LISTEN TO LUKE

Albert---

The persons or person who continue to harrass A. J. Riess in various and sundry ways has in our humble opinion a sordid outlook on life and possible a sick mind.

If there is any way to cause cessation of these practices of harassment - even for the sake of the perpetrator(s), we think it should be done. Such actions originate as thoughts in some sort of a distorted process of thinking that may come up with no telling what kind of an idea next.

Mr. Riess, we feel sure, is quite "edgy" about the entire series of events aimed at disturbing the peace of the family - even to the shouting of obscenities as a car drives by - and someone could be injured unless it is ceased.

For the sake of the guilty person or persons, for the sake of the Riess family, for the sake of the town, it is our opinion that this should be brought to a top immediately.

The school board of equalization met last week on the oil and gas and related properties' values and will meet in July to consider values of all other properties; the county board met this week for all properties valuations. There has been relatively no interest displayed by any of the taxpayers.

The tax rate now stands at \$1.50 per \$100 valuation on the local maintenance for schools, which is the maximum rate and no more school taxes may be charged until the valuations are raised - and the rate may be adjusted then; and 42¢ for the interest and sinking fund, which is set according to the needs but is governed somewhat by the law. No more than 7% of the total valuation may be in an indebtedness without penalty to the local maintenance maximum rate.

And it is an opinion of those who are dealing directly with school revenue and operation that there will have to be an increase in valuations next year so that there can be an increase in revenue.

There was no appreciable change in the total valuation of property for taxable purposes in the county this year, only about \$130,000.00, which, when reduced to the actual increase in revenue to the schools, is not a large figure.

Prior to the beginning of the construction of the new junior high school building and the new dressing and locker room facility, there was already an indebtedness in the elementary school and other projects. We have not heard of any proposed projects of the school that will necessitate a revenue increase, and the one spoken of above is more of a need for an increase in the local maintenance fund.

Concerning the equalization hearing on taxable property on the county's rolls, we do not, nor could we know what is going to happen. There will be the same increase in valuation of the same figures are accepted - since it was a pipeline and some leased acreage that caused

ICC Orders Hearing On SP Request To Drop Service

U. S. Rep. Richard C. White said the Interstate Commerce Commission has ordered hearings on the request of the Southern Pacific Railroad to discontinue operations of the Sunset Limited, the only remaining railway passenger service through the congressman's district.

In a letter to White, chairman Paul J. Tierney of the Interstate Commerce Commission said hearings will be scheduled at various points served by Southern Pacific and any interested party may appear and present evidence in opposition to the Southern Pacific plan.

Effigy Hanged In New School Found Monday

An effigy was found hanging in the center area of the junior high school Monday morning when workmen arrived. The maker of the effigy had gone to considerable trouble in sewing up bottoms of the legs of the trousers, and in general putting the image together.

ed the increase in the school's total.

The tax rate for the county, we understand, is 77¢ and 47¢ for the state, making a total of \$1.24, which is far below the maximum.

Any increase in the county's rate would be made after the need for one - if any - is established and at a different time than for equalizing.

And we have not heard of any proposed increase.

We can think of several items that maybe should be on a list of "wants" for both the county and the school and it will be up to them to decide which is most needed. There was an advantage of the old system of the commissioners controlling the purse strings of both agencies in that they could weigh the needs of one against the needs of the other and both of these against the total taxing potential or "ease and strain" of the taxpayers. Such a planning of the needs and wants of each and the possibility of acquiring any or all of it through taxation is a possible consideration that is sorely needed. We would not say that either is trying to "hog" all of the potential tax revenue of the county, but an appraisal of the needs and wants of each and their consideration in the overall ability of the taxpayers might be a good idea.

For example, we might think that we need a sewage system and a drainage system (two projects) here while someone else thinks we need a field house and other improvements at the football field, and someone else might think of something that is needed that would supercede all of the above suggestions - or maybe we can afford all of them and don't know it!

If there is no such consultation or planning now, we would encourage it. It just might get the job done better!

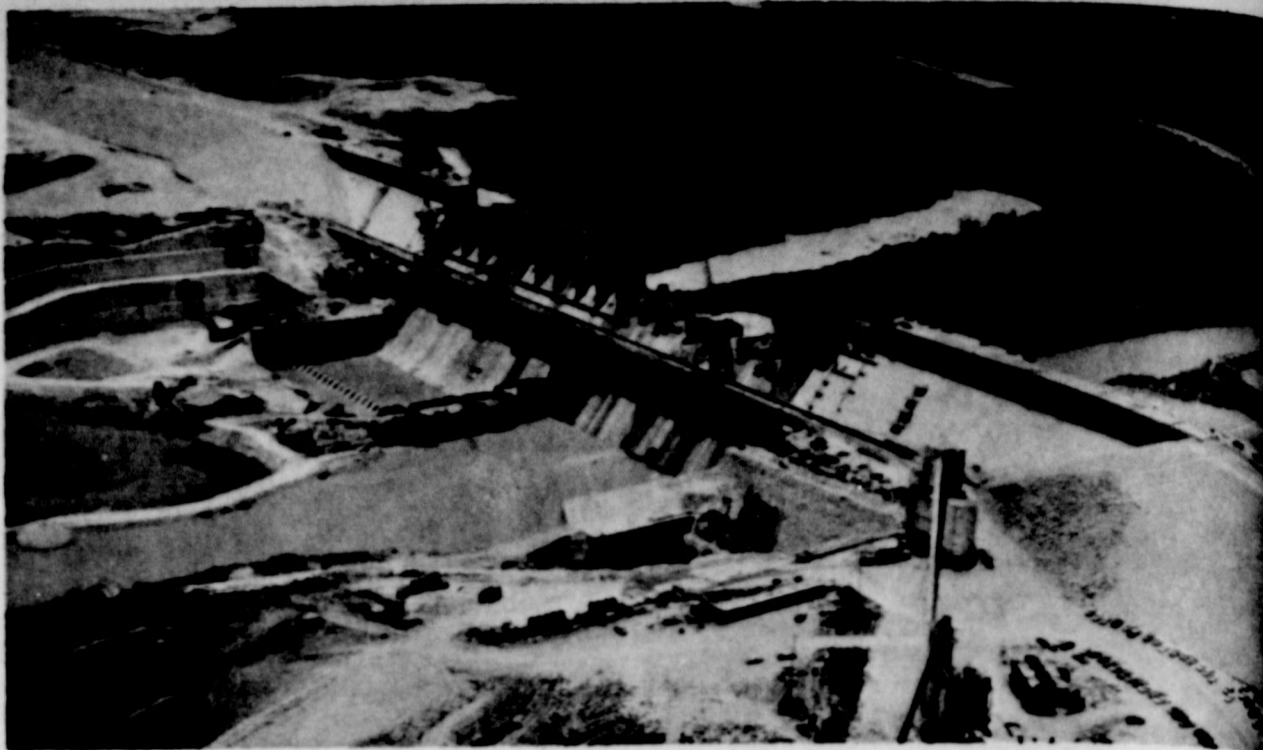

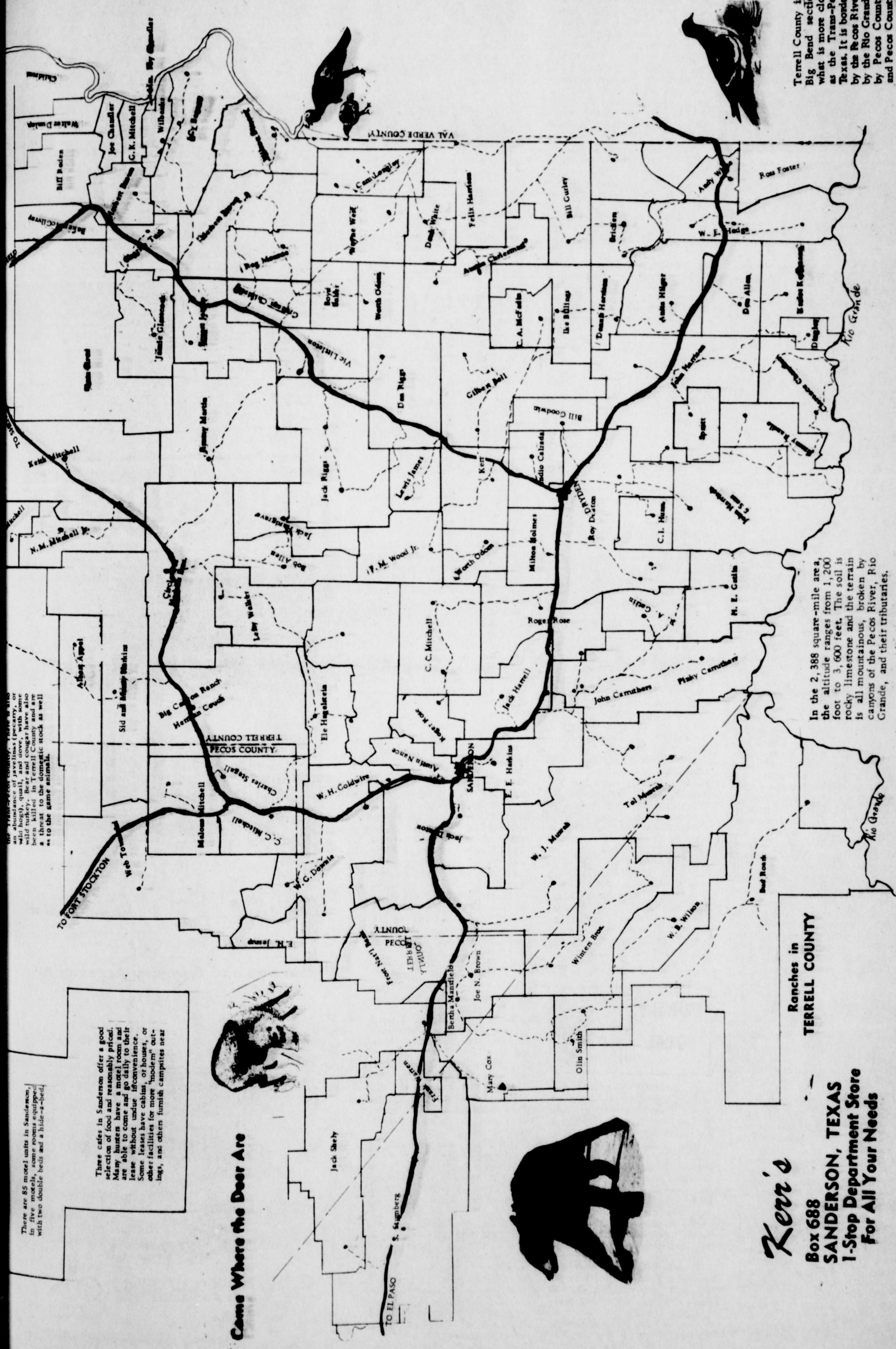
