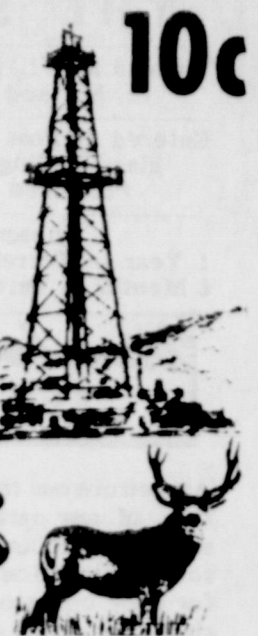
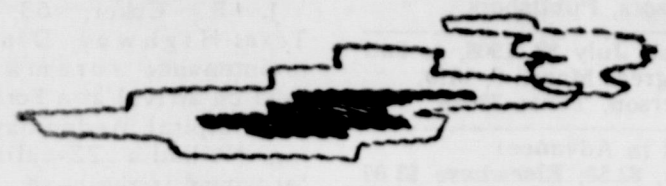

## LISTEN TO LUKE

Albert:--  
 The Sanderson football team themselves real proud last night with their win over Rankin and wound up their season in a blaze of glory. Everyone in this area, fans and players alike - with the exception of the Sanderson Eagles - knew that Rankin was poised to win that game. But because the Eagles didn't know it contributed much to their ability to win. Determination is a wonder-thing to have, and it is also to reach down into one's guts and come up with what is needed for a particular occa-

sion. The action of the fans and players at this and all other times has been commendable and respect has been earned and recognized all over the district for the Sanderson team and fans. This, too, should be a source of pride for all of us.

Each Willie Myers and the assistant coaches Tommy Hall, Don Malone and the young men who have worked in the building of the team have done a good job by re-building the team with some pride and character and lasting and good quali-

ties. The band, under the direction of Mrs. Darwin Schrader, has done a stellar job in their presentation of half-time shows during the season, and the pep leaders, too, have helped in maintaining a high and enthusiastic attitude in the fans. The anxiety of the fans and their reaction to the excitement of the game varies from year to year and it is interesting to see the interest generated from time to time. It is noticeable, too, that there are many fans here who have supported the team for many years who have never had - or who had no sons on the team several years, while others have a completely different attitude toward the game - some are intensely interested and some with complete indifference. But this is what makes the game - even football fans - interesting.

The same thing is true with basketball - the season which is ending this week. We will see some fans there that we have been seeing there for the past 22 years, and we will see new faces - each of which are a joy to us. We like the closeness of the fans to the game of basketball, but this can be a source of difficulty under the wrong conditions. We have been to games where the fans gave the opposing team and/or the officials a hard time and this can be a bad thing - sometimes resulting in the suspension of a team from intercollegiate league competition.

We hope that the same type of sportsmanship we have seen in the players and fans during the past season will prevail in the basketball season to cause a regeneration in the pride that has been built up so far this year.

## Eagles Stun Rankin With 26-21 Win To Wind Up 1969 Football Season

The Sanderson Eagles stunned the Rankin Red Devils and fans there with a 26-21 win in their final game of the season. It gave Sanderson a 2-3 record in district competition and Rankin wound up with a 3-2 record. Manuel Olivas ran 18 yards to pay dirt for the opening TD and this was soon countered by a 20-yard pass play into the end zone and conversion of an extra point by the Devils. Rankin made another 7 points in the second period on a 2-yard

play and another kick conversion. Mac Turner caught a James Druse pass which netted another score for Sanderson and Olivas ran over 2 points extra to tie the score at half-time. Rankin went ahead again in the third period when the quarterback, Adam Pina, rode in from 3 yards out and Dean Pittsworth booted his second extra point. The lead was short-lived as Olivas took the ensuing kick-off 80 yards for a score to close the score gap to 21-20. The try for the extra point failed. The winning score for Sanderson was in the fourth period when Manuel Salas recovered a fumble in the end zone and the extra point try again failed. Sanderson fans who attended the game were highly impressed by the determination demonstrated by the Eagles on every play.

## Higinio Pena, 69, Dies In Alpine After Long Illness

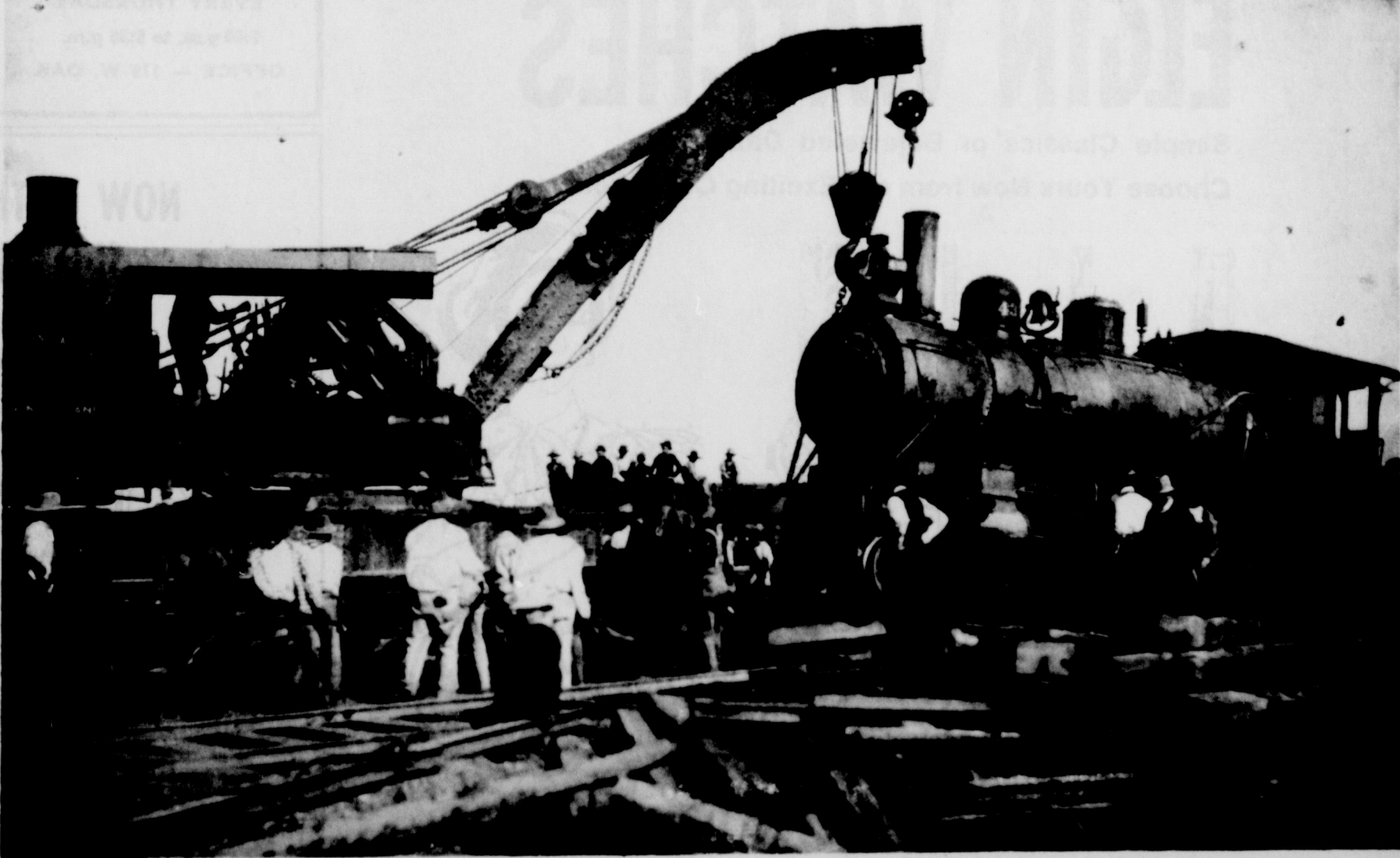
Funeral rites were in the St. James Catholic Church Saturday afternoon for Higinio Pena, 69, who died Thursday in an Alpine hospital where he had been a patient for five days. Rev. Ted McNulty officiated at the rites and burial was in the Santa Rita Cemetery directed by the Geeslin Funeral Home of Alpine. He was born in San Vicente on January 11, 1900, and was married to Vicenta Bravo on September 23, 1932, in Sanderson. He was employed by the Southern Pacific Railroad here in the water service from 1919 until 1959. He had been in failing health for a number of years. Besides his widow, he is survived by a son, Higinio Pena Jr., of Alpine; three daughters, Mrs. Sylvestre Silvas and Mrs. Ramona Olivares of Sanderson and Mrs. David Hernandez Jr. of Casa Grande, Ariz.; a sister, Mrs. Eulalio Rios of Sanderson; three brothers, Juan and Leonardo Pena of Sanderson and Clemente Pena of Andrews; also 12 grandchildren.

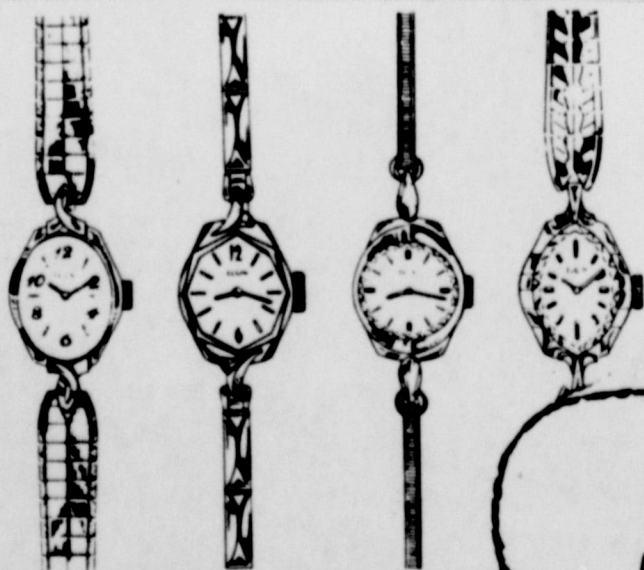


