LISTEN TO LUKE

Last week we were talking to a friend and found that we had mutual acquaintances in several instances with people who were childhood pals. It was fun to reminisce about some of our experiences.

One of the first things that we talked in the conversation was that when we went to visit someone for a weekend or a month the persons in whose home we visited had spanking privileges and that meant a whole lot to us to know that we knew that we were supposed to behave at home or take the consequences - which at times we thought were bad enough - but we knew that if we misbehaved away from home and our benefactors, or hosts, or temporary guardians and the spanking privileges were exercised there would be some more exercising at home, or the privilege of sitting denied, or some other type of punishment.

And we always would rather get punishment at home than away from home. It was easier to take because we always figured there was a little more compassion and love mixed in - you can say that - with the punishment we got at home.

But one of the reasons - we figure now - that we were punished at home was so that we would know what to do to stay out of - or get into - trouble when we went away from home. If there is stern, just, fair, and impartial discipline at home, then it helps a person to know that he might at least get the same type of discipline away from home, or could expect to, and this expectation might help him avoid trouble or punishment.

We never figured but what one of the punishments we got at home helped us to stay out of at least that much punishment when we were away from home. And the recollection of our last punishment and the fear of more of the same was one of the greatest curbs we had on our desire to do things we shouldn't. And we can recall also most vividly that when we were punished away from home, we were treated the same as the sons we were visiting, and for a dad to treat a visitor just like one of his own sons was some kind of compliment.

Last week, we purposely omitted any reference to the flood of June 11, 1965, to see what, if any reaction there was from our readers. And there was only one person who mentioned it to me.

Time heals many wounds, and that one, too, is being healed by time. Our own closeness to the tragedy, and our efforts toward the healing, with the help of the Eternal Presence, will determine how long and how seriously we are affected by the remembrance of the flood. But a pause to remember those of our friends who lost their lives in that tragedy should not hurt us.

.3" Rain, Some Hail Received Monday

Three-tenths of an inch of rainfall was received in the early-morning hours Monday, bringing the local total to .6-inch for the month.

Last week heavy hail was reported north of Sanderson in the C. C. Mitchell country with some damage to brush and weeds and up to one and one-half inches of rainfall also falling with the hail. There was no rainfall reported locally at that time.

Rains have been spotted and scattered during the recent "spell" with most of the rainfall coming to the north-central part of the county.

Clouds have prevailed over most of the county since Friday of last week with heavy overcasts and a trace of rain falling at various times.

Lamb Carcass Show Planned

SAN ANGELO—Roy Jacoby of Menard is going to be around San Angelo June 20-22 to help experts find the "missing" lamb. Jacoby is chairman of the second annual "Lamb With a Future" Carcass Show scheduled for those dates at the San Angelo Fairgrounds.

The show, designed to assist sheepmen in producing a more acceptable lamb for market, will consist of 30 groups of three lambs each from Texas and Colorado. Louis Coghill of Steamboat Springs, Colo., whose Suffolk's carried away the grand prize last year, will be returning for the second annual show.

Lambs must be in place at the stock show grounds by 5 p. m. on Thursday, June 19. The public is invited to the entire show. Live evaluation will be Friday morning, after which the lambs will be transferred to Armour and Company for slaughter.

Lambs will be sorted into sire groups by class, graded and the chilled weight obtained on Saturday morning. Carcass evaluation will be that afternoon at the Armour plant.

Carcasses will be on display at the Armour plant at 1 p. m. Sunday, June 22. A symposium will be held Sunday evening at Producers Livestock Auction to review the results of the show.

Drs. Zerle Carpenter and Frank Orts of Texas A&M and Dale Zinn of Texas Tech will be on the program, as well as Dr. Hudson Gilmp of Clay City, Neb.

Jacoby reports a sizable increase in the number of groups entered in this year's show and urges producers who are interested in producing a meatier, more profitable lamb to attend the show in San Angelo June 20-22. The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association is sponsoring the show.

The deepest producer is Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1-DD Gas Unit in the Gomez (Ellenburger gas) field of Pecos County, producing at 21,476-22,752 feet; and the second deepest, Gulf No. 1 Dalco-USM, in the same field, producing at 21,356-22,698 feet.

The deepest well ever drilled is Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1-EE, University, Pecos County, a 25,340-foot failure, abandoned in 1959.

The Texas Nuclear Science Symposium shows young scholars career opportunities in science

Each year we are pleased to send a number of high school science students and teachers, from the area we serve, to the Texas Nuclear Science Symposium in Austin. Here students receive an in-depth look at the field of science. Students and teachers are brought up to date on thermonuclear research that may some day lead to a more economical and efficient method of producing electric power. The symposium is sponsored by Community Public Service Company and other member companies of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation in cooperation with the University of Texas.

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Quail Season Established By Biological Mathematics

An often-asked question, "Why open quail season on the second Saturday of November?" is answered by Jack Parsons, wildlife supervisor of Region I of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. He explains it as a matter of simple biological mathematics.

Biologists strive to recommend season lengths and bag limits in accordance with the amount of hunting pressure a species may tolerate without harm to the reproductive potential of that species, and to prevent waste of game that should go into the hunter's bag.

A longer quail season will thus give participating hunters more time to harvest birds which would otherwise be lost to na-

tural mortality in any event.

Despite some mixed emotions over the possibility of hunting birds classified by some as "too young," Parsons says it is difficult to distinguish 90-day-old birds from adults.

From thousands of wing collections biologists have noted mid-July as the peak of the quail hatch in West Texas. This allows most birds to attain the 90-day age before November.

Several years' accumulated data from various parts of the State show from 89 to 98 percent of the quail are hatched prior to August 15. The Trinity Brazos, East Texas and South Central Texas areas vary from 89 to 91 percent young of the year hatched by the middle of August.

An eight year study in the Possum Kingdom Regulatory Area sets the same occurrence at 95 and 96 percent.

Parsons says that a 15-year mass of data from the Panhandle reveals as much as 98 percent of the hatch occurs before August 15. This provided huntable birds by the time season opens.

Quail mortality, he says, begins at the moment of hatch, and bird numbers decline from then on. In West Texas there is generally a fall population shuffle. One of the reasons for this is that some ranges supporting quail in summer will no longer do so in winter.
