

## Enrollment Down 26 From Last Year As '70 Term Begins

Enrollment in Terrell County Schools is down 26 from the beginning day of school last year, according to figures released by Carroll B. Card, superintendent, Monday afternoon.

In the kindergarten and first four grades - all housed in the elementary building - there are: 33, 35, 26, 41, 35, for a total of 170;

In the junior high building - 5the through 8th grades - there are 40, 30, 38, 34, for a total of 142;

In the 9th through the 12th grades, housed in the high school building, there are 42, 34, 35, 28, for a total of 139, making 451 students in all.

There was a total of 477 enrolled last year, according to Supt. Card.


