One of the interesting figures e have noticed recently concerns the eligible voters in the county now and in 1960. There were then 779 voters who had paid their poll taxes and some unknown number in addition who were eligible to vote but were exempt from the poll tax because of being over or under age. The number of registered voters

in the county this year is 796. It would seem that the population of the county has decreased since 1960 a little bit, but the number of voters seems to be pretty close to the same. There could be reams of column copy written on the possibilities "why", but suffice it to say that these are the figures and you can go from there with your own reasons.

Another figure that intrigues us - number that is - is the one concerning the school census figures now and in comparison with 1960. There were then 683 students enumerated in the county. This year there are 467, or a drop of 216 in the past 10 years, this is almost 1/3 by new or old math.

Another connection with this figure that is interesting is the cost of education now for this number of local students and the cost for the education then of our enrollees in institutions of learning. The drop in scholastics is not reflected in the voter registration by any means, and if one would consider that the drop of scholastics was commensurate with a decrease in adult population in the county then there should have been some kind of a voter decrease.

Taking a figure of an average of three children to the family, the decrease in scholastics represents 72 families or 144 adults, add these two together adults and children - and we get a decrease in population of about 360 people in the county during the past 10 years. This is a figure based on really nothing tangible and is only for speculation and column-writing.

The real population of the county will be known after the census figures come out follow ing this year's count.

Skeletal Remains Are Identified

The skeletal remains that were found recently in Sanderson Canyon just east of town were positively identified, according to Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey. The remains were those of a Negro male, whose skeleton was found earlier on the F. J. Barrett ranch.

Following the first finding of the skeleton the hands were removed since there was some mummified skin intact which could possibly leave identifiable prints. These prints were used for positive identification and the relatives contacted to notify them of the death of the man. They requested that the remains be buried locally. The polyethylene bag used to bury the remains was mistakenly identified as a black raincoat and the body was disinterred by the flood in 1965. The original find of the skeleton occurred many months after death and the remains were scattered to some degree at that time. The findings of the pathologists following the recent search noted the removal of the hands, but otherwise identified the remains as a male, were within one year of his true age, and 1/2-inch of his height.

Sheriff Cooksey stated the pathologists asked permission to keep the skeletal remains that were found recently for study there.

Two persons remain missing from the time of the flood.

Terrell Test Flows New Gas

Unidentified Permain production, probably Wolfcamp, has been assured with the flowing of gas at the maximum rate of 1.7 million cubic feet daily at Shell Oil Co., Midland, No. 1-22 Mitchell-State, in 22-161-GC8 SF, Ellenburger failure 1/2 mile east of Ellenburger production and 6 1/2 miles east of the 6,221 foot Wolfcamp gas opener and lone producer from that pay in the Terrell County portion of the Brown Bassett multipay field, 3 3/8 miles east of the three-well Hoge Ranch (wolfcamp gas) field, producing at 5, 250 feet, and 36 miles southwest of Ozona.

Flow was through a 32-64 inch choke and perforations at 4,685 -5, 387 feet.

Acidized with 1,000 gallons and tested an unreported time on a 14-64 inch choke, it flowed gas at the rate of 12 million cubic feet daily, with tubing pressure of 1,200 pounds.

Testing continued. Drilled to 14, 508 feet, with 9 5/8 inch casing set at 6,098 feet, it is plugged back to 6,050 feet.

No schedule has been set for tennis matches prior to the district competition.


Boys' Track Team Slates Six Meets




