Workers are putting the final touches on the huge Amistad Dam, but the international project located 12 miles north of Del Rio is not expected to be dedicated until Sep-

The September date is being given primarily because that's probably the soonest President Richard Nixon and Mexico's President Gustavo Diaz Ordaz can get together for the dedication ceremony.

Officials here point out that both the U.S. and Mexican sides have completed work on the immigration offices, but immigration officers are not expected to start operation of the offices until the dedication is held.

John J. Feira, head of the Perini Corporation, one of our U.S. contractors, said work on the highway spanning the dam may be completed in two weeks. No target date for completion






