Between the sound barrier breaking and the dynamiting at the track field, local residents have been getting their share of explosions during the past week. A lot of dirt is being moved at the field and the dynamiting makes that job much easier. Head-way is being realized.

Some have said that they are not building a track field, they are carving one out.

Much of the dirt has been put in the area where the drive and bleacher units were on the north side of the field and future plans include some more changes for the sake of those who go to the field as spectators of football games or track meets.

The fund for the building of the field house is nearing the goal set by the Eagle Boosters and the project of raising the money is expected to be completed shortly. Work will then begin on the building to house dressing rooms, showers, and office space for the coaches of the events. The facility will be used as a dressing room and showers for local and visiting teams during football season and track season.

There has been a lot of interest expressed by several people over the prospects of a dentist coming to Sanderson every other week and we certainly hope that this plan develops into a reality. Nothing concrete was expected to develop over night as there was much pencil and paper work to be done in figuring the feasibility of the plan and then getting an office equipped to do the work. It all takes time.

There is a continuation again of talk about moving the railroad terminal. This story re-occurs periodically and has since about 1883. Up to now, each time the story has been re-started it ended up in some sort of stand-off, by-pass, or postponement, or was simply a rumor in the first place.

There is every chance that one of these times when the story gets started there will be just such a thing occur. That is a well-known fact that everyone here has faced ever since they came to Sanderson.

One fellow said the other day - and he wasn't joshing - that when he came to Sanderson over 50 years ago they were planning to move the terminal then. He said that the rumor was so strong, in fact, that they even had the tracks laid on which to move it!

Well, those tracks are still there - ready to move the terminal - if the need for it ever arises in the opinion of the railroad officials who control those decisions. Until the terminal is moved, however, it is like having good health or a good meal, or anything else you would use as a simile, it's good while it lasts and let's enjoy it while we can.

There are those who have always thought that such a move was inevitable at some future date. There have always been those, too, who said it could never happen - since it could not happen without the consent

Down 59 Pupils

The school census for Terrell County reveals 467 scholastics between the ages of 6 and 18 on or before September 1, 1970. Of that number 35 will be in the six-year old group. There are 246 boys and 221 girls.

This is 53 lower than the census figures from last year.

The census was taken during the month of January by A. J. Riess, elementary school principal.

Voter Registration
Lags From '69

There are 796 voters registered in Terrell County this year, according to Mrs. A. J. Hahn, deputy tax collector-assessor. January 31 was the last day for registration.

There were 844 registered voters in the county last year and this is a sizeable increase from 576 voters in the previous year.

Besides the party primaries and general election this year, there also will be an election in April for school trustees and members of the county school board.

Highway Work
Slated for US90
For 7.1 Miles East

Work is slated for the reconstruction of grade, structures, surfacing on U.S. 90 from Sanderson for 7.1 miles east at an estimated cost of \$905,000. Paul H. Coleman, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department in Odessa, stated that the program covers the actual construction work and the purchase of any needed right-of-way.

The project will be placed under contract as the plans are completed and the necessary right-of-way has been acquired by the county, according to Mr. Coleman.

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Girl Scout Cookie Sale Starts Feb. 13

Doorbells will be ringing city-wide on Friday, February 13 when the Girl Scouts start their annual cookie sale. Junior, Cadette, and Senior Girl Scouts will be marching from door to door selling four varieties of cookies this year - assorted sandwich, mint, butter-flavored, and peanut-butter sandwich. All cookies are 50c per box.

From the sale of each 50c box of cookies, the Scout retains a nickle for her own troop's treasury. After the manufacturer has been paid the remainder of the proceeds go to the Permian Basin Girl Scout Council. The funds are used to maintain building and improve facilities at Camp Mitre Peak, Alpine, Texas; Hat A Ranch, Bakersfield, Texas; and Day Camps throughout the Council. The funds also provide camping equipment for Day Camping, Troop Camping, and special encampments.

A special incentive for each young saleswoman is an opportunity, through her cookie sales, to earn her way to camp. "Three cartons per girl" is this year's slogan.

The annual cookie sale is the only council-wide project that enables the Girl Scouts in all sixteen counties to help support their own program. It is an endeavor that can provide camping facilities for all Scouts on a "do-it-myself" selling basis that reaches into every home interested in helping the Girl Scouts to help themselves.

This year's cookie sale lasts from February 13 through February 22. Won't you, please, when a Girl Scout comes to your door, buy a box or a case - every cookie is a reminder that you helped Girl Scouts become Good Scouts!

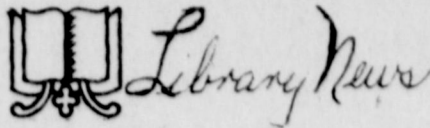

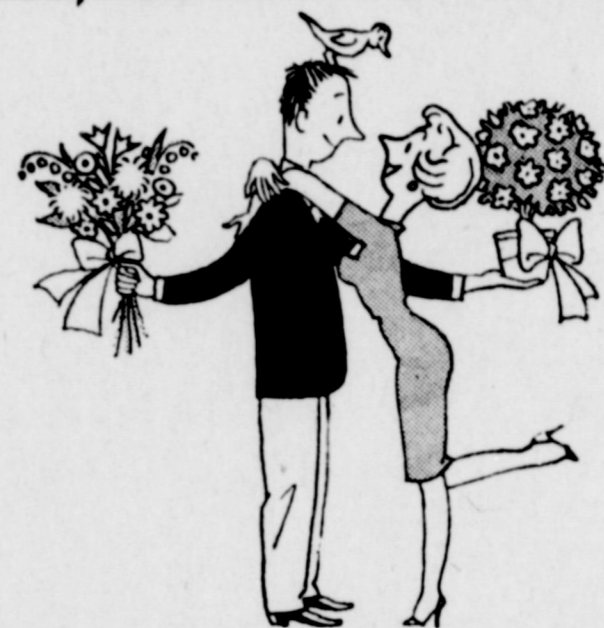

MVI Deadline Is April 15th

With the State's April 15 motor vehicle inspection deadline approximately 70 days away, large numbers of Texas motorists have yet to take their vehicles in for mandatory annual safety inspection.

The Committee will make its recommendations on ways for Texas to reach its full potential in the development of parks and recreation areas to the 62nd Legislature when it convenes in January, 1971.
