Many schools require certified copies of birth certificates as proof that a child is six years old before permitting the child to be enrolled, Carroll advised. school officials in their areas to me while I was there. determine for sure that birth records are required in those sections.

If they are, by all means make requests for copies of those records early.

"Working with limited personnel, the Bureau of Vital Statistics cannot possibly render the type service expected by those who wait until the last moment to make requests," Carroll said. How many children will be enrolling in school for the first time this fall? Carroll can't say precisely.





The NLRB's petition for en-forcement of its order directing the WTU Co. to bargain with the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers was denied by the Court which held the election to be illegal for the following reasons 45 employee ballots which could have affected the outcome of the election were arbitrarily cast out by the Labor Board for reasons of its

own, because Labor Board requestioned employees prior to voting, allowed tion voters publicly at polling places and for various other acts of misconduct and illegal procedure on the part of Labor Board representatives conducting the election.

The Court ruled that the NLRB had prevented the Company from presenting facts of evi-dence in behalf of its employees according to law. The election in question was conducted in December, 1951 by the Ft. Worth Regional Labor Board at the request of the union (IBEW) for the purpose of determining un-ion representation of the 213 employees in WTU's Production Department (Power Plants).
