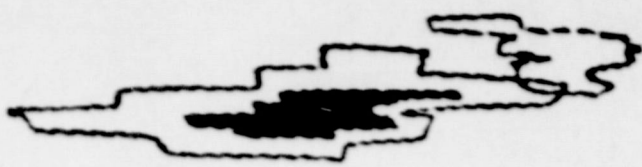

All citizens, in order to qualify as a voter, must fulfill the other qualifications of age, residence, citizenship, etc., and also be registered before February 1, 1969.

## New Airport Is Recommended For Sanderson

Five new airports are recommended for the 16th Congressional District in the Federal Aviation Administration's five year National Airport plan received by Congressman Richard C. White from Secretary of Transportation Alan S. Boyd. The FAA also recommended a continuing program of improvements to all existing airports of the district.

New airports are recommended for El Paso County, Dell City in Hudspeth County, Big Bend National Park, Presidio, and Sanderson.

The report is not a promise of federal assistance in recommended projects, Congressman White said, but is in keeping with the legal requirement that the Federal Aviation Administration make periodic plans as to the needs of aviation through the country. Local governments may negotiate with the FAA for possible aid on the recommended developments.

The FAA report recommends a new basic utility airport with a runway of 4,600 feet for Sanderson.

Funeral services were held in Athens Sunday, November 10, for Carl Werneking, who had died on Friday in a Lubbock hospital.

Pallbearers were eight nephews: Bruce Werneking of Seagoville, Thomas Werneking, Treman Thompson, and Tommy Arthur of Athens; C. W. Pryor of El Paso; Treman Perkins of Malakoff; Jeffrey Smiley of Tyler, and Larry Frost of San Antonio.

Besides his widow, he is survived by a son, Weldon Werneking of Austin; a daughter, Mrs. Glynn Chandler of Seminole; and four grandchildren; also two brothers, Bill and Oscar Werneking of Athens, and four sisters, Mrs. Lena Pryor and Mrs. Emma Thompson of Athens, Mrs. Sophie Frost of San Antonio, and Mrs. Frieda Thompson of Larue.

Mr. Werneking, who was an SP car inspector, came to Valentine in 1939 to go to work for the railroad. They had lived in Sanderson since 1946.

He was born in Eddy, Falls County, August 5, 1905, and was married to Iva Nell Hood in Athens in 1928.

In the correspondence between Williams and White, Williams stated that local interest on the project has been high and Williams was assured that agreement would be reached on a work plan that will provide a basis for a satisfactory project.

There are often some disagreements over highway locations, and remunerations to the landowner, but these usually can and are worked out locally with a minimum of effort, hard feelings, etc., and to the best interest of the traveling public. We doubt this would be possible under the proposed set-up.

ZIP-coded mail may be the greatest boon to the postoffice since the abolishment of horse-back delivery, but when they can explain how it is helping us we'll quit griping. Almost all of the mail into Sanderson arrives on the truck from El Paso, which means that it goes through Sanderson one day going west, from points east of San Antonio, and comes back here the next day. From cities east and north of San Antonio, it goes to El Paso without coming through here, possibly, but it goes to El Paso. This is faster service?

And do you know that mailing a package to Dryden from here costs the same as if you mailed it from El Paso to Dryden? And the same is true on figuring the parcel post rates to any city - figure from El Paso!

The explanation for this is: in figuring the ZIP code zones, an arbitrary line was drawn between San Antonio and El Paso and it put us in the El Paso section. A study of the mail, or a query of local PO employees would have given some well-needed answers.

Another of the blunders of bureaucracy!

## Positions For Highway Patrol To Be Filled

Patrolman Malcom Bolinger Jr. announced this week that the Texas Department of Public Safety is making a special effort to obtain qualified young men for the position of Patrolman with the Department.

Patrolman Bolinger said: "All men between the ages of 20 and 35 who are of sound physical condition, have at least a high school education or equivalent, have vision of not less than 20/40 and have high moral standards should contact him or any member of the Texas Department of Public Safety immediately."

Benefits include two weeks annual vacation, 12 or more holidays each year, 12 days sick leave a year, retirement privileges, and travel expenses. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniforms and equipment necessary for performance of their duties.

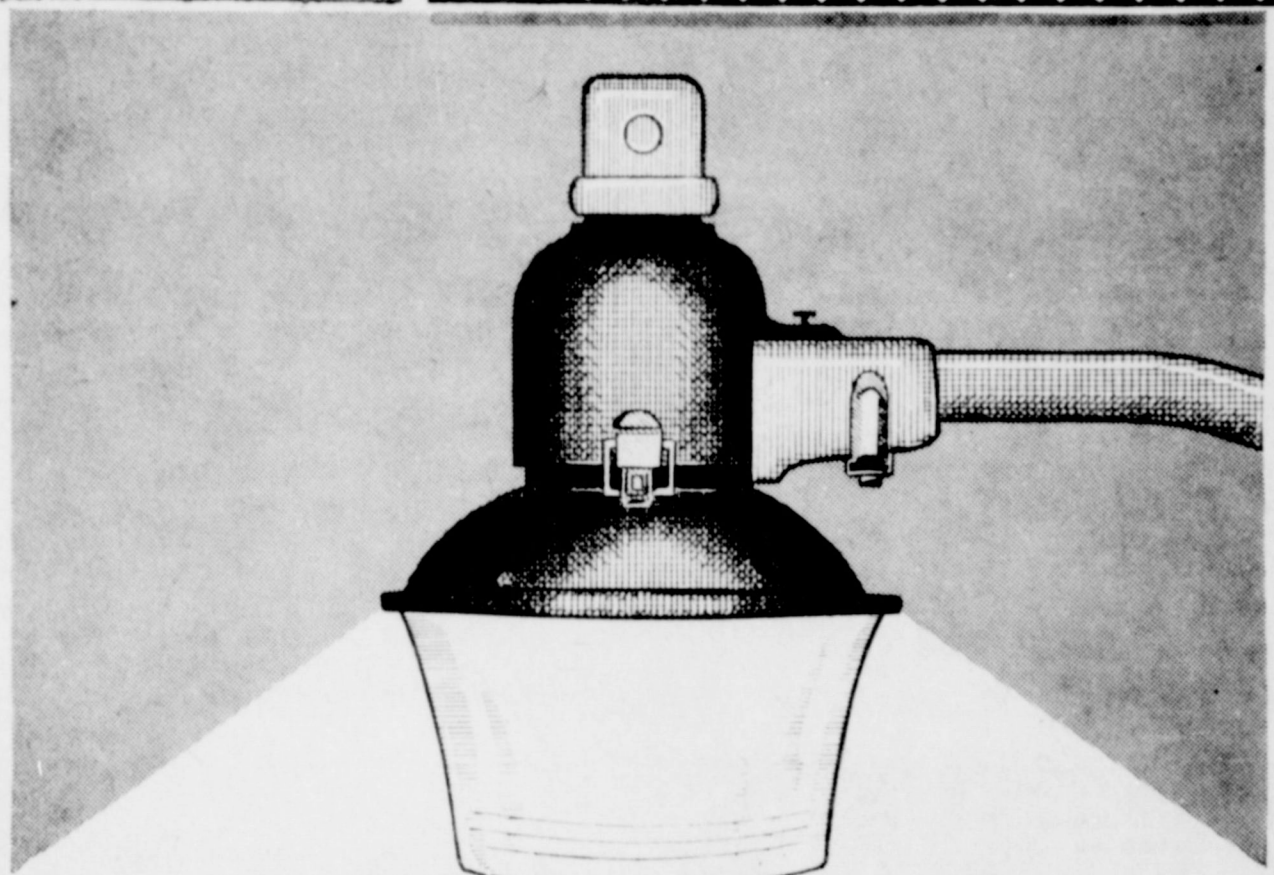

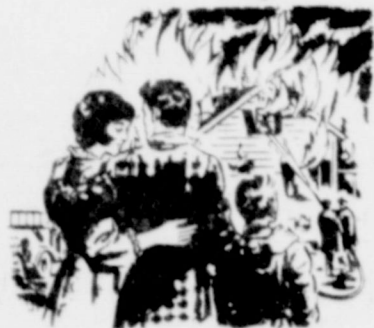
