IEGION TO THE ELECTED OFFICIALS OF TEXAS:
We, the undersigned, do hereby support the following principal The purpose of a state university or college is to provide facilities for education and training in preparation for responsible positions in and turmoil.
2. Students attending our public colleges and universities have an obligation to themselves and their schools to attend classes,
receive an education and preparation for a useful position in our society. lives and the future of the vast majority of students are being adversely affected by the disruptive actions of a few. 4. All citizens have the right to dissent, including students and college employees
5. The people of this state have a right to expect their tax money to be spent wisely, but not on reconstruction of willfully
6. School administrators have not fully exercised their right to expel law breaking students on the various campuses and requir ed reparations from them.
7. We believe that colleges and universities should be controll ed by the Board of Regents who set policy and have same carried
out by the Administrators - not by the faculty.
8. This state should no further tolerate rioting by any group, including students. Those found guilty by due process of law should be punished according to law. Students found guilty should be expelled immediately and be prohibited from enroll-
ment in any college or university in Texas which is receiving ment in any college or university in Texas which is receiving state aid.
9. Campus discord is being led nd promoted principally by
individuals who are subversive, radical, revolutionary persons of individuals who are subversive, radical, revolutionary persons
criminal mind. Certain faculty members of like persuasion are aiding, abetting and sometimes leading disruptive demonstrations or riots.
10. Any faculty member of a state university or college who openly provokes, advocates, urges, campus anti-American po litical activity, or participates in a riot or anti-American polit ical action on campus should be dismissed and be prohibited from
teaching in any school in Texas which is receiving state financial
iid. That many of the student leaders of disruption are from out of state and have no place in Texas tax supported institutions. These students should be more carefully screened before admi tance.
12. That the Texas Legislature give serious consideration to enacting appropriate legislation and to the writing of safeguards
into future appropriations to assure that the foregoing principles are carried out.
