



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

Prohibiting the use motor vehicles in parking reas to race the motor to cause loud noise, to hold a contest r speed, to disturb the peace; rohibiting fighting, use of loud, lgar or indecent language, litring or loitering without con-ent, by individuals in parking teas. Effective 9-1-69. S.B. 143. Makes it a felony

vice erected by public authority. and after so stopping, may only proceed thereafter when such driver may safely enter the in-tersection without interference or collision with traffic using such different street or road-Way.

(b) The driver of a vehicle on a single lane or street or roadway, or a street or roadway consisting of only two traffic lanes, upon approaching the intersection of a paved roadway shall stop, yield and grant the privilege of immediate use of such intersection to any vehicle on such paved roadway which is within the intersection or approaching such intersection in such proximity thereto as to constitute a hazard, and after so stopping may only proceed thereafter when such driver may safely enter the intersection without interference or collision with traffic using such paved street or roadway.

(c) The driver of a vehicle approaching the intersection of a different street or roadway, not otherwise regulated herein, or controlled by traffic control signs or signals, shall stop, yield and grant the privilege of immediate use of such intersection to any other vehicle which has entered the intersection from such driver's fight or is approaching such intersection from such driver's right in such proximity thereto as to constitute a hazard and after so stopping may proceed thereafter when such driver may safely enter such intersection without interference or collision with traffic using such different street or roadway.

(d) A driver obligated to stop and yield the right of way in accord with Sections a.b.c. and d. of Section 71, who is involved in a collision or interferes with other traffic at such intersection is presumed not to have yielded the right of way as required by this Act.

S.B. 74. Implied Consent Law. Under this law all motorists are "deemed to have given consent" to a breath test if any officer has probable cause to believe such person is operating a motor vehicle under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Provides procedure to follow when the person fails to submit to a breath test. States DPS has responsibility to certify breath tests. Also allows defendant to have his own physician, technician etc. of his own choosing take a blood alcohol test if taken within two hours of his arrest. Effective 9-1-69.

S.B. 7. To require every owner of a motor vehicle, trailer. semi-trailer, pole trailer, or mobile home, registered in this state and operated on the highways of this state, to have brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, front seat belts where anchorages were installed as part of permament equipment, steering (in-

cluding power steering), wheels and rims, exhaust system and exhaust emission system, 4,000 pounds or above on trailers, semi-trailers, pole trailers and mobile homes before inspection certificates . equired. Effective 9-1-69.

S.B. 78. Exempts any person whose license expires while he is in military service in the ar med forces of the US in Southeast Asia. Exempted for 90 days after discharge from service. Effective immediately.


H.B. 217. Regulates length of vehicles. Maximum 40 feet on a motor vehicle. Allows 65 feet on combinations of truck and semitrailer, truck and trailer, trucktractor and semi-trailer and trailer, truck-tractor and two trailers. (Note: A pick-up can pull a folddown camper and boat trailer combination. Passenger car can not.) Maximum length on mobile home and motor vehicle is 55 feet.

H.B. 141. Makes it a misder; meanor for any person or group of persons to engage in certain disruptive activities or disrupting a lawful assembly on the campus or property of private or public schools or institutions. Effective 9-1-69.

H.B. 1450. Fine up to \$1,000 or jail not to exceed six months for interfering with normal activities, normal occupancy or normal use of any building on a campus by exhibiting or using or threatening to exhibit or use a firearm. Effective 9-1-69. H.B. 57. Replaces Texas' Art. 474 of the Penal Code, the Disturbing the Peace statute, with a statute defining "disorderly conduct." There are 11 different types of disorderly conduct. The statute attempts to cover all types of disorderly conduct that would tend to alarm or provoke a disturbance, including boisterous language, interfering with public buildings, blocking hallways, personally abusing or assaulting other people, engaging in violent, indecent profane, boisterous or loud language; willful or malicious behavior which interrupts any speaker of a lawful assembly or impairs the lawful rights of others to participate effectively in such assembly; behavior near a courthouse that interferes with judicial proceedings, or any public building, etc., on down to covering the activities of a "Peeping Tom" - punishment on conviction for 1st offense is a fine up to \$200. 2nd offense \$100 to \$1,000 fine or up to 30 days in jail.



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
