Flood Control **Plans** Call For **10-Year Project**

The work plan approved last week by the sponsoring organizations proposes a 10-year period for completion, according to the information revealed in the plan. The necessity for the duration of this time is the scope of the project and the necessary accomplishments for the insurance of success of the project. In the work plan is needed land treatment measures, 11 floodwater retarding structures, and approximately 1, 800 feet of channel improve ment. Land treatment measures are those which will contribute directly to watershed protection and reduction of floodwater damages. This work will halp to insure the effectiveness of the floodwater retarding structures.

The total project installation is estimated to be \$4, 880,-161, \$85,655 of which is estimated to be the local cost and \$4, 590, 328 estimated to be that funded under Public Law 566.

The watershed is composed of 216 square miles of land in Terrell, Pecos, and Brewster Counties.

The Terrell County Commissioners Court will be responsible for the operation and maintenance of the structures following their completion.

Co-sponsors of the project are the commissioners courts of the three counties, the Big Bend, Trans-Pecos, and Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservations Districts. Technical assistance for the surveys, planning, engineering, work plans, and the accomplishment of the actual project will be by the Soil Conservation Service, Department of Agriculture.

Mrs. Marvin Allen died Monday afternoon in a Fort Stockton hospital one week after be ing shot in the side with a shotgun. She had been in critical condition since being admitted Monday morning of last week.

Funeral services for Mrs. Allen were in the First Baptist Church Wednesday morning with Rev. E. H. Carson, pastor, officiating. Janes Funeral Home of Ozona was in charge of the arrangements and burial was in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

Eddie Allen, 46, was born in Rankin on July 4, 1923. She had been a resident of Sanderson for about nine years. She was a member of the Auxiliary to the B. of R. T. and president of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Besides her husband, she is survived by a son, Bobby Lee Dobbs of El Paso and a sister, Mrs. Juincy K. Early of Snyder.

MARCH 26, 1970 Water Rates Are

Lowered Here The directors of the Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District #1 have reduced the water rates to residential customers only for the summer months beginning April 1 and continuing through Sep-

tember 30. This reduction will affect all residential customers that use over 4,000 gallons of water per month. The present rate is 80¢ per 1,000 gallons after the first 4,000 gallons used per month; the new rate will be 60¢ per 1,000 gallons after the first 4,000 gallons.

This reduction is an experiment. The directors want to find out how much this reduction will affect revenue as future operations will be based on the results.

It was pointed out that the district has certain bond obligations to meet, plan for the maintenance and upkeep of the existing wells and mains, and also plan for future changes, expansion, or well exploration, any or all of which could affect future rate adjustments. They stated that they hoped to be able to stay with the current adjustment for the benefit of the users of water in the district.

It is approximately 31 miles northeast of Dryden.

The well will be known as No. 1 Citgo-University.

Location is 873 feet from the south and 2, 126 feet from the west lines of section 13, Block 34 University.







Herman Chandler **Recalls Story After** Seeing Old Horse

On a recent trip to deliver some horses to California with his brother, Clarence Chandler, Herman Chandler stopped in Benson, Ariz., enroute home and saw his Appaloosa horse which had been turned out to rest by his present owner, Retired Colonel Ladd Harlan.

The horse has a unique history.

Once Chandler's favorite roping horse and valued at \$6,000, the horse was stolen in 1954 from the Chandler ranch on Independence Creek. During the flood in that area then the horse was the only means of transportation Chandler had. Later, when they were on a business trip to San Angelo, on returning the horse was missing and machines working the road had obliterated all traces of the horse's tracks or the tracks of anyone who may have taken him.

For seven years Texas Ranger Jim Nance of Sierra Blanca, who was residing here at the time, assisted Mr. Chandler in trying to locate the horse. He was advertised extensively over the nation as "lost, strayed, or stolen". Finally, through "tips" from Mexico, Ranger Nance located the horse in 1961. He had been ridden across the Rio Grande and later sold to Charley Lindenborn who owns a ranch between Sabinas and Monterrey, Mexico, and who used the animal as his personal mount for five years. Much credit also was given

to General Quinones in Mexico who gave valuable assistance in several ways before the horse was returned to his owner.

On the recent trip when Mr. Chandler "nickered" to his horse, the animal recognized him and came running to him although he had not seen him for several years.

Now 23 years old, the horse is used only for exhibition.






