And we do not have a good excuse for not bathing more often than Saturday nights!

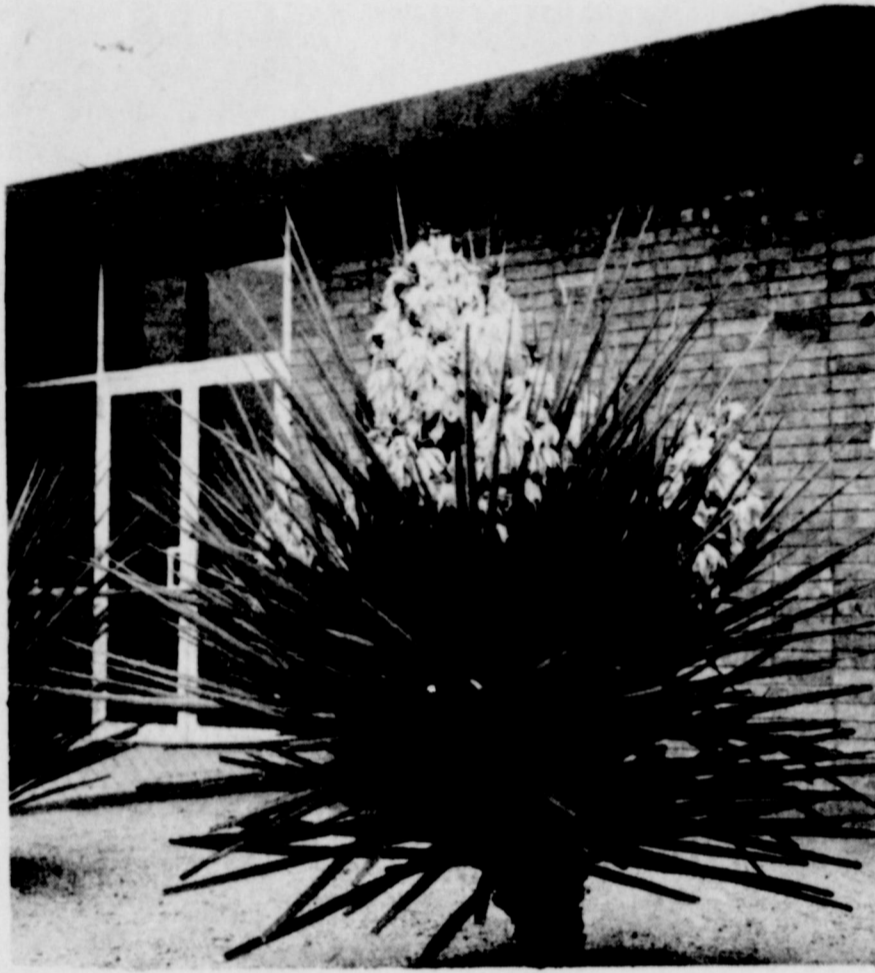
Have you noticed more water pressure or more volume of water at your house recently?

## Census Taking Began On Wednesday

Blanks for the 1970 census of population and housing should have been received by all residents of Terrell County prior to this reading. They were put in the mail last week.

Anyone missed in the mailing is requested to pick up a blank at the postoffice.

Mrs. T. O. Moore, supervisor for the local crew consisting of Mrs. T. O. Moore Jr. and Miss Minerva Martinez, said that the enumerators began their calls Wednesday, picking up the census forms and assisting with them when requested. Much time will be saved, she said, if householders will fill out the questionnaires and have them ready to be picked up.

Enumerators attended schools of instruction in Alpine the first of the week and Mrs. Moore was in El Paso the first of the week for her instructions as a supervisor.

It was emphasized that all information on census blanks will be kept in strict confidence. A breach of security regulations by workers subjects the offender to possible jail sentence or fine. Every fifth return, determined strictly by lot, would have an extra and more detailed questionnaire to be completed in an interview with the enumerator.

The census will provide population figures used for all official calculations and statistics for the next 10 years.

Representation in the national Congress and in the Senate and House of the Texas Legislature and in some local areas will be based on the totals and it is extremely important that each county and community be carefully and accurately counted.

Saturday is the day for the election of three members of the board of trustees of the Terrell County Independent School District. The term of those elected will be three years.

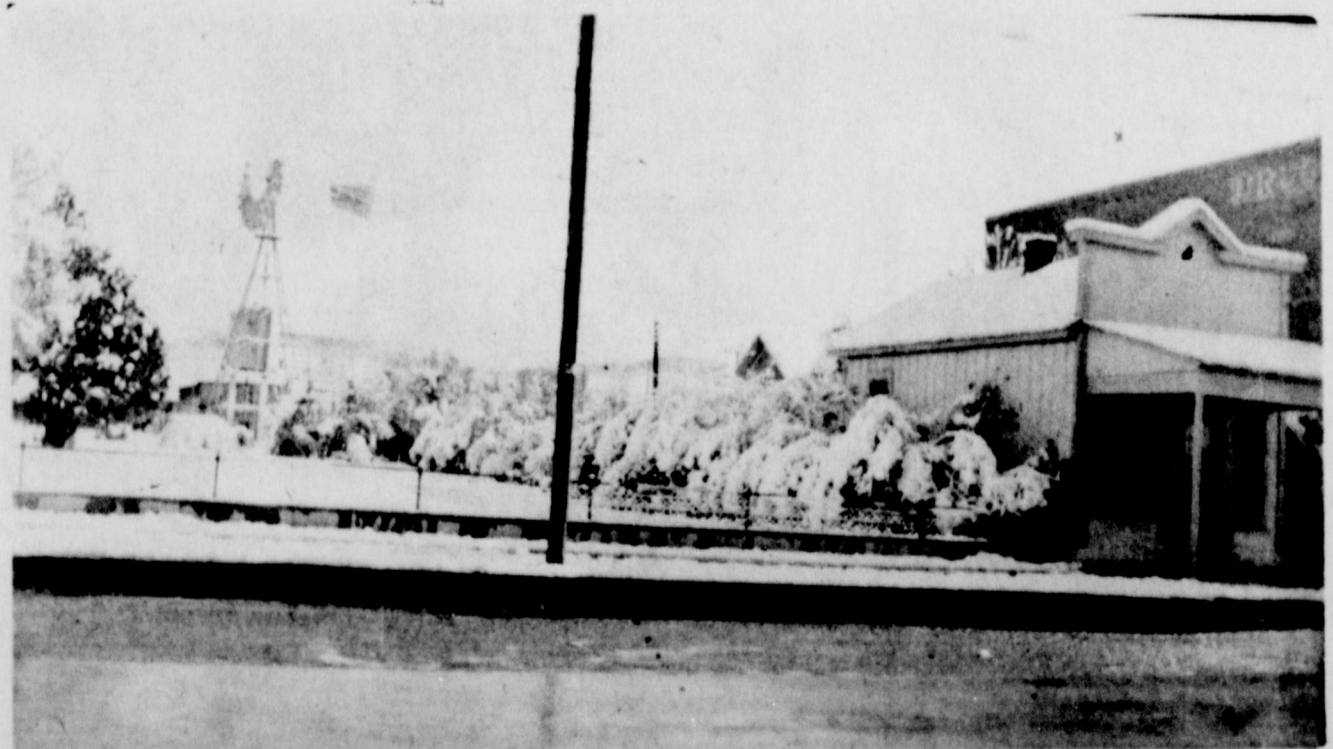
Candidates for the post, according to their order of listing on the ballot, are:

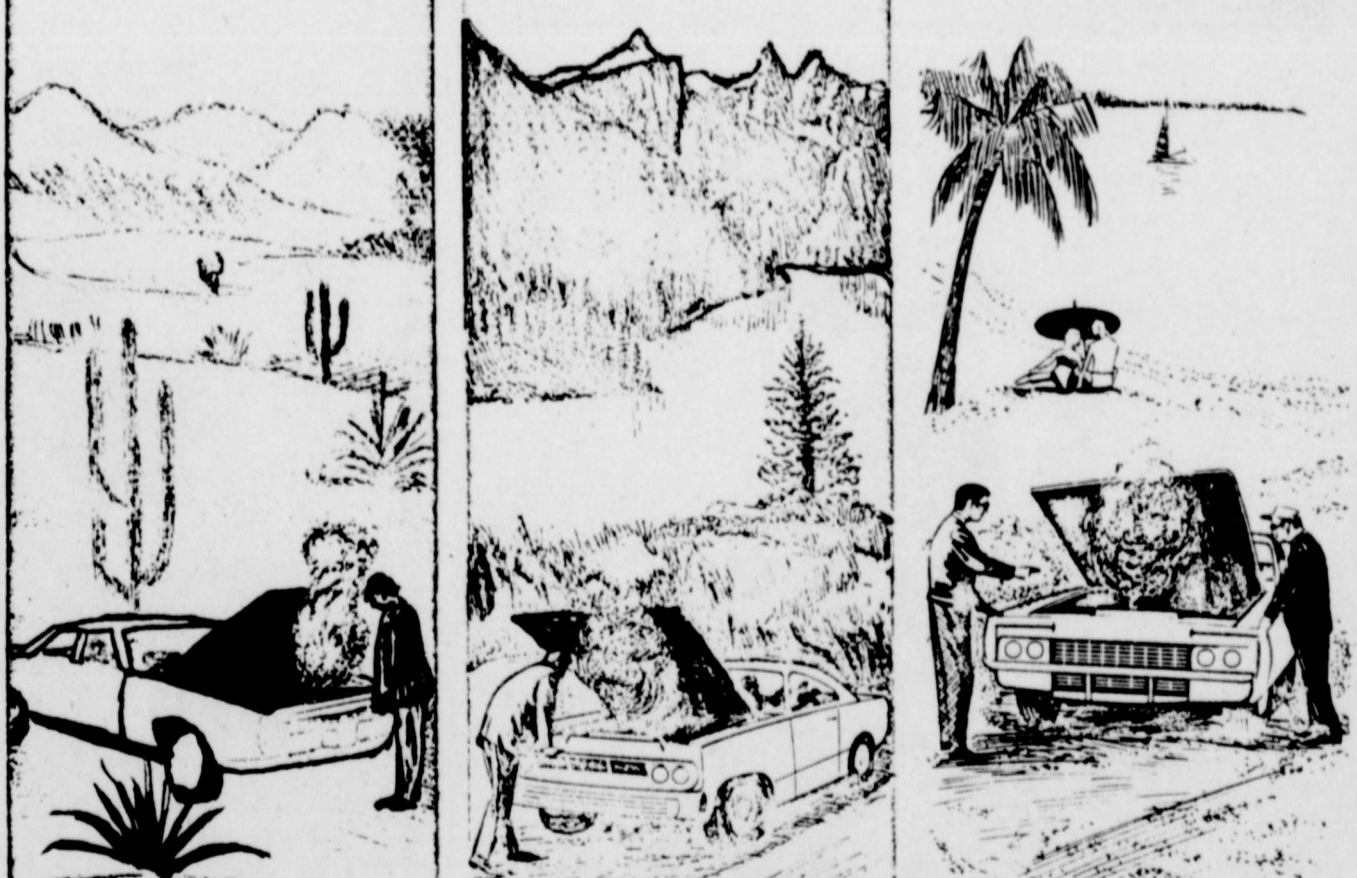

# Market Is Off At Wool Sale

The market was slightly off at the first 1970 sealed-bid wool sale held here last week at the Sanderson Wool Commission Co. John T. Williams, manager of the wool and mohair warehouse, said that prices were off from 10 to 12 cents a pound compared with the first sale in 1969.

Top prices at the sale on 12-months wool were on several lots of choice spring clipped wool which amounted to about \$52,438 pounds which sold at a price range between 53-53 1/4 cents per pound in the grease.

A total of 127,620 pounds sold in the 46-49 1/2 cents per pound in the grease range. About 90,421 pounds brought prices between 51 1/2 cents and 52 7/8 cents per pound in the grease.

There were a total of 32,202 pounds which brought 50 1/2 cents per pound in the grease. There were a few lots which sold under 46 cents per pound.

Of the 308,224 pounds of 12-months wool which was sold, only a few pounds were rejected and a few left pending.

The top buyer of 12-months wool was Burlington Industries Wool Company Inc. of Boston, which purchased a total of 99,583 pounds. The second high buyer was J. P. Stevens and Co. of Andover, Mass. who bought a total of 94,971 pounds. Third high buyer was Prouvost, Lefebvre and Co. of Boston which bought a total of 93,114 pounds. Forte, Dupee, Sawyer Co. of Boston bought 4,369 pounds and Marriner Combing Co. of Boston purchased 15,988 pounds.

In the 8-months wool lots offered, a total of 13,325 pounds brought a price of 50 1/2 cents per pound in the grease. There were 15,842 pounds bringing 49 3/4 cents per pound, 4,411 pounds brought 49 3/4 cents per pound and 3,330 pounds brought 45 cents per pound.

A total of 18,513 pounds brought prices between 40 3/4 cents per pound and 44 1/2 cents per pound.

A lot of 18,583 pounds of 10-months wool brought a price of 52 1/4 cents per pound.

Top buyer of the 8-months wool was Marriner, buying 37,660 pounds; Forte, 17,292 pounds; J. P. Stevens, 10,661 pounds and Lobsitz Mills of Nutley, N.J. bought 1,772 pounds.

Texas athletic records since World War II.

A new map for use in calculating sunrise and sunset times in Texas.

A summary of major non-petroleum minerals in Texas.

A history of the sheep and goat industry in Texas.

Number of deer killed in each Texas county.

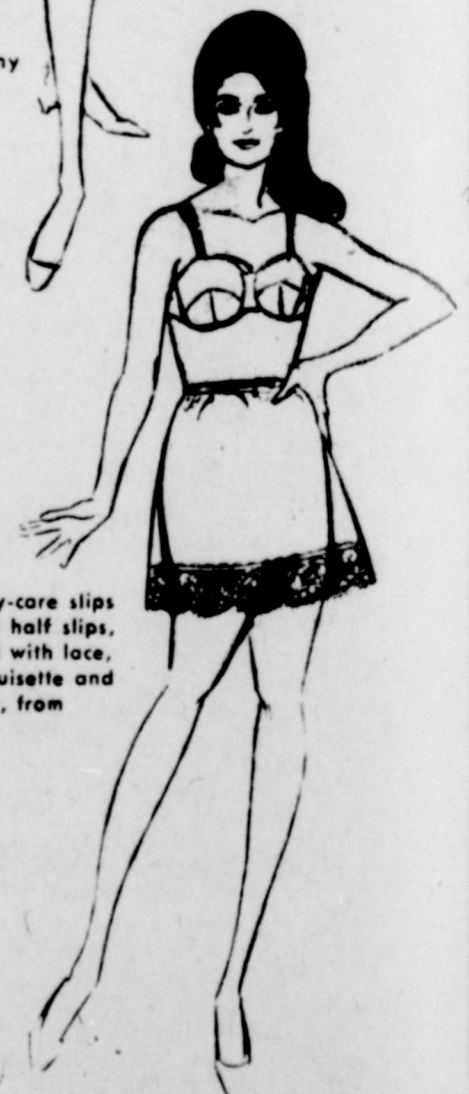

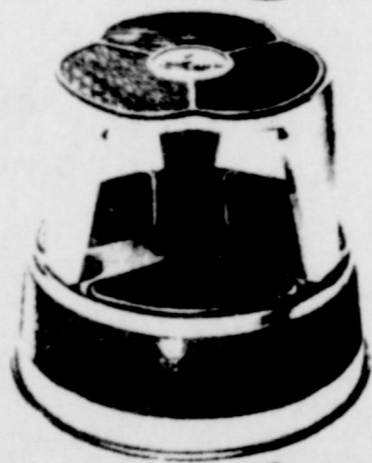

# Snake Season Arrives, Texans Given Warning

AUSTIN — Spring's balmy weather brings forth a myriad of natural life from Texas' rocks and rills — but some of the emerging creatures aren't such a welcome sight.

Snakes both poisonous and harmless greet the warming rays of the sun and rekindle thousands of years' misconceptions and fables when they crawl out of their dank winter resting places.

But Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials remind that most snakes — although not protected by State law — are nevertheless beneficial and should not be harmed.

And so far, it appears most species of snakes native to the State have maintained their population levels in recent years despite highly-publicized "rattlesnake roundups" and other efforts to exterminate the reptiles, according to Howard Lee, director of programs for the Department and a recognized authority on reptiles.

"If these roundups were effective in controlling snake populations, there probably would be no recurrence of the species in those areas after the first two or three events," said Lee.

Lee feels that indiscriminate killing of snakes tends to upset the balance of nature — and gives the snakes' natural foods such as mice and rats

an opportunity to overpopulate.

Spring is the time to begin to take precautions against poisonous snake bites, Lee said. Care should be taken in moving objects which might harbor snakes. High boots should be worn whenever possible in walking through weedy or wooded areas.

But precaution doesn't include killing all snakes, said Lee.

"Many people refuse to allow a snake to share a part of the geography with them," he said, "then pretty soon they have to call an exterminator to get rid of the rodents the snake would have eaten."

Texas has only four species of poisonous snakes, although there are various varieties within the species. They are the rattlesnake, copperhead, water moccasin and coral snake.

Most of these snakes — with the exception of some in the northwest section of the State — are out of hibernation by early March.

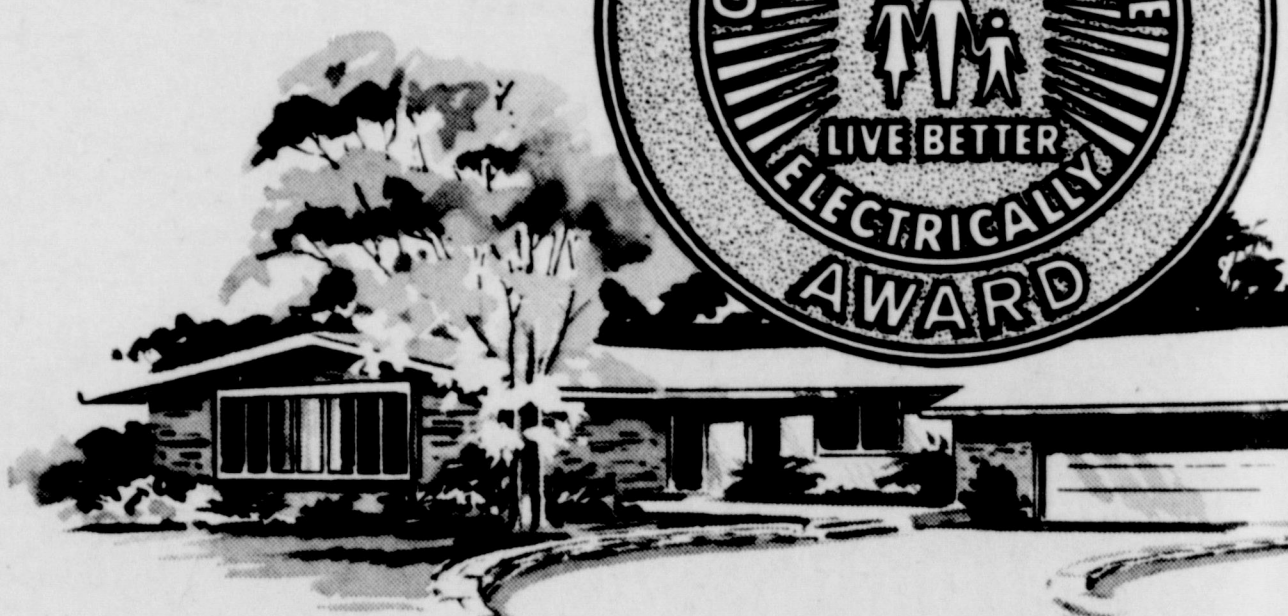
