School Census Is Completed; Figures Down

There is a final count of 520 on the 1969 school census for Terrell County, according to A. J. Riess, principal of the elementary school. The census was completed in January.

There are 257 males on the census roll and 263 females with 34 6-year-olds eligible to start to school on September 1.

The census is only a few short of the figures for 1968. There were 538 counted last year.

TS&GRA Begins Drive For New Earwood Fund

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association has announced the start of its drive to raise a goal of \$5,000 in voluntary contributions to establish a special memorial fund for the late Fred T. Earwood, nationally - known wool and mohair industry leader, who died

last November 18. Contributions will be placed in a special Association fund to be known as the "Fred Earwood Memorial Fund,"

An award will be made each year at the association's annual meeting to honor some person whose contributions exemplify the late Mr. Earwood's dedication and work vital to the sheep and goat industry.

PUBLIC NOTICE OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITA-TION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.

Notice is here given as re-quired by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

Instructions and forms for recording claims may be obtained without cost from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

New Vehicle Is Now On Market

It has a low center of gravity, optional four-wheel steering and a unique frameless, watertight steel body, made in two hulls which pivot around a center joint, keeping all four wheels in surface contact no matter how rough the going.

The Coot twists and climbs over obstacles and "swims" in water. Neither rough terrain, boulder, tree trucks, underbrush, lakes, streams, mud, snow, swamp, slide rock nor grade to 25% of vertical can change the course of a Coot!

Power comes from a 12-horsepower Tecumseh air-cooled engine under the front seat. With two forward speeds and reverse, solid-state ignition and alternator, the Coot runs on a gallon of ordinary gas for two to four hours, depending on the terrain.
