School Outlaws Athletics; Other Extra-Curriculars

Following a special meeting of the Friona School Board Monday night, School Superintendent Alnot Fir announced the board's decision to ban all extra-curricular activities from the school.

"This will include sports, clubs and all inter-school literary competition," Fir stated.

The local supt. indicated that lack of fan interest was the death-blow to athletics, added to the lack-lustre records compiled by the teams representing the school.

"Why, we've lost four football games in the past two years, and the basketball teams lost more games than that this year alone," Supt. Alnot said.

Literary competition was just about as bad, Fir stated, as two or three entries in the district literary meet failed to place. "If we'd win once in awhile it wouldn't be so bad," he said.

About the decline of fan interest, Fir explained that he had seen the decline coming in recent years. Interest was especially low at basketball games, as Mr. Fir pointed out there were two or three home games this year where fans didn't have to line the court in order to see the action.

"Another time there were three or four vacant seats in the corners," Alnot charged. This was a game that scheduled late, and the Friona Star (local journalistic gem) stated the game would be played on Friday when it actually was played on Thursday. An equal number of fans showed up on Friday, due to the Star's story, although there was no game at all. Most of the fans gave up at about halftime that night and went home.

"Many students have told us they would rather have the extra time for studying and re-

search. We are also adding several new courses, including advanced calculus, thermodynamics, oceanography and Russian," Fir said. A teacher has been hired to teach all of the new subjects. The instructor, Malvin Furd, will graduate this spring from Dumas High School.

In order not to put all the coaches out of work, the school board is putting two of them on custodial duties, and the others will help with the building of the new school, Fir announced.

After the new building is completed, the coaches' fate is not certain, although none have experience in teaching thermodynamics.

"I could see the writing on the wall," stated head coach Dan Lamp. "Losing two games our first year here wasn't so bad, but when we came right back and did it again this year,

I knew my days were numbered," he said. Other coaches were not available for comment, as there are no phones at the high school construction site.

Maize Acreage Is Lost; Substitute Crop Given

Parmer County, for many years the world's top maize-producing area, has lost its maize allotment for 1965, and emergency measures have been arranged to guarantee local farmers a substitute cash crop, according to Princess Miles, county WPA office manager.

"We've done some high finagling, and we have secured an allotment of Brussels Sprouts to equal that lost to maize," Miles announced.

As a matter of fact, Brussels Sprouts doesn't have the government restrictions which have come to be associated with some crops.

"It is about the only crop left where a farmer will be free to

grow it as he pleases--so long as he complies with regulations," Miles stated.

The reason for the withdrawal of the maize acreage from the county wasn't known. However, it is thought that Agriculture Secretary Fleeman was disgruntled because maize farmers were, because of their organization, able to at least hold their own.

"Many say they don't know how to grow Brussels Sprouts. That's no excuse. Why, this time last year, many farmers didn't know a lot about sugar beets, and look what they did. I think they can do equally as well with Brussels's Sprouts," Mr. Miles concluded.

Friona Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the prizes for store employees.

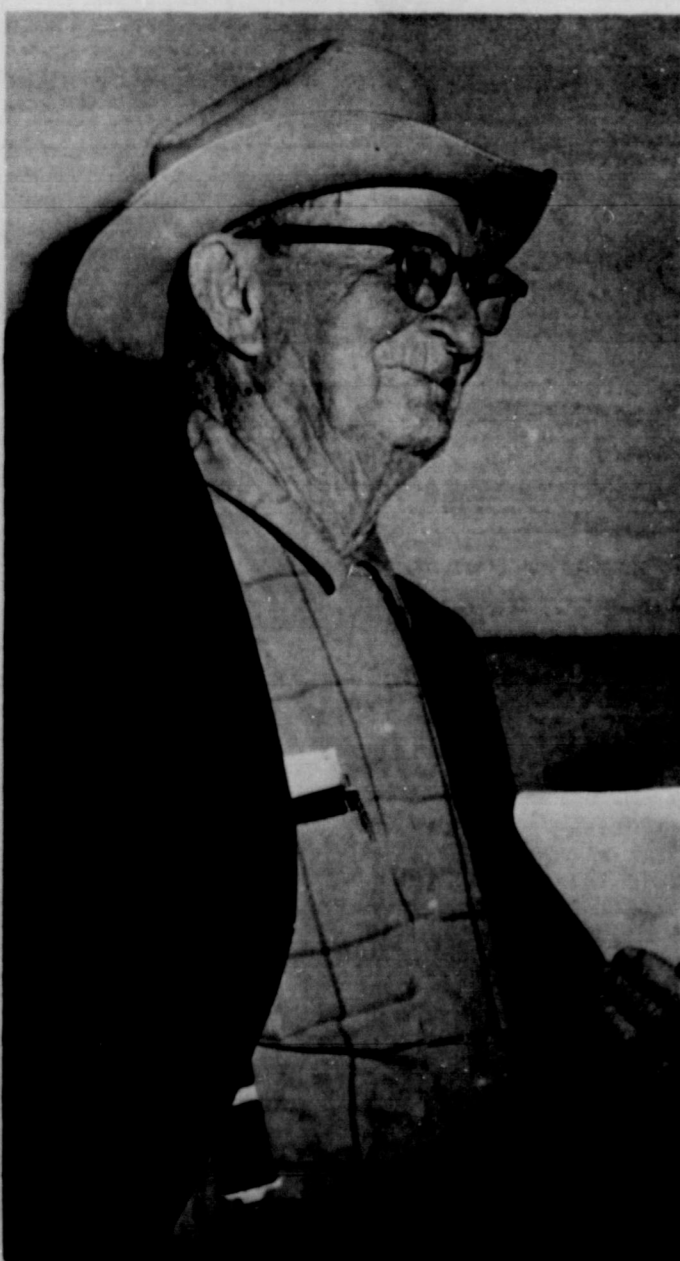

America's Churches Waging Uphill Battle

The largest single body of Americans, in terms of religious orientation, consists of those who do not belong to any church. Even with church membership at an all-time high, non-members constitute 36 per cent of the population, or nearly 70 million persons.

This figure is somewhat misleading, because many Protestant churches do not count children under 13 as members, even though they are attending Sunday School regularly. But after full allowance is made for such technicalities in record-keeping, the "unchurched" still outnumber the adherents of any particular denomination.

America's largest religious body, the Roman Catholic Church, has 45 million members. The biggest Protestant denomination, the Southern Baptist Convention, has 10 million.

Who are the unchurched, and why do they choose not to affiliate with a religious body? Some are militant atheists. They are convinced that God doesn't exist, and are openly hostile toward religion, which they call an outworn superstition.

Atheists may get a lot of publicity when they denounce religious institutions or file court suits to bar recognition of God in public life.

But atheists are a small minority. The Census Bureau says that not 2 to 3 per cent of the American population are atheists. Much more numerous are the agnostics who say "I do not know whether God exists," but who act like they believe He doesn't.

Others of the unchurched group are men and women who profess to believe in God, but who see no need to express or nurture their faith through church membership.

Some of them are strongly attracted by the ethical teachings of Jesus Christ, but feel that these teachings have been betrayed by institutional Christianity.

There are humanists, who feel that all achievement of man and man's own security, lies within man himself and he needs nothing outside himself.

This land of ours is traditionally a church going, God fearing people with a strong religious tradition. But it doesn't take much perception to see that people spend Sunday morning in entirely different ways.

The churches of America have work cut out for them.

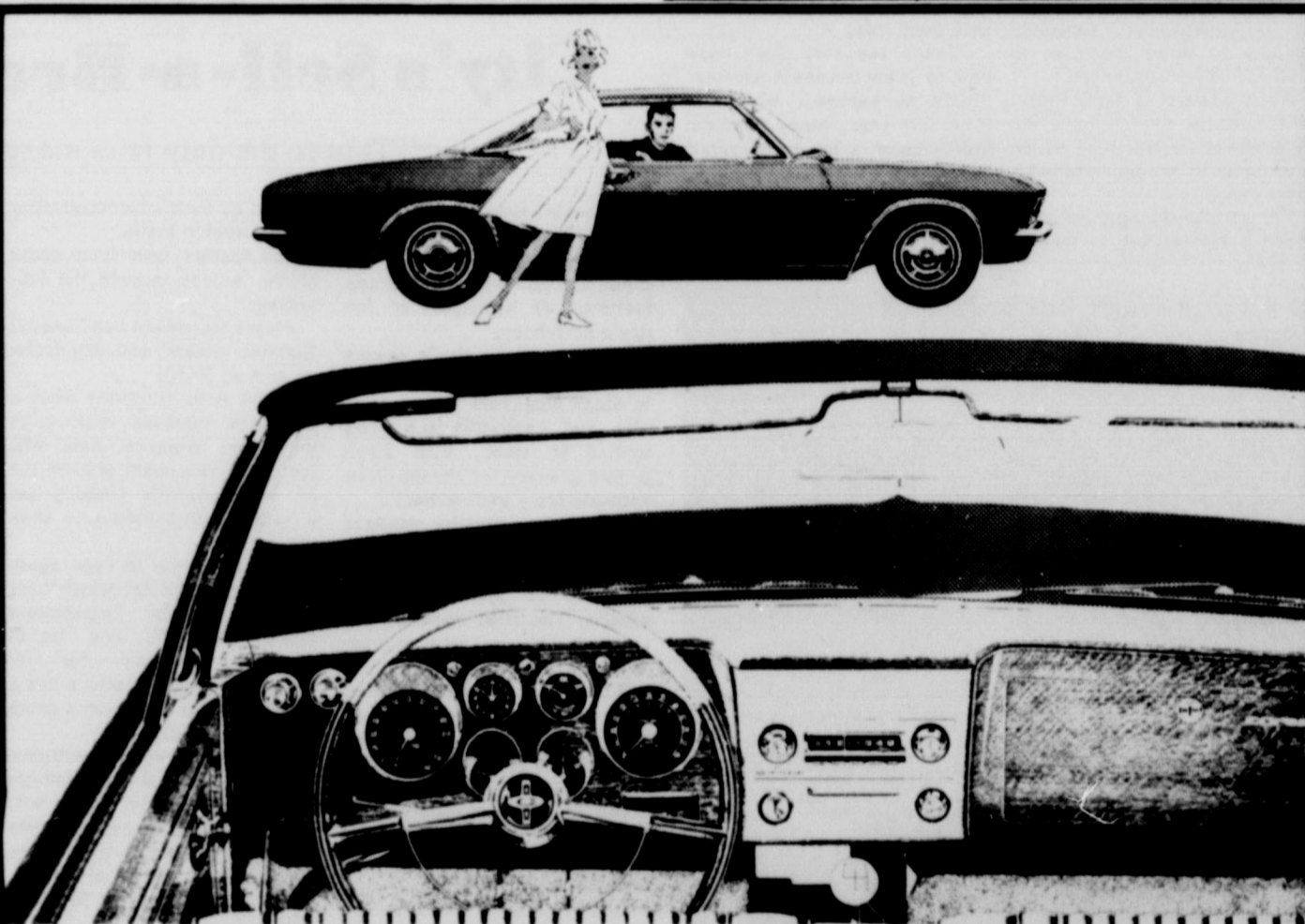

AT NEW LOCATION

**Contract Awarded For
\$53,000 Grid Stadium**

The Friona School Board this week let a contract to Vibra-Whirl and Company of Panhandle on a bid of \$52,975 for the construction of a new football stadium at Friona High School.

The bid figure will include the building of a permanent stadium on the west side of the proposed field, which will contain 1533 seats exclusive of aisle spaces. The facility will contain a press box which will measure 27x8 feet, and will be completely enclosed with glass windows in front.

Also included will be two ticket offices, one on the southeast corner of the field, and another on the west side of the stadium. A dirt track will be constructed around the field, with a curb inside and out.

All-new lighting will be installed, with eight poles containing a total of 48 quartz-

iodide fixtures. The lighting is similar to the field at Muleshoe. The poles will be behind the stadium on either side. The stadium will be 21 rows high, and 120 feet long. Each row will be 21 inches wide (two inches wider than present stadium) with a raised seat, and the stadium will have a solid bottom.

A 56-inch wide walk-way will be located just in front of the stadium. Four ramps will be constructed for entrances and exits, one on each end and two in the middle. The stadium will extend from one 30-yard line to the other.

For the east side, the contract calls for the moving of the present stands at the east side of the old football stadium, and they will be placed on the east side of the new stadium. The old press box will be left

intact. With the addition of the old stands for the east side, the new stadium will have seating capacity of 2,470, which will be almost 1,000 more than the old stadium, which would seat around 1,500.

The present scoreboard will be moved to the new location according to the contract. A concession stand is to be erected, measuring 24x30 feet and will contain two public restrooms. It will be constructed similar to the one at Plains, and will be brick veneer in construction.

The outside fence will be a six-foot chain-link fence. A four-foot inside chain-link fence will be located between the outside portion of the track and the stadium on either side, and will run from end zone line to endzone line (120 yards). The contract calls for the new

stadium to be ready by August 15. The contractors will also be responsible for putting in the new grass on the field. A small practice field will be constructed outside the main field between it and the vocational agriculture building, on the north side of the school property.

A public address system, which will be permanently located at the field, is called for in the contract.

The concession stand is to be located on the southwest corner of the stadium.

Installation of all mechanical work is still to be contracted at an estimate of around \$4500.

The new football field will run north and south just off Grand Avenue at the new school property. It will be located in the southeast corner of the property.

Friona High School, which has been winning honors all school year for athletics as members of District 3-AA, made an excellent showing in the district interscholastic League literary meet last Saturday at Olton.

Taking the school's overall points won in the various contests, Friona High School scored 99 points to finish as runnerup behind Floydada, which compiled 171 total points. Host Olton was next with 79.

Students from FHS won six first place honors, and six students qualified for the regional literary meet, to be held in Lubbock April 23-24.

Those winning first place rib-

bons in their contests were Linda Outland (poetry interpretation), Julia Dennis (prose reading), Neel Lyles (ready writing), Nan Lillard and Ann Prewett (girls debate) and Nancy Webb and Patti Ragsdale, (spelling and plain writing).

All of the above students, with the exception of the spellers, advance to the regional competition. There is no regional contest in spelling. In addition, Tommy Sherley won the right to compete at regional by placing second in the science contest.

Others who placed at the district meet included John Bill McFarland, second, and Ann Ayers, third in persuasive speaking; Courtney Owen, sec-

ond to Julia Dennis in prose reading; Dwight Whitaker and Gary Shackelford, third in boys debate and Julia Dennis, third in slide rule.

Students who entered the district events but did not place included Chris Tannahill and Lynn Wilson (extemporaneous speaking) Charles Fields (poetry interpretation); Karen Osborn (ready writing); Gail McClothlin, Sandra Scholling, Madalyn Etinger and Lyndia Chandler, (typing) Jerry Coker, David Smith and Martha Martin, (number sense).

The showing was the best in the district literary events for Friona High School in several years. Students entered eleven of the twelve events, journalism being the only event not entered.

**Robert Sanders
Wins Award**

Robert Sanders, Friona senior representing West Texas State University, has won the award for excellence at the University of Oklahoma radio and television clinic and tournament in Norman, Okla.

Competing with students from eight colleges and universities, he won in both announcing and continuity writing. The excellence award is the highest honor given at the clinic.

REPORT GIVEN

**Postal Receipts
Continue To Rise**

During the quarter ending on March 26, gross postal receipts were \$10,769.44 in Friona. This is in comparison to the same quarter in 1964, which was \$8,509.39, an increase of \$2,260.05 or 26.6 per cent.

Postmaster Wright Williams stated "Our fiscal year ends on June 20; and comparing the first three quarters of 1964 and the first three quarters of 1965 we have a total of \$34,148.08 for 1964, and \$42,879.11 for 1965 which is an increase of \$8,731.03, or 25.6 per cent. For another comparison, in 1958 fiscal year for the entire year the gross receipts were \$26,785.30.

More service facilities for the postal customer are receiving new emphasis in postal system. Postmaster Williams commented today after receiving word from Postmaster General John A. Gronouski in Washington, D.C., of a new improved "self-service post office."

The new experimental 24-hour self-service unit -- the second -- opened in mid-March just outside Los Angeles,

to meet after-hours postage and mailing needs of suburbanites.

The first unit was installed recently in a shopping center just outside Washington, D.C. It offers around-the-clock facilities for buying stamps, postal cards and envelopes at cost, mailing letters and weighing and mailing packages and parcels.

In the new model, the vending machines dispensing envelopes, etc., have five times as much capacity, and a larger roof over the vending devices and parcel post drops for better protection of the public. Noting that the self-service units are designed as a supplement to service, and not as a replacement for central postal facilities or personnel, Postmaster Williams added:

"While there has been no determination yet of how far this program will be expanded, it has a great potential for helping to meet the tremendous increase in suburban service demands more efficiently, while providing even better service."

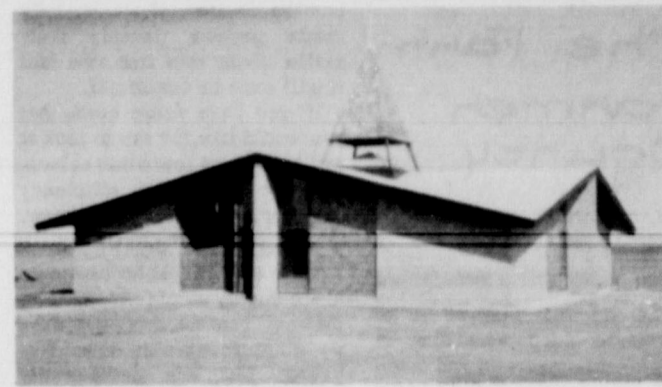
Oklahoma Lane Reunion Set

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On The Farm In Parmer County

COTTON SEEDLING DISEASE
Seedling disease continues to be a problem for many Parmer County cotton farmers. The disease is caused by several soil borne organisms including fungi, bacteria and nematodes. These organisms are most damaging during periods of cool, wet weather.

A variety of symptoms may be produced throughout the growing season by the seedling disease organisms. Seed-rot may occur or seedlings may be killed before emerging from the soil. Seedlings often exhibit various symptoms after emerging ranging from death to loss of the top root. Plants that are not killed often remain stunted for a period of time and then partially recover to produce plants that are weak and inefficient producers.

Damage from seedling disease can be greatly reduced if not eliminated by using the following disease control practices: (1) Bury surface organic matter below the planting level and plant on a bed that will give good drainage. (2) Use good quality seed with a high germination count. Treat these seed with a recommended chemical seed protectant. (3) Plant with high quality seed when morning soil temperatures are above 60 degrees for about 3 days. When low quality seed are used wait for higher soil temperatures. (4) When planting in fields where seedling disease has consistently been a problem, in-furrow fungicides may be used as an aid for getting and keeping a stand. See the County Agent for further information on fungicides.

How do you know whether you have high quality planting seed? Low quality seed will not germinate as rapidly at lower temperatures.

There are two principle methods of estimating seed quality. (1) Test germination of both 60 degrees F. and 70 degrees F. Germination of high quality seed will be essentially the same at both temperatures while poor seed will fail to germinate at the lower temperature.

CHILDREN'S SAFETY
Kids and household chemicals are a deadly combination. Most parents realize this, but even so, many youngsters under five years old are accidentally poisoned every year.

It can happen to your own children if you're careless about handling household pesticides and underestimate your toddler's ability to seek out trouble.

Those sprays and dusts you bring home to take flies, ants, roaches and other pests out of circulation can also be a kiddie trap.

You can protect your children, and the rest of your family too, by chaining to your memory these four keys to pesticide safety -- label, use, storage, and disposal.

Read the label on the chemical container carefully each time before using. The label gives specific instructions for proper use and important information for your safety.

Keep children out of spraying and dusting areas to prevent inhalation of toxic fumes or mists. In using the chemical follow special instructions to the letter.

Store chemicals in their own labeled containers where they belong, and never in or near food containers. Keep them out of the reach of children and pets, and under lock after use.

Get rid of empty containers right away. Destroy and bury them where they cannot contaminate food, people, animals or water supplies.

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At Home In Parmer County

WORKSHOP

The Agents in this District were called together for training on new fabrics and techniques in their construction and care over in Pampa last week.

Miss Lynn Parks, a new young Specialist in Consumer Education and Marketing gave much valuable information on new fabrics and finishes that the agents had need of in this fast advancing world in technology.

All women know by now that it is impossible to tell what a fabric is just by the "feel" of the fabric. Knowledge is needed or we can have disappointments in their performance qualities.

We buy, and hear much about "Polyester" fabrics -- How many really know the characteristics of these fabrics, what to expect from them?

The Trade-Mark names of this group are: Dacron, Fortel, Kodol, and Vycron.

These are often found in high per cent combination with other fibers to give the wash and wear qualities. They may be bleached with chlorine bleaches. They absorb oily stains easily and these should be removed before washing. Washes easily, needs to be ironed or pressed; Other characteristics are: (white rit) or tint them a different color.

Some have resistance to "pilling". High in resistance to wrinkling and abrasion and resistant to moth and mildew. They do cause static electricity. Some teaching plans and illustrative material was prepared for use in demonstrations on Knits and Stretch fabrics that seem to be here to stay. A knowledge of the various type knits and their characteristics can bring greater satisfaction in their use and care to homemakers as well as save money.

A complete file of information on new fabrics and what to expect from their performance is in the office and you are invited to call, write and come in for answer to questions about fabrics.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:
I washed my white cotton bathroom curtains and bleached them. They turned yellow. What can I do and why did they turn yellow?

Most all cotton materials have a resin finish to give the qualities of resistant to wrinkles and easy care. When bleached with chlorine bleach they turn yellow. The only thing that may help in this case is to use a dye color remover.
