Fewer School Pupils Enrolled This Year

Enrollment at the Sanderson schools is down again this year from 484 to 429. The figures were taken after the first day of school and may change only slightly during the first week.

There are 27 enrolled in the pre-school course and the following figures show the enrollment by grades in the three buildings:

There are nine pupils in special education classes in the junior high school not included in the figures above, but are included in the average daily attendance. The pre-school pupils are not figured in the average daily attendance figures for state aid.

Deep Hole In Terrell Still Tests

Forest Oil Corp. No. 1 Corinne R. Judkins, in 66-1-CCSD&RGNG, Terrell County wildcat and the world's second deepest hole, 22 miles northeast of Sanderson, was testing the Devonian after failing to develop production from the Ellenburger.

Operator acidized Ellenburger open hole at 24,012-637 feet with 5,000 gallons and left open one hour. There was no gas. Reversed out was an unreported amount of gas-cut mud and acid water.

Operator plugged back to 23,938 feet, perforated opposite the Ellenburger from 23,388-920 feet and acidized with 8,400 gallons. Opened for 80½ hours, recovery was 209 barrels of load water with gas volume too small to measure. There were 220 barrels of load water left in the Ellenburger.

Operator then plugged back to 23,336 feet, perforated opposite the Devonian at 21,324-446 feet and acidized with 5,000 gallons. The project flowed a small amount of gas and load water. There were 115 barrels of load water remaining to recover.

The project was spudded in August 1967 and reportedly had encountered shows or possible gas production in the Devonian and Ellenburger.

The world's deepest hole is Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1-EE University, Pecos County 25,340-foot wildcat failure abandoned in 1959.

The Sanderson Eagle football team has a full schedule of 10 games for the coming season which begins on September 12. The last five games are in district competition and the tilts are evenly divided at home and away.

Socorro, just east of El Paso, comes to Sanderson this year, traveling almost 300 miles for the local game.

Imperial, Grandfalls, Balmorea, and Brackettville are all Class B schools and Marfa is in Class AA, showing the spectrum of competition within schools of Class A ratings.

Hunting Seasons Next Month

Mourning dove season is September 1 - October 30. Shooting hours are noon to sunset. A special season on white-winged doves will be held in 20 counties along the Rio Grande River, including Jeff Davis, Presidio, Brewster and Terrell counties in the immediate area. That season will be on September 6 and 7.

The daily bag limit on both mourning and white-winged doves this year is 10, with a possession limit of 20. The daily limit was lowered from 12 last year due to a nationwide shortage of the bird. Shooting hours are limited to the afternoon to double the season from the legal maximum of 30 days to 60 half-days.

with a bag limit of four in the aggregate, not more than one a buck mule deer, not more than two buck whitetailed deer, and not more than three antlerless deer. Antlerless deer may be taken by permit only.

The javelina season opens September 1 and concludes January 31, with a bag limit of two per season.

The deer season in the Trans-Pecos area opens November 29 and concludes December 14. A special deer season for archers has been set for Octo-

ber 1-16. Antelope season is October 4 through 12, with a bag limit of one per season, with permit required.

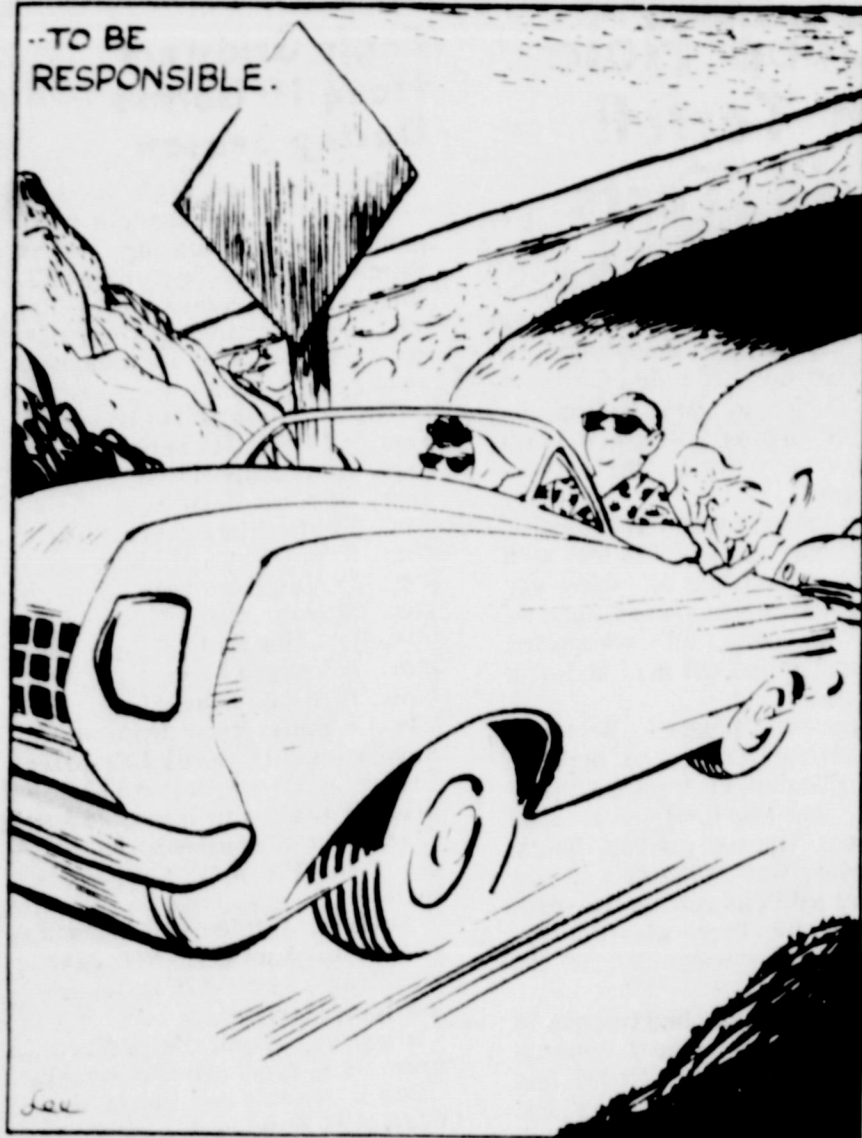

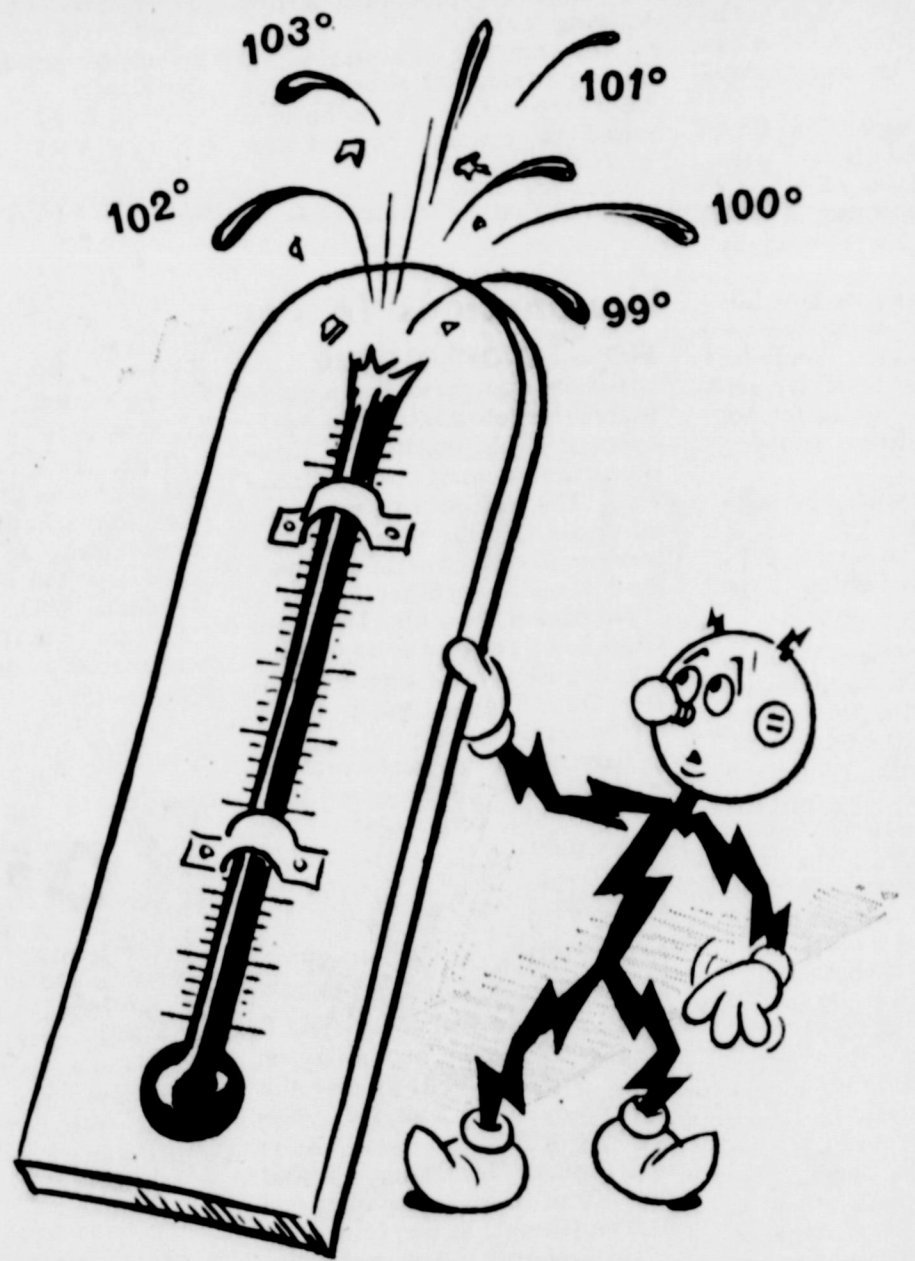

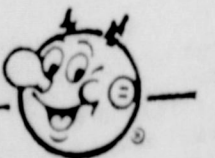

ARTIFICIAL KIDNEY WORKS FOR MRS. McFADIN'S KIN

The brother of Mrs. C. A. McFadin survived two kidney transplants, both failures, and is now living at home - thanks to an artificial kidney which he has taken to Denver City.

He was hospitalized continuously for eight months, had nine operations and finally was declared to have irreversible kidney disease.

After an intensive training period in using the machine, Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Slemmons went to their home in Denver City and a technician accompanied them with the machine to be sure of its proper operation and use.

To date there are 25 patients in Texas living with the aid of an artificial kidney secured through the Chronic Home Dialysis Center in Galveston funded by the University of Texas Medical Branch and the U. S. Public Health Service.
