It is going to be interesting to watch the developments within the Democratic Party on a national level from now through convention time. And to see the reaction of the voting public to these developments is going to be even more interesting.

It was not too many weeks ago that the Veep stated, and was quoted widely as stating that the United States was not at war in Vietnam to win. It comes as interesting news to those parents, wives, etc., and those who have died in that war, and to those who are now in the army or about to be.

It is also interesting news to us of us who are paying taxes in finance that war that could end on and on and on. . . .

It is also interesting to note that now Chief Justice Earl Warren is trying to pick his successor by refusing to resign until or unless Justice Abe Fortas is named as his successor. As we remember things - there is no vacancy unless Warren resigns and there can be no successor until he does resign.

These demands being made of the leaders of the Democratic Party will be met if - and only if an Autocracy exists under the guise of a Democracy.

And this might be closer to truth than lots of Democrats like to think about.

There has been an old cliché that has been in the party a long time - too long - "That is politics"; and it gives the privilege of doing anything in the name of "politics" that one can get away with, all of which is excusable because "this is politics".

The time has long-since past when honest people have been into acts that individually under any other name than "politics" they would not continue. Why should they continue?

It is almost sickening to us to continue to hear and hear of legislation that is almost that's almost a dirty word at stopping murder by fire-

While it's true that most assassinations of famous people is by firearms, there are literally thousands of people killed all the time on highways and there seems to be so little concern about that.

Legislation and law enforcement could handle this easily as long as the public is much simpler than in the case of firearms.

## Grand Jury Ends Two-Day Session

Twelve bills of indictment were drawn up by the Terrell County Grand Jury in two days of hearing evidence this week. The group met Monday morning and adjourned that evening to begin Tuesday morning, adjourning at about 4:00 p. m.

There were no no-bills returned by the grand jury, according to Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey.

None of the defendants named in the indictments had been arrested and charged before a magistrate, so the names of the accused persons on the indictments could not be released.

Two men were charged with theft on two separate indictments, and with burglary on another indictment; 1 person was charged with burglary; 1 was charged with removing stolen property from the county; 1 was charged with malicious destruction of property belonging to another; 2 were charged with burglary; and 1 with perjury before a grand jury.

Sheriff Cooksey stated that he and Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg had worked long and hard in gathering evidence for the consideration of the grand jury on the cases they heard and upon which they returned the indictments, and he stated that it was the longest list of indictments returned by a grand jury since he had been sheriff of Terrell County.

## Civil Suit Began Tuesday Morning In District Court

A panel of petit jurors was summoned for Tuesday morning at 10:00 o'clock in the District Court in an effort to seat a jury to hear a case styled Dionicia Veliz vs. George Gann.

The jury was selected before noon and the case got under way immediately.

District Judge Roger Thurmond was on the bench.

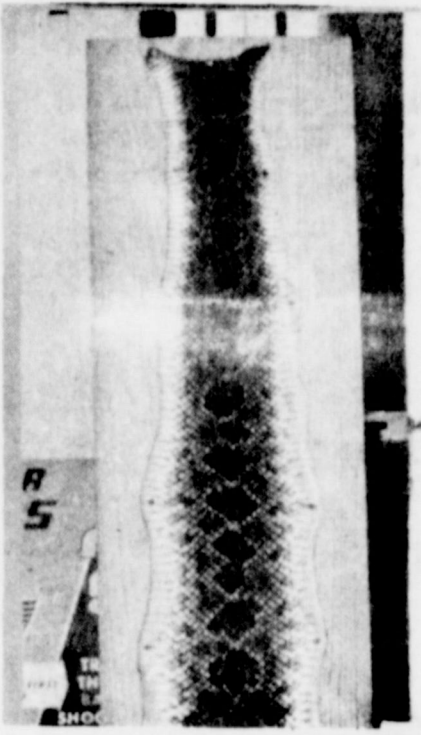
Carroll stated that the search for the missing aircraft was abandoned Sunday night and it had not been found.

## Rains Soak Area During Week Past

Rains have given almost all of the area a good soaking during the past week, with some parts getting up to three inches of moisture.

Over an inch of rain was recorded locally and the moisture helped to make the Fourth holiday more pleasant by settling the dirt and cooling the atmosphere.

Sunday night there was a general rain came from the west and left a half-inch of moisture in local gauges. Heavier rainfall seemed to be to the south and north of Sanderson from the reports received.

More rainfall was reported in parts of the county Monday afternoon, bringing the total rain received in the past 10 days up to about three inches on many reaches of the county.

The amounts range to as low as an inch and a half.

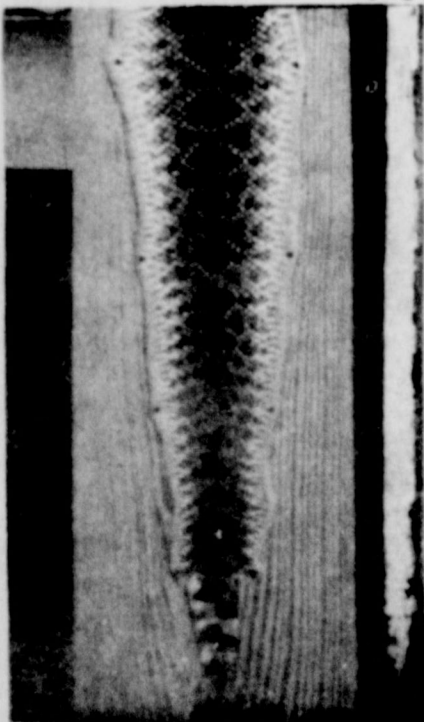

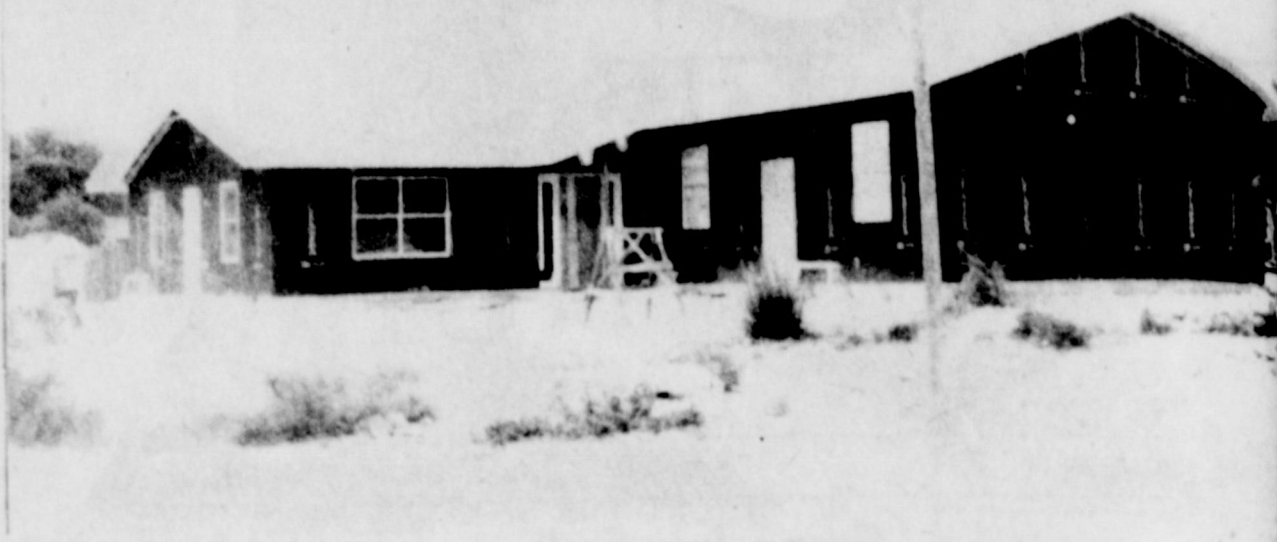
