The game gave Sanderson their second loss of the season. Sanderson received the opening kick-off and fumbled the ball on the third play, giving

Van Horn the ball on Sanderson's 21-yard line. Van Horn's first play took the ball to the 1 and from there Je-

sus Valdez ran over for the TD.

He also booted the extra point. Following the ensuing kickoff and a first down to the 43, Sanderson had a pass intercepted by Joe Nobles of Van Horn and he ran to the 15. Three plays later Valdez scored again, this time from the 2 and kicked the

extra point again. In their third try with the ball Sanderson started on their 40 after a 35-yard run-back of the kick-off by Manuel Olivas. On their 4th down effort, needing only a yard, the defense keyed on Olivas who got the ball from Santiago Flores, the starter at quarterback, and Sanderson lost the ball on downs. In their offensive series Van Horn scored, with Valdez again getting the honors from the 4. His PAT kick effort was no good and Van Horn had 20 points.

A Sanderson fumble of a Van Horn punt gave the visitors the ball for the fourth time in the opening period.


