On 1968 ballots federal candidates go ahead of state candidates, which means that even though Congressme - candidates. Sequance of offices on the ballots is pre-- scribed by the new code, and must be followed in all - counties in the same manner.

Another new requirement is that a square must be marked in order for votes for unopposed candidates to - be counted. Leaving them unmarked will simply mean that the vote will not count for the un-opposed candidate.
