 The rain that we had locally Wednesday evening did a lot of good to yards, shrubs, beds, etc., as all rains do. There were some consequences of the rain that were good.
 The unroofing of the house of the Jose Garcia family, and water entering the home of Minnie Chalambaga were good results, nor the wind damage to some trees and possibly other water damage to the other houses.
 And one thing that was very noticeable was the fact that the Sanderson residents are in a position to get some more serious damage to their property if something isn't done about drainage ditches.
 And water keeps eating away the black-topping and edges of the road. It is going to cost a pile of money to repair or replace.
 It was called to our attention Tuesday morning that the drainage ditches were filling up, the culverts stopping up, and some ditches plugged up completely by "shotgun" culverts installed for driveways, and in some cases the ditches were filled in completely for the driveway.
 We're in the newspaper business! What business is it of yours? Why not tend to our own business?
 Good ideas, but we think it our business. And we're not going to throw brickbats at any pup or individual. We're going to help do a job. There is a little we can do to remedy the situation besides pay some more taxes if necessary, but we think that the recognition of a problem is the first step toward eliminating it.
 Every rain locally sends water running toward the corner of Oak near Oak and Fifth Streets. One of it flows down Kerr, Orchard, Mansfield, Hackberry, Pine, etc., but it has a southward drain, too, and particularly the ditches on the east-west streets do not contain the water. When the southward flow is in more.
 The awareness of this problem and a concern for the individuals affected by these circumstances helps us to be in agreement that something should be done and to back a plan that is designed to help the situation.
 This is where we enter the picture!
 Another area of concern mentioned should not be neglected too long for reasons of economics in our opinion, and that is the repair to our local streets, many of which are in a state of repair due to water damage to the edges of the blacktopping.
 It's a real chore at times to look at our own situation and objectively reason that there are some real needs for improvements - particularly after they have been called to our attention, but pride in appearance, and pride in accomplishment comes into the picture somewhere. If these things do need to be done, then we need to be in error in our hints to try

Murder Charged When Two Are Killed In Wreck

Two Roswell, N.M., residents were killed, and two others injured in a car-truck head-on collision 16.6 miles west of Langtry Friday night.
 Pronounced dead at the scene of the accident, which was less than two miles inside the Terrell County line, were Thorin K. White, 18, who was in the U.S. Marine Corps, and his sister, believed to be a twin, Beth, also 18.
 Another member of the White family, 22-year-old Kirby, and Karen Belcher, 19, also of Roswell, were injured.
 The two injured persons were taken to Val Verde Memorial Hospital, and then transferred to Santa Rosa Medical Center in San Antonio Friday night.
 Thorin White was the driver of a 1970 Pontiac GTO which collided head-on with a 1967 International truck driven by Leroy Yates Byrd of St. Paul, N.C.
 White was reported in fair condition after undergoing surgery by Santa Rosa Medical Center spokesmen late Saturday, and Miss Belcher was reported in good condition. Both are in the intensive care unit.
 Saturday, Byrd was charged in Sanderson with murder with a motor vehicle in connection with the accident. He was taken before Peace Justice W. G. Shoemaker, who was the examining magistrate in the hearing, and officially charged by Terrell County Sheriff Bill Cooksey and DPS Patrolman

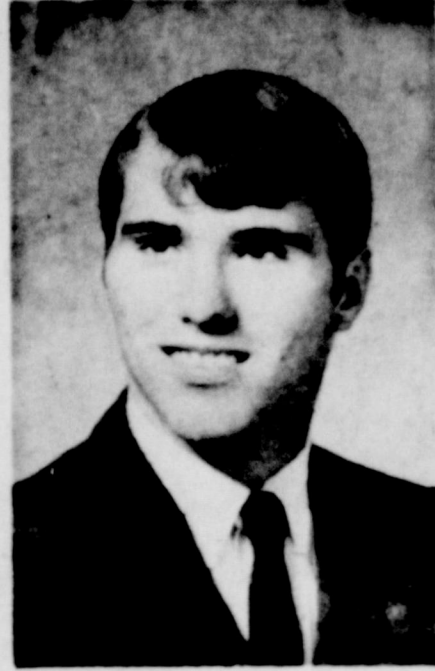

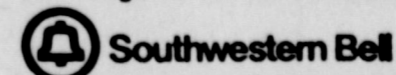



Area Peace Officers Hope To Secure Communications

The newly organized Big Bend Area Peace Officers Association met in Fort Stockton Wednesday night to work on membership expansion during a business session and to listen to talks on improved communications possibilities during a program provided by State Representative George Baker and by former FBI agent Oliver Nordmarken, now with the Odessa College officer training program.

Officers were present from Marfa, Big Bend National Park, Alpine, Sanderson, Odessa, Midland and Fort Stockton, representing the local police departments, county agencies, state forces, border patrol and FBI.

The association plans to work toward an improved communication network for the area, with the possibility of a teletype loop serving towns along US 90 from El Paso to Del Rio and branching north through Fort Stockton to the Midland-Odessa area.

Baker told of plans now in progress to improve the state-operated teletype system linking manned stations of the Department of Public Safety, and of how local loops can be integrated with the state network through improved facilities now being set up for the state.

A new manned station at Ozona will improve communication for some of the area represented at the Wednesday night meeting, notably Sanderson. A new computerized control center in Austin will speed greatly the handling of inquiries on auto licenses, criminal records, and identification.

Nordmarken, in his capacity with the Permian Basin Law Enforcement Committee, has studied plans to tie-in local departments with an area teletype network between towns, linked with Austin through the Midland manned station of the DPS.

A local loop now connects Big Spring, Midland, Odessa, Monahans, Kermit, Andrews, Seminole and Lamesa, and a possible expansion would tie in Pecos, Crane, McCamey, Fort Stockton, Sanderson, Del Rio, Alpine, Fort Davis, Marfa, Van Horn and El Paso.

Some local financing would be required, with an average cost of \$110 per month including equipment rental and line charges, but federal assistance is available through the Criminal Justice Council up to 60% of cost for the first two years of operation, he said.

Next meeting of the association will be held in Sanderson on June 10 at 7 p.m. A photography clinic is planned for that meeting.
