This year is the 144th anniversary of the founding of the public school system in Texas and this gives cause for us to reflect upon the heritage of our educational system and what it means or can mean to

Time has brought about many changes in our educational system, the same as it has brought about many changes in other phases of our lives.

We are not wanting to hark back to the old days of the small school and unification of classes within the same building, the limited instructions available, and the limited facilities, but there were some things about the "little red schoolhouse" of our days that are worth remembering, even if time has seen fit to cancel them out of existence.

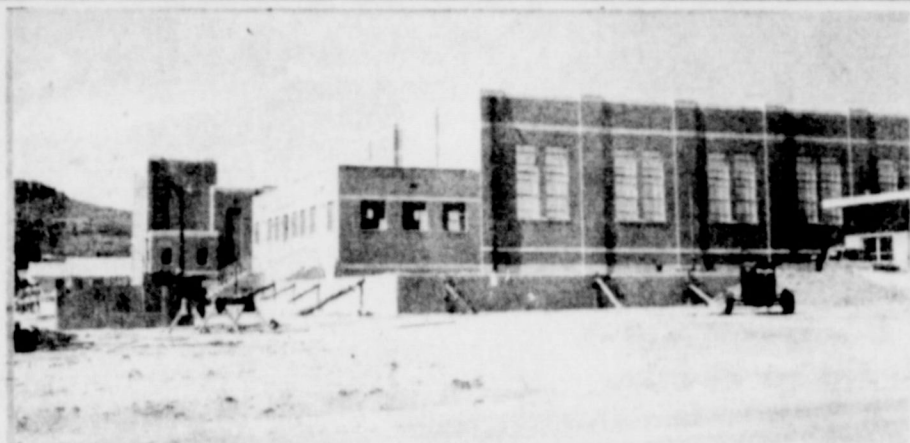
There was a time when the school held a certain place in the lives of families, the same as did the church. Through some fault - in our opinion - of our society, the family life has been relegated to second place and our church lives to third, or lower, place!

This is not to knock the schools and the job they are doing, or trying to do. And we believe that every teacher and every educator would agree that there was more family interest in seeing the schools occupy their place in our society as secondary to family life, if the process of education of the child in discipline of a democratic society, the respect for the rights of others, and the respect for people in places of authority, that our schools could then be in a better position to teach academics and some of the things that go along with it.

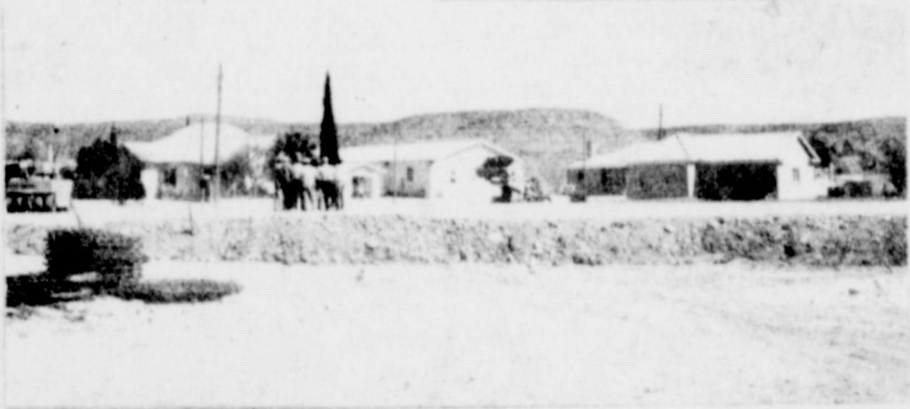
Public school teachers don't want and shouldn't have the responsibility of giving all the worthwhile knowledge a student receives. This should start in the home and extend to the churches and the schools. But one of the prime requisites - in our opinion - for the receiving of knowledge in schools - is the willingness of the student, from desire or other worthwhile motivation, to accept the regimen of self-discipline necessary to absorb knowledge and instruction that is handed out and to put out knowledge that is available but not handed out. This motivation usually has to come from the home.

Petitions for an election to create the district, name regents, and provide tax revenues for construction are circulated in counties which indicate interest by taking part in the hearings. Elections are held only in counties which provide a petition with 10 percent or more of qualified tax-paying voters. A majority vote of qualified electors (property taxpaying voters) in the group of counties creates the district.

Regents then organize, set up mechanics of taxation through county tax facilities, choose a site, issue bonds and proceed with plant construction.

Yardsticks for creation of a district are counties which can provide a tax base of \$100 to \$200 million valuation and potential for 1,000 student enrollment after five years of operation.

The district must put up most of the cost of plant site and construction, and part of the operational cost. State funds are available on a basis of \$425 per year per full student unit, and student fees are now set at a maximum of \$50 per semester for any state-supported school.

Regions were suggested by a state co-ordinating board for higher education.


