#### **Diversion Plan For** Sanderson Canyon Talked By Schrader

by Darwin G. Schrader It has been proposed by some

Sanderson residents that Sanderson Canyon be diverted into Isinglass Canyon by cutting through a hill on the Gregory ranch about 10 miles west of Sanderson. While this idea has some merit, the following facts should be considered:

1. The difference in elevation from the lowest point in the saddle of the hill to the bottom of Sanderson Canyon is over 80 feet;

2. The length of the most practical route for a diversion would be over 8,000 feet;

3. This would divert only 53% of the drainage of Sanderson Canyon. It would leave Sanderson Canyon unprotected from all of the tributaries of Sanderson Canyon east of the point of diversion including 3-Mile

4. It would offer no protection to the land, railroad, and highway above the point of di-

Schrader also pointed out that the most recent flood-scare to Sanderson was due to rainfall below this point, adding credence to the over-all plan of flood-control structures over the entire watershed.

The Sanderson Eagles demonstrated a polished and refined ability here Friday night against the Brackettville Tigers to take the game by a 44-6 score.

The Eagles dominated play throughout the game and there was a liberal use of substitution during the second half and in the final quarter, the Eagle coaches used all of the players who had been able to suit out. James Druse, who had been the starting quarterback, was out of the game due to a pulled muscle sustained in practice during the week and he was replaced by Santiago Flores, back-up quarterback, who ran the team efficiently and demonstrated a pass attack that gives the Eagles a depth in the stellar spot that poses a threat to all opposition.

Brackettville put together a drive in the fourth period that netted their touchdown play, but were unable to get anything going otherwise.

Their dependence on a passing game lost them the ball on several occasions, one of which was an interception and return for a touchdown by Mack Tur-

The Tigers received the first kick-off and punted on their 4th down from their 14. The Eagles began their first offensive series from the Tiger 29 and made their first touchdown from the 12 on a pass from Flores to Turner when Olivas ran over. The final Eagle tally was on a sustained drive and Olivas ran over from the 1-foot line with Flores scoring the two points conversion on a pass-option run around the right end.



#### Mrs. Alice Turner Interred In Del Rio


