AUSTIN -- A contract for highway construction in the Del Rio district has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commis-

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer C. N. Parsons, and will be in Terrell and Val Verde counties.

Allen Keller Company of Fredericksburg was awarded a contract for grading, structures, flexible base and rock asphalt pavement on 8.9 miles of US Highway 90. Low bid was \$1,344,121.17.

The project extends from the Val Verde County line to 0.5 mile west and from 5.5 miles west of Langtry to the Terrell County line. R. E. Bradley of Del Rio is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 330 working days.

Federal Allotment For Disadvantaged Students Is Made

Congressman Richard C. White has announced the allotment by the office of Education, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, of \$1,-779,995.02 to the public school systems of the 16th District under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. The federal grants under this title are for special programs for educationally disadvantaged children, and are based on the number of children from families having incomes of less than \$2,000 per year, families receiving assistance under the Aid to Dependent Children provisions of the Social Security Act, and children under public institutions or foster homes. There are 11, 989 qualifying children in the 16th District, according to the figures supplied Congressman White by the Office of Education.

Allotments include \$29, 545 . 33 for Terrell County, which has 199 children qualifying.

According to the figures, the money accepted by the local schools for the special education is for almost half of the total enrollment of 429.




