Carlos Cruz, 20 Murder Victim, Buried Here Friday

Funeral services were held here Friday afternoon in St. James Catholic Church for Carlos Cruz with Rev. Daniel Dierschke officiating. Burial was in Santa Rita Cemetery with Janes Funeral Home of Ozona in charge of arrangements.

Cruz, a 20-year old oil field worker from Crane, was shot early Wednesday as he stood by his car at a south Odessa intersection, according to reports. The shooting followed an auto chase which began shortly after an argument which erupted at an Odessa tavern. Cruz was dead upon arrival at the hospital, suffering a single bullet wound in the chest.

Thomas Earl Lenning, 24, of Odessa has been charged with murder in the death and is being held in the Ector County jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond.

Cruz was born July 23, 1947, in San Miguel, Mexico. He was married to Josephine Calzada, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Antonio Calzada, in Sanderson on August 1, 1965.

Survivors include his wife, twin sons, Carlos Ruben and Carlos Ricardo and a daughter, Beatrice Elizabeth; his father, Sergio Trejo of San Miguel de Allende, Mexico; his mother, Mrs. Guadalupe Cruz, and a brother, Julian Cruz, both of Iran.

Mrs. Cruz and the children have moved from Crane to Sanderson to make their home with her parents.

Mrs. M. Villarreal Dies In New Mexico At Daughter's Home

A funeral mass will be held this afternoon in St. James Catholic Church for Mrs. Manuel Villarreal Sr., 49, with Rev. Daniel Dierschke officiating. The Janes Funeral Home of Ozona is in charge of the arrangements and burial will be in Santa Rita Cemetery.

Mrs. Villarreal died suddenly Saturday evening in Las Vegas, N.M., where she had been visiting her daughter, Mrs. Jose Hinojosa, and family for five weeks and they were preparing to bring her to Sanderson. She was apparently the victim of a cerebral hemorrhage. Her body was brought to Sanderson Monday night.

Born in Langtry on April 25, 1918, she was the former Eva Cantu and was married to Mr. Villarreal in Del Rio on June 8, 1935. They moved here from Langtry and had made their home here for the past 23 years.

Besides her husband, she is survived by three sons, Manuel Jr., and Francisco of Sanderson, Arnulfo of Clinton, Okla.; three daughters, Mrs. Hinojosa, Mrs. Juan Ramirez Jr., and Mrs. Gustavo Varela of Suisun, California; her mother, Mrs. Lorraine Villarreal.

Sanderson Wool Brings Top Prices

The sealed bid sale of wool at the Sanderson Wool Commission Co. Friday of last week opened the spring season market on a strong note with prices 4 to 6 cents higher than those paid last year, according to John T. Williams, manager of the warehouse.

The top price paid for 12-months wool was 61¢ per pound on 14,053 pounds of top-quality Columbia wool produced by Sid and Monty Harkins. The clip was from the stock previously built up by J. M. Corlier, deceased. Burlington Industries Wool Co. of Virginia was the buyer.

The bids were rejected on 9,406 pounds of wool by the producers. This was all 12-months wool of the total of 462,285 pounds of this type offered. The prices of the 12-months wool ranged from 54¢ to 60¢ per pound in the grease and about 2,000 pounds of burry wool sold under 46 1/8¢.

There were over half-million pounds of wool offered in the sale including some Lamb, 8-month, and a few clips of 10-months wool, along with the 12-months mentioned above.

More than 20,500 pounds of 12-months wool brought prices of 60 cents per pound up. More than 124,000 pounds sold at prices ranging from 54 to 57 cents per pound; 106,123 pounds sold at prices from 51 to 54 cents; and 54,139 sold from 46 1/2 to 51 cents a pound.

'Glory of Easter' Is Cantata Title

A choir, composed of about 20 voices from the community will present the cantata under the direction of Mrs. John L. Whistler and Mrs. R. S. Wilkinson is the organist. The choir was organized to present special music to add to the worship services in the community during special religious seasons.

Nichols and Co. of Boston was top buyer of 12-months wool, taking 158-461 pounds. Burlington Industries Wool Co. of Virginia was buyer of 130,570 pounds. Other buyers of 12-months fleeces were J. P. Stevens and Co. of North Andover, Mass., 86,331 pounds; Provoust-Lefebvre Co. of Boston, 43,228 pounds; Marriner Combing Co. of Lawrence, Mass., 20,216 pounds; Forte, Dupee, Sawyer Co. of Boston, 7,867 pounds; Don Hanson, independent buyer of Boston, 5,297 pounds; Lobsitz Mills Co. of Nutley, N. J., 1,929 pounds.

Of 58,684 pounds of eight-months wool offered, buyers purchased 39,714 pounds at prices ranging from 47 cents to 51 1/2 cents per pound in the grease. Bids were pending late Friday on 11,502 pounds and bids were rejected on 2,287 pounds.

Top selling clip of eight-months wool was a 5,493 pound lot from Mrs. Jerry Hayes. Hanson paid 51 1/2 cents a pound for the Hayes offering. Hanson also paid 51 1/2 cents a pound for the Jack Shely clip weighing 7,455 pounds. Lowest price paid on eight-months wool offered here was 41 1/2 cents a pound.

Hanson was top buyer of eight-months wool, purchasing 19,954 pounds. Burlington bought 17,152 pounds. Other buyers were Forte, Dupee, Sawyer, 4,207 pounds; Lobsitz, 2,608 pounds; and Stevens, 976 pounds.

Johnny T. Williams, warehouse operator, said the sale Friday drew the largest number of buyers he had ever had at a sealed bid sale. He reported the wools to be real clean, and of longer length. A sale observer said the wools also appeared to be lighter shrinking than wools offered last year.

Easter Seal Aid Disabled

The Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas offers a variety of services to the physically disabled citizen of Terrell County, according to W. L. "Dub" Card of Fort Stockton, the Easter Seal Representative for the county.

"The Texas Easter Seal Society can provide services to people and families who cannot afford to pay all or part of the cost involved. We can assist in paying for physical, occupational and speech and hearing therapy when it is prescribed by a medical doctor," he said.

"Should a family or individual have to travel to another town for therapy we can help defray traveling expenses when the family is unable to meet them."

"We can also provide assistance to individuals and families in purchasing orthopedic equipment such as wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, braces when prescribed by a medical doctor."

"We can provide help to families in reaching the right person or agencies to receive help that the Easter Seal Society does not provide. This is very important when special testing, evaluation of hospitalization might be necessary. Also people are often eligible for services from public or private agencies but do not know the person, requirements, or place to get the help, perhaps the Easter Seal Society can help," he added.

Pecos Trail Winds Thru Land of Lore and Oil

AUSTIN—Third longest of the travel trails announced here Jan. 17 by Gov. John Connally is the Texas Pecos Trail, which winds for an estimated 626 miles along a land of movies, caverns and western lore.

Routes of the 10 Trails were released at the third annual Governor's Tourist Development Conference.

Counties acting as hosts for Pecos Trail travelers are Crockett, Ector, Edwards, Kinney, Midland, Sutton, Upton, Val Verde, Ward, Pecos and Terrell.

Brackettville, center of a vast ranching complex 32 miles east of Del Rio, is the motion picture capital of Texas. It was here, at Alamo Village, that John Wayne filmed his movie, "The Alamo." Sets built for "The Alamo" and the other seven movies, filmed here have been left intact to create a frontier village featuring horseback and stagecoach rides.

ALREADY WELL known for its Val Verde Winery (only one in Texas) and the Whitehead Memorial Museum near the grave of Judge Roy Bean, Del Rio is the site of the huge Amistad Dam construction. The

joint project between the United States and Mexico is scheduled for completion this year. When finished, the reservoir formed by the dam will back water up 85 miles on the Rio Grande and Pecos Rivers and come within approximately 30 feet of the Devil's River Bridge on U.S. 90 west of Del Rio.

Continuing northward on U.S. 90, the Pecos Trail travels through Langtry, where legendary Judge Roy Bean's saloon stands as a reminder of the days when one man stood for "Law West of the Pecos."

At Sanderson, the trail leaves U.S. 90 and follows U.S. 285 into Fort Stockton, a town estab-

lished as a military outpost in 1880. Comanche Springs there, at one time the largest flowing spring in Texas, was a popular watering stop for both Indians and settlers during the early frontier days.

State Highway 18 guides the traveler farther northward into Monahans, where nature has provided a 3,840-acre sandpile for camping, picknicking and jeep riding. Here, in Sandhills State Park, youngsters and adults romp among sandy dunes reaching heights of 60 feet. The Sandhills Museum, at the entrance to the state park, contains numerous historical objects and features a permanent exhibit of botanical, archaeological, and geological interest interpreting the sandhills area.

DEPARTING Monahans, the Pecos Trail takes U.S. 80 to Odessa and Midland — the heart of the rich Permian Basin oil kingdom. One of the newest Odessa attractions is the Globe of the Southwest Theater on the campus of Odessa College. It is the only authentic replica of Shakespeare's famed 16th century Globe Theater.

The presidential room in the

Ector County Library in Odessa houses furniture, documents and other relics of the presidents of the Republic of Texas and of the United States. Odessa's Prairie Pete Park delights children with its accurate, small-scale illustrations of the prairie dog colonies which once blanketed this area for thousands of miles.

Only 20 miles separate Odessa from Midland and the cities are even closer in other ways. However, Odessa has expanded laterally while Midland has grown skyward. Some of its downtown buildings are the tallest between Fort Worth and Los Angeles. Like Odessa, Midland strives to please youngsters with its Cole Park Zoo, Dennis the Menace Park, Museum of the Southwest, Theater Center, and the Midland County Museum. The modern Midland-Odessa Air Terminal has its own museum containing an airplane built in 1911 and flown a year later between the two cities.

STATE HIGHWAY 349 serves as the southern route leaving Midland. It takes the traveler to Rankin, noted for its Upton County Historical Museum, and on to McCamey via U.S. 67.

Billed as "The City of Beautiful Mesas," McCamey is best known for nearby Castle Gap, a pass used by Indians, cavalrymen, Butterfield stages, and '49ers. Landowners in the area joined together to create the Castle Gap Park, consisting of 232 acres located 14 miles north-west of McCamey along the Upton-Crane county line. Occasional treasure seekers still come to search for the legendary fortune supposedly hidden here by servants of Emperor Maximilian of Mexico.

Twenty-five miles west of McCamey on U.S. 67 are nine dinosaur tracks which were not discovered until 1965. A roadside park has been built near the site.

Continuing southward through Alley Oop Park in Iraan, the Pecos Trail passes historic Fort Lancaster, located in Crockett County about 33 miles west of Ozona on U.S. 290. Plans to restore the fort are under way. Next stop is Sonora, home of the famous caverns located eight miles west of town. The Caverns of Sonora, 20 million years in the making, are noted for transparent draperies and the "butterfly" formation.

Wool and Mohair Incentives Paid

Terrell County sheep and goat raisers received \$432,517.86 in production incentive payments on 1967 wool and mohair last week when drafts were mailed from the ASCS office in Alpine.

After promotion fund deductions were made \$283,210.51 was paid to 83 producers to support prices received on 1,007,533 pounds of live lambs sold in the wool. Payments are made annually in accordance with the National Wool Act of 1954, as amended subsequently. Withheld at the rate of 1 1/2¢ per pound on shorn wool and 7 1/2¢ per cwt. on unshorn lambs, net promotion deduction is \$15,133.10. This fund is administered by the American Sheep Producers Council to promote and increase the wool market.

Under agreement approved last year mohair producers will contribute \$6,425.44 to the promotion fund to be administered by the Mohair Council of America. One and one-half cents per pound withheld on 428,363 pounds of mohair sold left support payments of \$149,307.35 for 71 growers.

The 1967 incentive price for wool was 66¢; the national average price received by growers was 39.8¢. This necessitated a payment rate of 65.8% applied to net returns of ranchmen. The payment of incentive on the wool left on live lambs sold is based on the payment rate for shorn wool and this year was \$1.05 per cwt.

The national average price received for mohair in 1967 was 40.9¢ per pound in contrast to the desired price of 76.4¢; so the payment rate for mohair was 86.8%.
