 ral route de livery service to an area more that one fuarter of a mile from the local post office building. In Sanderson this means that anyone living fur-ther from the post office building from the post office bund.
ind and Downie St. 2nd and Pine St. ; 1st and Hack berry St. ; Wilson and Hackberry St.; a and Wilson a nd Oak St. is entitled to this rural route delivery service. There are two main require ments for this service which must be met.
One of the requirements is $\mathbf{5 0} \%$ of the families ina service area must desire this service and the other requirement is that the family desiring this service must erect and maintain a mail box at the curb line of the street. All mail
boxes must have the name and mailing address of the owner or head of the family legibly painted on the box
It has always been the policy of the Post Office Department to give our patrons the best ser vice possible in handling the mail and if this service is de sired in this area we will install it.
In order to ascertain if the service, it will be appreciated if you will clip the fuestionaire from the ne wspaper, fill it out and send it to your postmaster within the next week. The patrons in Sanderson should be
sure to include their street ad dress on the coupon.
Even if this service is instal led in Sanderson, it will not be compulsory for everyone to re ceive their mail in street mail boxes. There will still be boxes at the post office building for those who wish to receive Mall assistance in filling the coupon at left will be appreciated by your local postal employees.
