Five new airports are recommended for the 16th Congressional District in the Federal Aviation Administration's five year National Airport plan received by Congressman Richard C. White from Secretary of Transportation Alan S. Boyd. The FAA also recommended a continuing program of improvements to all existing airports of

New airports are recommended for El Paso County, Dell City in Hudspeth County, Big Bend Na-

The report is not a promise of federal assistance in recommended projects, Congressman White said, but is in keeping with the legal requirement that the Federal Aviation Administration make periodic plans as to the needs of aviation through the country. Local governments may negotiate with the FAA for possible aid on the recommended developments.



ZIP-coded mail may be the greatest boon to the postoffice since the abolishment of horseback delivery, but when they can explain how it is helping us we'll quit griping. Almost all of the mail into Sanderson arrives on the truck from Fl Paso, which means that it goes through Sanderson one day going west, from points east of San Antonio, and comes back here the next day, from cities east and nort of San Antonio, it goes to El Paso without coming through here, possibly, but it goes to El Paso. This is faster service:

And do you know that mailing a package to Dryden from here costs the same as if you mailed it from El Paso to Dryden? And the same is true on figuring the parcel post rates to any city - figure from El Paso!

The explanation for this is: in figuring the ZIP code zones, an arbitrary line was drawn between San Antonio and El Paso and it put us in the El Paso section. A study of the mail, or a query of local PO employees would have given some well-needed answers.






