decrease in the population of Sanderson. This has been apparent in the drop in school students and its resultant facts. There has been a decrease in the number of people attending church services and in the number of church members locally, and this has its resultant effects on those organizations. There has been a decrease in the number of businesses in Sanderson and also a decrease in the amount of business done by local businesses and this has had its apparent results.

These decreases have caused some concern, some alarm, some interest, and some indifference, depending on how close the person is to an individual business. These decreases should have

the concern, alarm, and interest of more people, in our opinion, than they now have. The incident referred to clearly showed that some people would not want to be said to be responsible directly for the closing of a local business, but

they do not want to trade with ocal merchants for whatever re ason.

Mrs. J. H. Hayre, **Pioneer Resident**, **Interred** Friday



Containers will be placed in businesses over town to receive contributions for the victims of Hurricane Celia which hit the Texas Coast





Grand Jury Meets Monday This Week

The Terrell County grand jury returned an indictment of murder with a motor vehicle against Leroy Yates Byrd of St. Paul, N.C., when that group met on Monday.

The indictment was the result of an accident about 16 miles west of Langtry on May 15 in which two Roswell, N. M., youths were killed.

M., youths were killed. The grand jury also requested The Times to publish a resolution which is printed below: RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Sheriffs of Texas recognize their responsibilities to improve their capabilities to detect, apprehend and prepare cases for prosecution; and

WHEREAS, we are concerned that av ever increasing number of cases are being indicted by grand juries now where prosecution never ensues.

WE THEREFORE call upon the prosecutors and the judges of the criminal courts of Texas to support our efforts by speedy trial and vigorous presecution of all grand jury indictments.

We further call on the members of the Texas legislature to take cognizance of the slow pace of criminal justice in our state and create additional courts and staff prosecutors sufficiently, and further enact legislation to require county attomeys to give full time to the duties of their office and be prohibited from engaging in the private practice of law; and that the salaries of such officials be raised by proper legislative action and/or commissioners courts order to a level consistent with their public responsibilities. Now be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the governor of the State of Texas, the Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the Texas House and the President of the State Bar Association of Texas. The above resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote of the Grand Jury of Terrell County, Texas on the 17th day of August, 1970, and it was requested by the Grand Jury of Terrell County, Texas, that it be published in The Sanderson Times, Sanderson, Texas.

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



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
