\$29,549.38 In Aid For 199 Students In Terrell County

Terrell County Independent School District has been approved for \$29,549.38 in federal money as educational assistance to students from low income families to help them overcome language difficulties and other educational deficiencies.

The announcement of the allotment from the federal government came from Congressman Richard C. White last week. The approval of the allotment was from the United States Office of Education under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

Cong. White explained that the amount of funds allotted to each county is based on the number of children from families earning less than \$2,000 per year, or from families receiving assistance under the Aid to Dependent Children Act. There are 199 such children in Terrell County, according to the news release from the congressman.

Big Bend Park Winter Schedule Is Announced

Superintendent Luther T. Peterson, Jr. announced today fall and winter schedules of services and operations at Big Bend National Park.

Effective November 25, the Visitor Center at Panther Junction will be operated only from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. Other information points at ranger stations throughout the park will not be manned on a regularly-scheduled basis.

Ranger-naturalist activities will offer evening campfire programs as well as conducted walks and auto caravans at various places throughout the park. Inquiry should be made locally for the time and place of these activities as they are subject to change on a month-to-month basis.

The overnight campgrounds at the Basin and at Rio Grande Village will be partially closed and camping will be restricted to designated areas within each campground. The full capacity of each campground will be opened to public use only when there is a demand for the space.

These actions have been brought about as a result of limitations on filling of permanent positions in the Federal Government, Mr. Peterson said. The Revenue and Expenditure Control Act of June 28, 1958, (P.L. 90-364), requires that only three out of each four permanent vacancies in the Federal Government be filled. 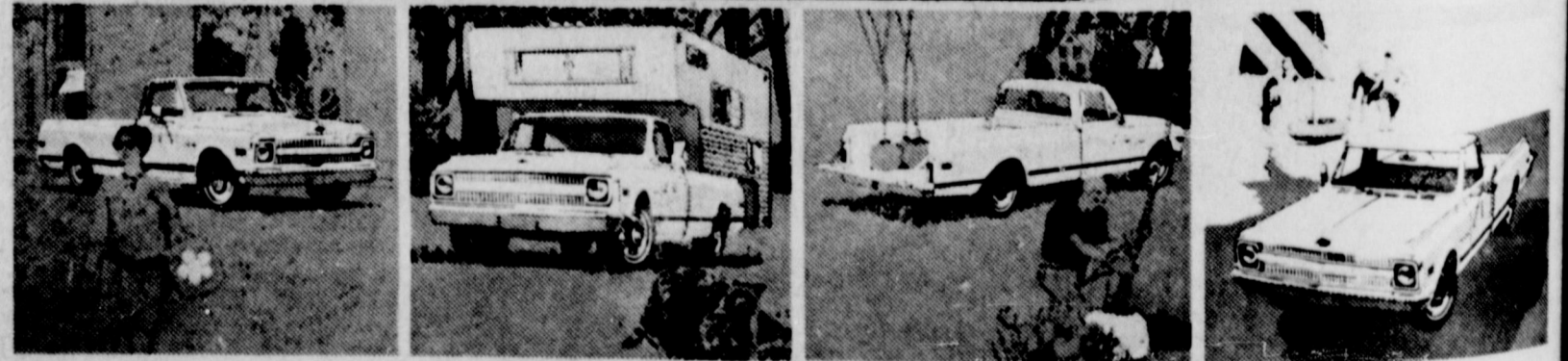

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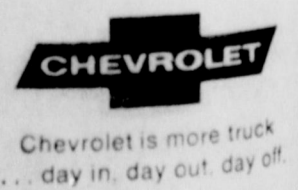
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MRS. SUE B. MOSELEY WEDS

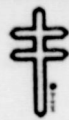
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HEROES CARVED ON MOUNTAINSIDES

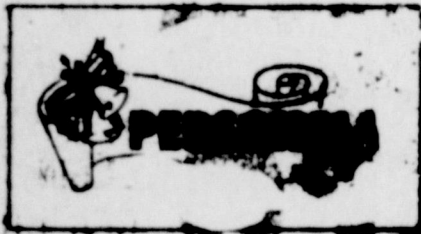

Procedure Given For Registering Various Firearms

DALLAS -- Detailed procedures for registering machine guns, sawed-off rifles, silencers, deactivated war trophies and other destructive devices were announced today by B. Frank White, Southwest Regional Commissioner of Internal Revenue.

The Gun Control Act of 1968 requires that weapons and devices of this type must be registered with the Internal Revenue Service by December 1. Mr. White said that copies of registration Form 4467 are available at Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and other IRS offices.

The forms are prepared in 3 copies, two of which should be mailed to the Director, Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Division, Internal Revenue Service, Washington, D. C. 20224. The third copy may be kept by the owner of the firearm or destructive device.

Firearms or destructive devices should not be brought to an IRS office to be registered, Mr. White said.

Under the new law all firearms and destructive devices requiring registration must be identified by a serial number. If a firearm or device does not have a serial number, the owner should phone, visit, or write the nearest IRS Alcohol and Tobacco Tax office and a number will be assigned.

After obtaining the number, the owner is responsible for affixing it to the firearm or device before completing the registration form. Additional information may be obtained by contacting the nearest Alcohol and Tobacco Tax or other IRS office.

Entrance Fees Now Charged At State Parks In Area

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department began charging entrance fees at State Parks, including some in the Fort Stockton area, on October 4, according to J. R. Singleton, executive director of the Department.

A \$1 per day carload fee will be charged at 24 parks; 50 cents per day per carload will be charged at four parks; and two State historic sites will be added to the list of historic sites where fees are now charged.

At the Parks and Wildlife Commission meeting on July 30, the Commission authorized the \$12 annual entrance permit which can be used instead of the daily entrance fee at all State parks except Eisenhower Birthplace, San Jose Mission and Varner-Hogg Plantation.

The \$1 per day entrance fee will apply at Abilene, Bastrop, Blanco, Bonham, Bentzen-Rio Grande, Cleburne, Daingerfield, Davis Mountains, Eisenhower, Falcon, Fort Parker, Garner, Huntsville, Inks Lake, Kerrville, Lake Brownwood, Lake Corpus Christi, Lake Whitney, Martin Dies Jr., Meridian, Palo Duro Canyon, Possum Kingdom, Stephen F. Austin and Tyler.

Department officials said six parks have been exempted from the entrance fee until construction projects, now underway, have been completed. These parks include: Atlanta, Caddo Lake, Goliad, Goose Island, Lockhart and Palmatto.

Parks where an entrance fee of 50 cents per day will be charged are: Balmorhea, Big Spring, Monahans Sandhills and Mother Neff. Governor Hogg Shrine and Washington-on-the-Brazos will be added to the list when construction projects are completed.

An entrance fee of 25 cents for adults will be charged at Monument Hill and 50 cents at Old Fort Parker for adults and 10 cents for 6-12-year-old children.

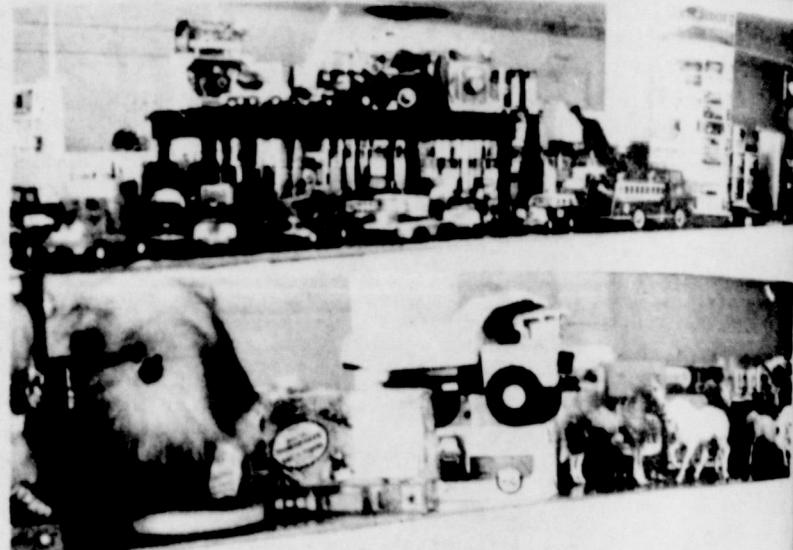
Department authorities said the annual permits, duplicate permits for second cars and the daily entrance permits were mailed from Austin Friday (Sept. 27) to all State parks where fees are charged. The permits may be obtained from these State parks and Department regional offices in Tyler, Victoria, San Angelo, Vaco and Rockport, and will go on sale on receipt.

Annual permits and the \$2.50 duplicate pass for second cars can also be purchased by mail from the Parks and Wildlife Department, John H. Reagan Building, Austin.

Monies collected from the State park entrance fees will be used to repay the \$75 million State Bond Program authorized by the 60th Legislature, approved by referendum in Nov., 1967.

The Commission authorized the sale of the first issue of \$5.75 million this week to Lehman Brothers and Associates, N. Y., who submitted the lowest effective interest rate bid of 3.5846 percent.
