Junior Trackmen 3rd In District

The junior high school track team was third in the district meet last weekend, finishing behind Rankin and Iraan in the tri-town event.

The Sanderson team won five first places and all times were records, since past records had been lost.

Juan Saenz was first in the 100 with a time of 30.4; Chago Flores was 4th.

Jim Cash won the pole vault with 9'6" and Robert Kline tied for 3rd and 4th.

Raymond Galvan won the 330 with a 40.1 clocking and Kline was 5th.

Kendrick Harrell, Flores, Galvan, and Saenz won the 440 relay at 49.1 and the mile relay with 3.27.

Cash was 4th in the 660 and Nelson Cooke was 6th; Ikey Billings was 2nd in the shot put and Cooke was 5th; Saenz, Flores, and Roger Sanchez finished 3rd, 4th, and 5th in the discus; Dennis Haynes was 3rd in the high jump; Harrell and Kline finished 5th and 6th in the low hurdles; and Saenz and Harrell finished 2nd and 4th in the long jump.

Coach Roger Goertz said he was well pleased with the performance of the boys in the meet and said he felt they should be an asset to the high school team next year.

Area Wool Growers Get \$508,072.19 In Incentive Checks

Terrell County sheep and goat raisers received \$508,072.19 in production incentive payments on 1968 wool and mohair sales when checks were mailed from the ASCS office in Alpine on April 10, according to Clarence Jessup, ASC committee chairman.

Eighty producers received \$354,534.35 on 965,597 pounds of shorn wool and 4,445,573 pounds of unshorn lambs. In addition, promotion deduction of 1 1/2¢ per pound on shorn wool and 7 1/2¢ per cwt. on unshorn lambs totaled \$21,465.11. The promotion deduction is administered by the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc., and is used to promote and increase the woolen market.

Seventy mohair producers this year received \$153,537.84 and they contributed 1 1/2¢ per pound on 465,510 pounds of mohair for the self-help program to promote mohair sales and use, for a total of \$6,981.15.

The 1968 incentive price for wool was 67¢ per pound. The national average price received by growers was 40 1/2¢. This necessitated a payment rate of 65.4% applied to the net return of the ranchman. The payment of incentive on the wool left on live lambs sold is based on the payment rate for shorn wool and this year amounted to \$1.06 per cwt.

The national average price for mohair in 1968 was 45.2¢ per pound in contrast to the desired price of 77.4¢; therefore the payment rate for mohair was 71.2%.

The mile relay team: Emilio Martinez, Hector Chalambaga, Danny Galvan, and Manuel Olivas, with Eulalio Ybarra as alternate went to the finals in their event, but did not place there.

Martinez was eliminated in the preliminaries in the 440-yard dash.

Barbara Brown placed second in feature writing and 4th in editorials; Candace Cooksey was 5th in copy writing in journalism events.

Results of the Ready Writing were not known. Gwyn Mansfield was the contestant.

Christine Downie won her first tennis match with a girl from Rotan, 3-6, 6-1, 7-5; to lose to a Junction girl 6-0, 6-0.

CANDACE COOKSEY MAKES ALL-STAR CAST AT ALPINE

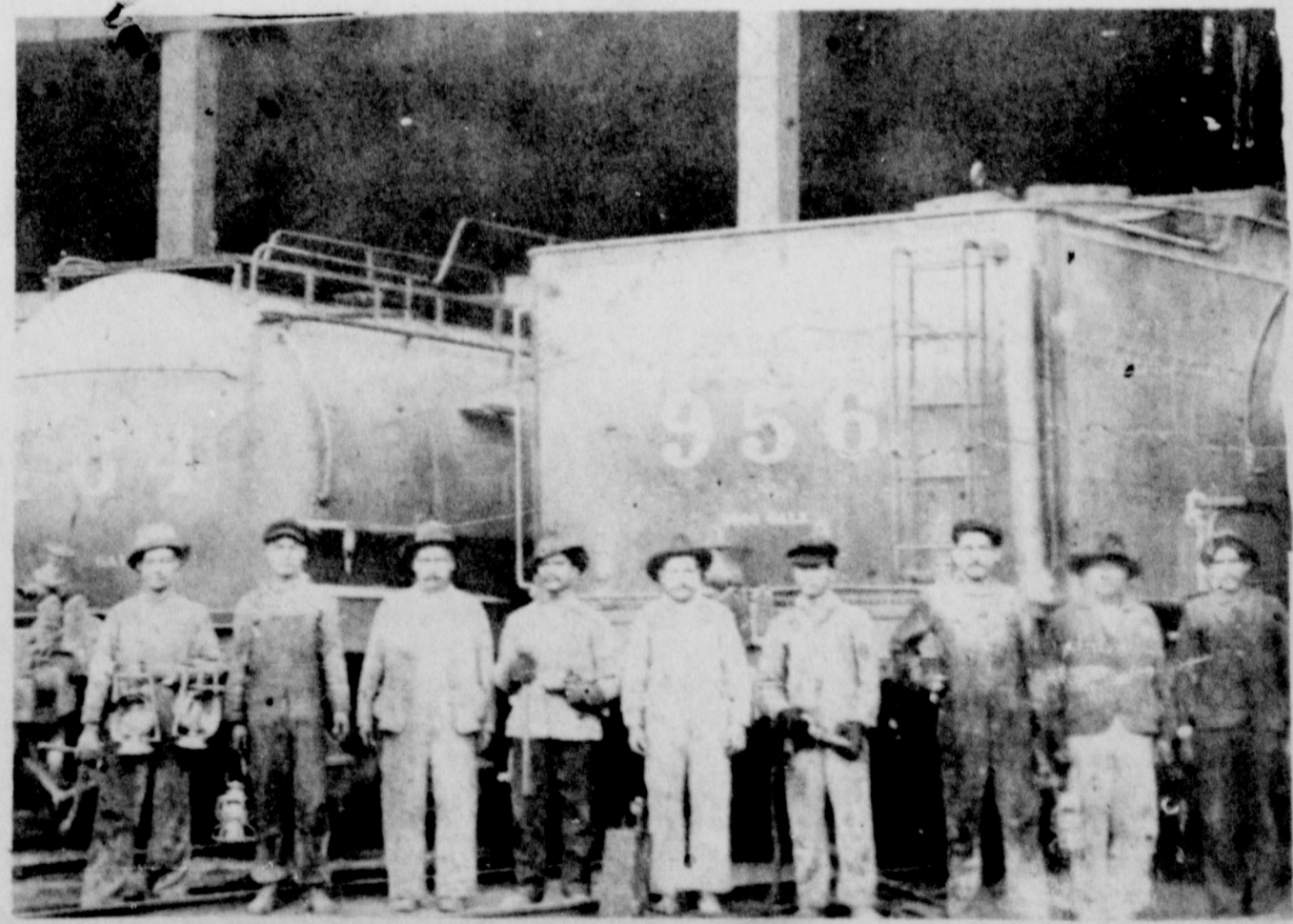
Candace Cooksey was named to the one-act play all-star cast following the production of "Six Pass While the Lentils Boil", in University Interscholastic League contests recently.

Mrs. Freida Noelke's Final Rites Sunday

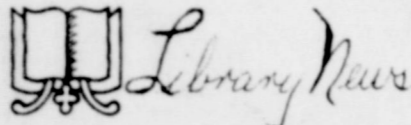

Roundup For Boys' Ranch Plans Revealed

Gene Newman, owner-operator of a Veribest food lot and co-owner of a feed mill will head the 10th annual West Texas Boys Ranch Roundup, the purpose of which is to raise funds for maintenance and operation of the ranch which has helped 600 boys grow into responsible and productive citizens. There are 86 boys in residence at the ranch now.

Funds necessary for the operation of the ranch are obtained from private citizens and businesses.

Newman outlined the plans for this year's roundup briefly: the roundup has been divided into three regions containing a total of 16 districts. Each district will have its own foreman and each county a wagon boss, the names of which will appear later.

Terrell County is in the third region, along with El Paso, Ector, Hudspeth, Culberson, Jeff Davis, Reeves, Presidio, Glasscock, Midland, Reagan, Upton, Brewster, Pecos, Loving, Winkler, Ward, and Crane Counties.

Region Three will conduct its drive from mid-July to November and will concentrate on livestock.

Morris H. Craig, executive director of the Ranch, stressed that Boys Ranch is not a correctional institution, but is a home with trained and understanding houseparents, supported by professional counselors and administrators.

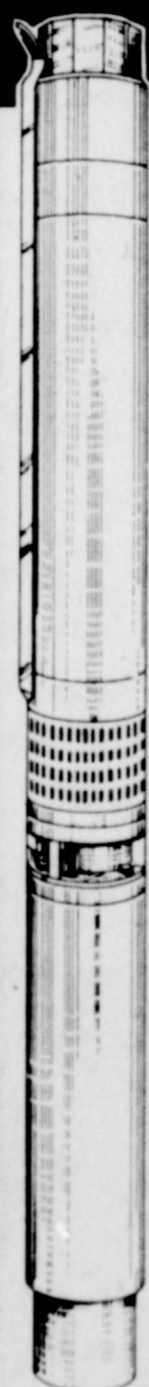

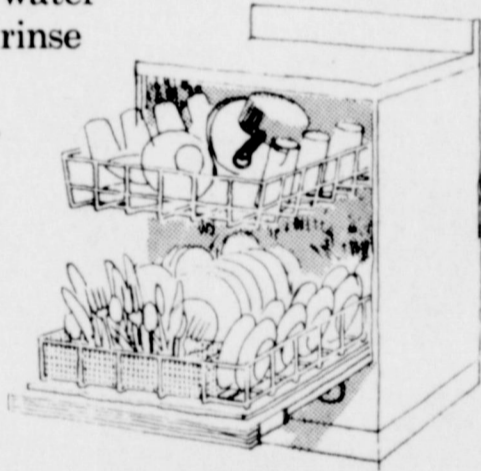
