# **Progress of Dam Project Told** By Schrader

The Sanderson Canyon Watershed work plan is 60% complete according to the April 1968 report from the San Marcos Watershed Work Plan Staff of the Soil Conservation Service, Darwin G. Schrader, local work unit specialist, stated Tuesday. The geological phase of the work plan is 96% complete and is scheduled for completion in

June of this year. The hydrologic study is 57% complete and is expected to be completed by June 1.

The engineering phase is 75% complete and is scheduled for completion on June 30, 1968.

The economic study will get under way when the structure designs and cost estimates are complete by the engineers. The economists of the work plan staff will be in Sanderson during June of this year to gather information concerning flood damage costs, damageable values, and creditable benefits if flood prevention structures had been installed.

Target date for completion of the watershed work plan is August 30, 1968.



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# **Rains Continue** To Fall Locally

Rains continue to visit the county to help in keeping vegetation green.

On Wednesday of last week a rain of . 40-inch fell in a sudden downpour that lasted only a few moments. That shower was spotted even in Sanderson and did not even sprinkle on some of the country close to town. The shower seemed to be heavier to the north and some ranchers reported more than was gauged locally.

Thursday afternoon there was another rain that left about 1.6 inches of rain in most local rain gauges. The water fell suddenly and there was a fast run-off locally that almost got into some of the buildings on the south side of Oak Street between First and Second Streets.

This rain did not cover the extreme western part of Sanderson, but heavier rains were reported to the north and east.

There was some light hail that accompanied the downpour on Thursday, but no damage was reported from it. Some very light hail was also reported Wednesday.

A cloud which came up from the west Friday afternoon and another in the early evening left some moisture on ranches to the south as the cloud moved toward the east. Heavy lightning accompanied the clouds Friday.



# Mrs. Gatlins Son Works On Apollo

Work of a young man reared in Del Rio may become a part of mainline Apollo in the United States' project for landing a crew of men on the moon and returning them safely to earth.

He is Thomas L. Wilson, son of Mrs. H.E. Gatlin of Del Rio and the late Homer Wilson, A graduate of Del Rio High School, his average on graduation set a record that still stands, 97.43. He holds a degree in engineering from Rice University in Houston and is working with NASA in the flight crew support division at the Manned Spacecraft Center there.

He has devised a backup guidance steering scheme for the Saturn launch vehicle.

"Under certain conditions, the Saturn booster can get itself into trouble-and the flight crew along with it," Wilson explained.

"But I have revised the onboard computer program (designed at MIT) so that the astronaut can perform a Saturn takeover and fly the booster manually on into earth orbit.

"I have developed the technique during simulation runs with Mission Control Center, utilizing their simulated rigidbody booster. Amco Research Center also is providing support for the idea, having prepared a special simulation of it in San Francisco-a simulation which is more realistic, because it accounts for body bending and fuel slosh.

"Several astronauts have already been sent to try it out," he explained.

"I want to qualify that the concept of booster takeover is not new with me," Wilson explained. "However, Saturn takeover during launch boost in Apollo is something that my work has made possible. The problem with the Saturn appears to be a serious one under certain failure conditions-and my fix for it may become a part of mainline Apollo."

Wilson spoke at the 20th annual Southwestern Institute of Electrical and Electronic Enrineers conference in Houston April 17. The conference was n session April 17, 18 and 19.






