E.W 'Pappy' Meeks Phone Rates **Dies In Del Rio**, **Funeral Last Week**

Erin W. (Pappy) Meeks, 71, a former Sanderson resident died early last Wednesday morning in a Del Rio hospital where he had been a patient for a few days. He had been residing in San Angelo two years but had recently moved to Del Rio to make his home with a niece.

Funeral services were in the First United Methodist Chruch in Sanderson Saturday morning and the body was taken to Marathon for interment. Rev. Albert Peak, pastor, officiated at the rites and the Geeslin Funeral Home of Alpine was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Meeks was born November 11, 1898, in Florida. He was a Navy veteran of World War 1, a member of the Legion post at Marathon, and of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. He was a retired engineer for the Southern Pacific Railroad.

His wife, the former Nancy Pearl Kyle, preceded him in Mrs. Paul Dunagan of San Angelo, two grandsons and a brother, Earl Meeks of Huntsville, Ark.

Upped Here

New telephone rates for Sanderson customers became effective Sunday December 21.

"Southwestern Bell had not increased telephone rates for several years despite rising costs, " said Bob Hurt, manager for the company. "However, continuing hikes in the cost of business operations have necessitated the rate increase for Sanderson. "

Basic rates for one and two party residence service have not changed, Hurt said, although the monthly charge for a residence extension phone went from \$1 to \$1.25.

The one party business rate increased to \$11. It had been \$8.75. The rate for a business extension phone went to \$1.75 from \$1.50.

Rates for both eight party business and residential service went up also, Hurt pointed out. Within five miles of an exchange area boundary, the rural rates now are \$8.80 for a business phone and \$4.25 for a residence line.

Beyond the five mile area, customers will pay the basic rural rates, plus applicable mileage charges.
