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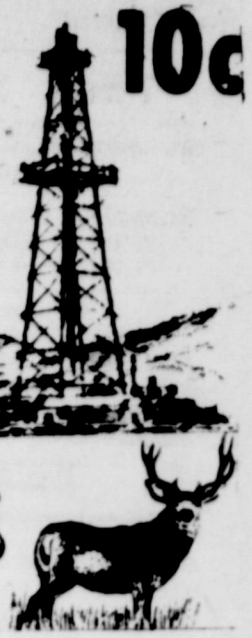

There is a letter published in The Times this week which is a letter of thanks, but in it there is another expression implied that strikes a note with us.

There is even the mention of the word "proud" in the letter, but not proud in a boastful way or a way that is obnoxious to others.

Pride, it seems to us, comes through in so many ways, when it is allowed to, to make for a better life for all of those associated with those who have pride.

Pride, in the sense we have in mind, is being aware of certain things and making the most of them by developing - not the pride - but the things that give us pride.

Miss America, an Olympics star, Miss Congeniality; and even every day mortals like you and I could stifle every spark of pride we have and end up being an absolute nothing.

Pride can cause a person to go far beyond his known limitations of accomplishments, or the lack of it can cause a person to be lost in the world of derelicts.

The letter referred to expressed pride in living in Sanderson. This pride is shared by many others around us and is a source of joy to all of us who have pride in our town to know that we have others around us of a like mind.

In our opinion, pride is expressed in so many ways - in keeping up our yards, in the appearance of our churches, of our schools, ourselves; in the way we treat public property, in how we view private property; in what we say about our town - or rather how we say it - in most all of our actions, it seems, pride comes into the scene - or the lack of it!

Our community is not perfect because it is made up of imperfections like me, but I am still proud of it, and extremely proud of the way its people rally to the need of those less fortunate than others or more in need at a specific time.

We have trees of all kinds putting out buds - except the mesquite trees. Wonder if they are trying to tell us something!

The response to the purchase of registration tags for dogs is about what was expected, which was low, considering the number of animals running around. Maybe when some of the dogs that do not have tags get picked up there will be another slight increase in registration.

From our observation post, it seems to us that there is far too much stink going on in different towns over the nation where government hand-out programs are going on!

It seems that far too many of those in charge of the local programs are more interested in furthering their own causes - either financially or politically - than they are the welfare of those they serve.

The completion of the demolition of the old brick school building was accomplished on Wednesday of last week and work is underway cleaning the bricks and removing the rubble prior to the filling of the old basement. The building was in use from mid-term in the 1912-13 school year until October of 1968 when the new junior high school building was occupied. This building served all of the grades until the completion of the high school in 1930, then as an elementary and junior high school building until the completion of the new elementary school building in 1963. All that remains of the old red brick school building is a pile of bricks, some stacked neatly on pallets after having been cleaned, the piles of broken bricks, and the pile of yet unsorted bricks. The ramp of the stairs can be seen at the right and the picture was taken from the west side of the building.

The action of the board in renewing the teachers' contracts was conditional for some that they complete required work toward full certification; and included reassignment of Mr. Eggleston as a classroom teacher.

Sanderson schools were dismissed Thursday and Friday of last week due to illness. The band went to Crane Friday and with the absences due to sickness, Supt. Ken McAllister deemed it advisable to dismiss the classes for the two days in hopes that the average daily attendance would not drop to a figure which would be detrimental to the state aid of which the average daily attendance is a factor.

The illness of high fever and upset stomach has hit students in all levels of the schools here with absences as high as 40 in one of the schools. The administration has been keeping a close watch on the daily attendance figures since the last part of the week before last when absences began to climb due to illness.

Hector Chalambaga placed second in the 440; Manuel Olivas was second in the 220; and Eulalio Ybarra was second in the mile; and Danny Galvan, Chalambaga, Emilio Martinez, and Olivas ran 4th in the 440 relay and 5th in the mile relay.

The freshman team was fifth in a field of seven which included another Class A school - Wink.

James Druse was first in the 70-yard high hurdles and tied the record - 10.0 seconds; he ran the 330 intermediate hurdles in second place.

Blain Chriesman was third in the shot and discus.

Damon Harrison was 6th in the high jump.

Texas Vehicle Inspection Deadline Only Month Away

AUSTIN - Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today reminded motorists that only one month remains before the 1969 motor vehicle inspection deadline.

To date, an estimated 2.8 million vehicles have received the inspection required by state law. The Department of Public Safety said some 3.2 million additional vehicles remain to be inspected prior to midnight, April 15.

Speir said 42.2 per cent of the vehicles inspected so far required mechanical adjustments prior to issuance of an inspection sticker. The defect found most often has been misalignment of headlights.

The Department of Public

Safety urged motorists to get the inspection soon to avoid long lines which will develop at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

Texas has 5,466 licensed inspection stations. The required inspection fee is \$1.75.

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
