LISTEN TO LUKE

The efforts of the Clarence Hallie Mulkey Post American Legion and Auxiliary and of the Sanderson Rodeo Club to provide entertainment for local area residents and visitors here should get the approval of everyone.

They all did a fine job and we are glad to note it.

The Legion and Auxiliary activities are "old hat" to so many that it has become the custom to expect them to continue their part of the celebration. And it's the same ones in the organization that over and over again each year are doing the work.

Someone, some of these days, is going to have to take over some of the chores of the older ones if it is going to continue.

Not that the older ones are not doing a good job, heaven knows that with their experience they should. But it is getting to be harder work with the years.

Since the board of equalization here last week with certain industrial tax representatives, it has come to the attention of the board members, school officials, and others, that there are certain facts that seem to need some clarification to the general public.

Concerning the teachers salaries and proposed salary increases due within the next 10 years, only a small portion of the present salaries comes from state aid and there is no provision for an increase in this supplement in the proposed 10-year raise program.

It was also pointed out that if the proposed raise and all of the present salaries were financed by state moneys, that this, too, would be raised on a local basis.

This explanation is in no way expressing or inferring an opposition to the present salary or a proposed pay scale raise for the teachers, but to offset or clarify rumors that the state is presently paying and will pay the proposed increase in salaries for teachers and this is not and will not be a burden to local taxpayers.

Whatever moneys are sent to local agencies for distribution or subsidization, they first are collected on the local level and if the state paid all of the financing of the school, it would first have to collect the money from taxpayers.

All local taxpayers were mailed a card last week notifying them that the likelihood of a 12% valuation raise existed and the date of the board of equalization meeting.

The other property taxpayers in the county had an increase of 12% and the raise in valuations of all properties, other than industrial, would only be expected.

This is in line with what we were talking about last week in the question: "How much taxes can you afford to pay?"

We have heard or seen no indication of a raise in valuations or tax rate by the county, but there are some things that need doing that could possibly take an increase in revenue to the county.

Equalization Board To Meet July 16

All property owning taxpayers in the county were mailed cards Thursday of last week to notify them of the meeting of the board of equalization at the Terrell County court house at 10:00 a. m. on Wednesday, July 16.

The card states that the board desires to raise the taxable value of all property in the district by 12%.

The board of equalization meets annually to set the values on taxable property within the county and the Board of Trustees of the Terrell County Independent School District sets the tax rate.

The valuations and the tax rates are set annually according to the needs of the school budget.

The budget figures are set by the school administration with the approval of the school board and the tax assessor-collector prepared the budget, grouping the items for simplification of understanding and explaining.

18,000-Foot Prospector Scheduled To Be Drilled In Terrell County

A deep wildcat was scheduled in Terrell County, and two wildcat re-entry operations in Runnels. Also a Menard confirmer was rescheduled as a confirmation to another field.

Roden Oil Co., Midland, will drill an 18,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Terrell County, 25 miles northeast of Sanderson, seven miles north of Forest Oil Corp. No. 1 Corinne R. Judkins, world's second deepest hole, which has set pipe for tests of the Devonian and Ellenburger, and 6½ miles northwest of the one-well K M (Ellenburger gas) field and five miles west-northwest of the one-well Little Canyon (10,100-foot Strawn gas) field. It is the No. 1-59 Mitchell.

Location, on a 640-acre lease, is 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of 59-1-CCSD&RGNG. Elevation is 2,756.

The No. 1 Judkins, in 66-1-CCSD&RGNG, drilled to 24,637 feet, reportedly encountered shows of possible gas production in the Devonian, topped at 21,429 feet; and encountered shows in the Ellenburger, topped at 23,529 feet, on derrick floor elevation of 2,611 feet.

The K M opener, Pan American Petroleum Corp. No. 1 Keith Mitchell, was finished Nov. 27, 1967, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 53.6 million cubic feet of gas per day from open hole at 17,410-18,644 feet.

The Little Canyon opener, Mobil Oil Corp. No. 1 George K. Mitchell was finished Dec. 3, 1963, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3.1 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 10,106-11,670 feet, however, official potential was not filed until Sept. 22, 1966.
