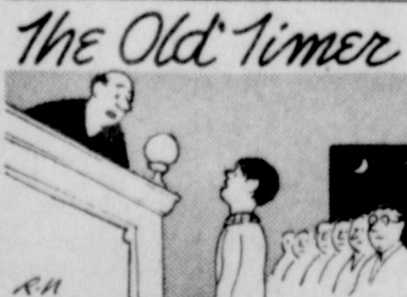
