## Razing Old School Begun This Week

Crews arrived in Sanderson this week for the razing of the old red brick school building.

The three-story building has served Terrell County as an institution of learning since its completion in 1912. It served first as the building for all 11 grades, later serving the first grades when the present high school was built in 1930, then when the 12th grade was added the first 8 grades were in the old building with the high school still used for the top 4

Subsequent changes included the building of the building that now houses the band - Lamar Ward - built first for Latin-American students who were housed in the building now used as a field house, later used as the building for the 1st and 2nd grades, with intermediategrade students in the red brick building.

Later, in 1962, with the construction of the new elementary school, the red brick building was used as a junior high and continued until this term of school when the new junior high building was occupied after the beginning of this school year.

The top floor, which housed the auditorium and library, and some of the class rooms, was abandoned and closed off with the semi-basement and first floor continuing in use until the entire ouilding was abandoned.

The building housed the boiler used to heat the high school - a source of no little amount of contention over the years. The heating system for the high school now is in the dressing room building added last sum-

#### SSgt. Lupe Lopez Gets Bronze Star In Vietnam Action

Vietnam combat provides many opportunities to test a soldier's feelings and emotions. With these trials, U.S. soldiers are finding themselves witnessing and performing acts of heroism which, to those involved, are "all in the line of duty."

SSgt. Guadalupe M. Lopez, now serving with Co. A, 1st Bn., 67th Armor, 2nd Armd. Div., is among those credited with performing an act of heroism in Vietnam and he, too, feels his actions were just a part of his duty.

Guadalupe served as a platoon sergeant with Co. C, 1st Bn., 7th Cav., 1st Cav. Div., (Air mobile) and received the Bronze Star Medal with V device.

"When I talk about duty, I'm talking about two kinds. My primary duty in Vietnam was being a platoon sergeant for the 3rd Plt., but when one of my men got into a jam, I felt an extra, special duty," said Lopez.

Co. C came under intense enemy fire from an estimated battalion of North Vietnamese soldiers during a reconnaissance in force operation in northern Quang Ngai Province.

"At first sight of the enemy, we only spotted a few of them. Later we found out that the main body of enemy soldiers was inside the woodline. They had a trap waiting for us and we fell right into it," said Lopez.

As the U.S. infantrymen entered the thick jungles within the woodline, the enemy battalion surrounded them and opened fire.

"Charlie employed heavy automatic weapons, small arms fire and 82mm mortars at us. We formed a defensive perimeter and returned fire," added Lopez.

During the battle, one of Lopez's platoon members was wounded and separated from the company perimeter.

Exposing himself to open enemy fire, Lopez left the perimeter and rescued the casualty. "Aiding a distressed soldier becomes a sense of duty in combat. I could have very well been the wounded man in need of help." he said.

A landing zone was prepared in the middle of the company's perimeter, and evaluation of the casualties took place.

Continuing to demonstrate his courage, Lopez guided his men in evacuating the casualties, and became wounded by shrapnel in the process.

"Some kind of mortar or rocket landed near us as we moved toward the evacuation helicopter, and the concussion knocked us to the ground," said Lopez, a native of Sanderson.

With the helicopter only a few feet away, the rescue crew rose to their feet and completed the



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


