Car Straddles Rail On US 285 Bridge 3 Miles North

Mrs. Dolly Miller Hurlwood, 31, of Odessa, narrowly escaped serious injury when the car she was driving straddled a guard rail leading to the bridge across 3-Mile Draw, just north of Sanderson on US 285 and rode about half-way across the bridge before falling into the draw. It is the No. 1 Skelly-University.

Location, on a 647.4 acre lease, is 2,180 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 1-35-University.



The traditional deer and turkey season in regulatory authority counties begins on the second Saturday of November which this year falls on Nov. 8 - the earliest possible date in the month a second Saturday could fall. By the same token, next year's season will begin on Nov. 14 - the latest date

tional hour of hunting daily because of the Daylight Savings Time. Last year dove hunters could start blasting away at 12 noon Central Standard Time or 1 p.m. Daylight Saving Time. This was eliminated from the Federal guidelines this year and in effect dove hunters can begin shooting an hour earlier. Several standard changes were approved for all counties under regulatory authority. Of major importance was the postponement of setting this year's quail seasons and bag limits until the September Commission meet. Biologists said July 9 was too

early to set the seasons when

many factors could still influ-

ence this year's population.

The following was added to all regulatory districts:" a deer tag and evidence of sex shall remain on deer carcasses while on storage and shall remain with the carcass until reaching its final destination. Final destination shall be the permanent residence of the hunter or a commercial processing facility where the deer is finally processed. Antlers with tag attached shall be accepted as evidence of sex of a buck deer. A foreleg with an antlerless deer permit and hunting tag attached shall be accepted as evidence of a legal antlerless deer." This does not prohibit a hunter from skinning out a deer in the field and defines evidence of sex.

Mourning dove season will be Sept. 1 through Oct. 30 in the North Zone and Sept. 20 through Nov. 16 in the South Zone except in those counties having a white-winged hunt where it will be Sept. 6-7 and from Sept. 20 through Nov. 16.

Bag limit on both species will be 10 per day and 20 in possession. A bag and possession limit of both species will be permitted during the concurrent season, Shooting hours for dove will be 12 noon local time to sunset,
