There was a light vote for the amendments on Tuesday as was expected and the outcome was about as predicted. As usual in such elections, we feel that there should have been more interest expressed by all of the qualified voters, because there really was a lot at stake and the outcome was not the will of the majority of the "vox populi".

Funny, we should think of that phrase! Remember that the Liberty magazine of many years back? Their letters from readers had that as a heading.

And speaking of magazines of the past, surely you have noticed the absence of so many that were once popular periodicals through the mails. Cosmopolitan, Collier's, Holland's Liberty, Saturday Evening Post, Ladies' Home Journal, just to name a few.

We wonder if things are really as they seem to be, or if they say they are in the postal department. We have made two official gripes and there was some immediate action in relief, but we figure that it's a losing battle. And maybe that's the way the postal department wants us to figure it.

Almost all of our incoming first class mail comes from El Paso, and most of our incoming first class mail originates in the east. This means that we are a day late in getting our first-class mail from the east and south since it goes through here one day to El Paso and back the next. The reason being that with or without the ZIP code - which is supposed to speed up the handling of mail our letters are consigned to the 798 Sectional Center Facility which is El Paso.

The exception to this is letters mailed this side of San Antonio and put in the pouch assigned to Sanderson. They all come on the truck directly and speedily.

Routine gripes are those that consistently show Friday's San Antonio Evening News delivered Monday morning and coming in from the west; letters from Corpus Christi delivered after three or four days and coming in finally from the west. Some letters that originate in San Antonio and Houston, Atlanta, Ga., etc., coming in from the west. And after one week's checking, what is odd is that not one single piece of first-class mail came to us on the mail truck from San Antonio, all of the first class mail for us was from El Paso.

Anyone can guess at the reasons, and one guess is as good as the other.

There are certainly many tons of mail moved daily across our state and the people who handle it have their hands full, but we still get our first class letters a day late from the other side of San Antonio.

The final days of the summer are drawing to a close, and as usual, we didn't get done near everything we had planned to do this summer. School will be starting before we really are ready for it. But that is the way

## ASC Committee Election Slated

One member of the Terrell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee will be elected in a mail election which closes September 17. Members are elected for 3-year terms in alternating years. The member whose term expires this year is Clarence Jessup.

The term of Herbert Brown is for two more years and Lee Dudley has one more year.

A slate of nominees will be selected by the present committee. Other names may be added by petition. Petitions must be limited to one nominee each, signed by at least six eligible voters in the county, and must be received in the county office - Box 397, Alpine, Texas) by August 22.

To be eligible to serve on the county committee a person must be engaged in ranching in Terrell County, must reside in the county, must be willing to serve, and should be qualified for committee work. The person should, of course, be an eligible voter.

Ballots will be mailed to all eligible voters about September 7.

The time of the public tabulation will be announced later.

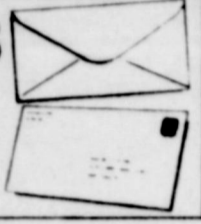

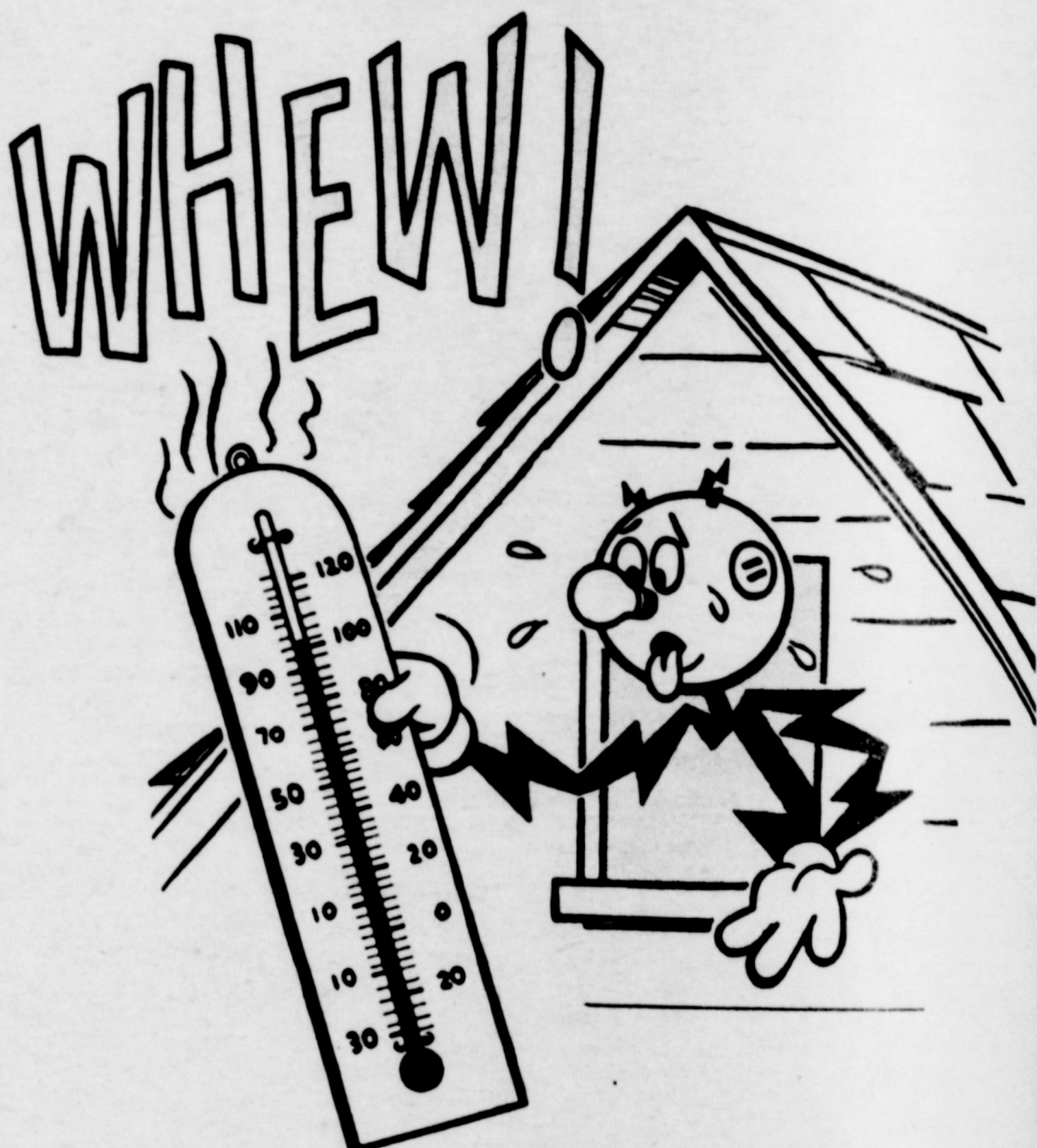

So when you look at your electric service bill, remember all the extra hours I worked. I'm still your lowest-cost servant and the more hours I work, the less I cost per hour.
