Bank Audits Now Include Checks On Loans, Accounts

Banking Commissioner J. M. Falkner has announced that the Texas Banking Department is expanding its examination procedures to include a program of direct verification of customers' deposit and loan balances in state-chartered banks in Texas. Verification forms will be sent to customers selected at random and they will be asked to verify the amount indicated.
 In the event of differences or discrepancies, further contact with the customer will be made by Banking Department personnel.
 "As well as being a means of discovery of bank employee error or misappropriations, verification programs provide a psychological deterrent against defalcations."
 "It is hoped that the banking public will not be unduly concerned upon the receipt of these requests for verification of its banking activities, and bankers are being asked to publicize the project in their locales," Falkner said.

Milestone Reached In Dam Project After Approval of Work Plan Monday

Another milestone was reached Monday of this week in the plans for providing flood protection for Sanderson. Final approval was given the work plan for the construction of the dams, their location, and all other work related to the flood control project.
 Approval was necessary before any further progress could be made in the project, and the necessary approval was by the sponsors of the project - the commissioners courts of Terrell, Pecos, and Brewster Counties, the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District, the Trans-Pecos Soil Conservation District, and the Big Bend Soil and Water Conservation District.
 Representatives of the sponsoring organizations met in Sanderson Monday for the approval of the plans.
 Darwin Schrader, local work unit specialist with the Soil Conservation Service, presided at the meeting.
 The Soil Conservation Service had prepared the work plan for the review of the sponsoring organizations and also was represented at the meeting for any

questions that might arise.
 The next step in the project is the presentation of the work plan to congress for allocation of funds for its completion.
 The total cost of the project is estimated to be \$4,880,161, with \$289,833 of this amount to be provided by local funds and the balance by federal appropriations.
 The project is set up on a 10-year program for construction and land treatment measures, with the latter being one of the reasons for the time needed to complete the project.
 Land treatment is the preparation of the land above and below the dam site to give maximum benefits to the water retaining structure, contributing directly to watershed protection and reduction of floodwater damage.
 Eleven structures are planned for the watershed: five on the 3-Mile Draw, and six on the Sanderson Canyon.

Court Decision Invalidates Law On Bond Voting

Texas Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr., said today that the United States Supreme Court's decision in a Louisiana case last week has invalidated a Texas law which restricts voting in revenue bond elections to property owners.

By statute the Secretary of State is the chief election officers of Texas and is responsible for obtaining and maintaining uniformity in the application, operation and interpretation of the state's election laws.

On Monday of last week the United States Supreme Court struck down a Louisiana law which gave only property taxpayers the right to vote in elections called to approve the issuance of revenue bonds by a municipal utility, on the ground that it violated the equal protection clause of the Federal Constitution because it excluded otherwise qualified voters who were as substantially affected and directly interest-

ed in the matter voted upon as those who were permitted to vote.

The Texas Constitution contains a provision that only qualified electors who own property which has been duly rendered for taxation are eligible to vote in an election for the purpose of issuing bonds. The Supreme Court of Texas has interpreted this provision as applying to elections for issuing public utility bonds which are to be retired from revenues produced by the utility, as well as to elections for issuing bonds to be retired by levy of a property tax.

Secretary Dies said that the property ownership requirement could no longer be imposed in future elections for issuance of revenue bonds. He pointed out that the United States Supreme Court's decision applies only to revenue bond elections and that the court has not ruled on the validity of a property ownership requirement in a tax bond election.
