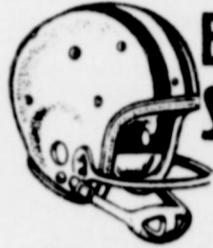

...a commonly known fact is that the railroad company wants to continue the passenger service and that any drop in usage would substantiate their plea for discontinuing not only an additional loss of revenue, but a need or desire of the people for the facility. 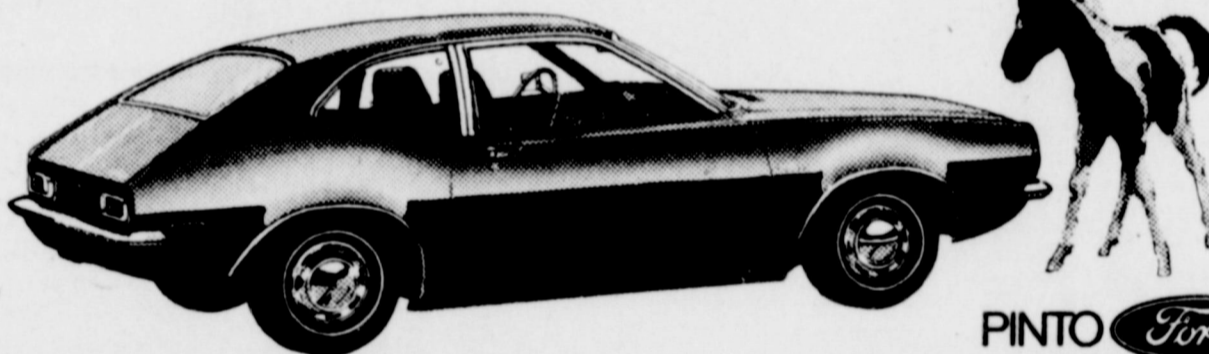

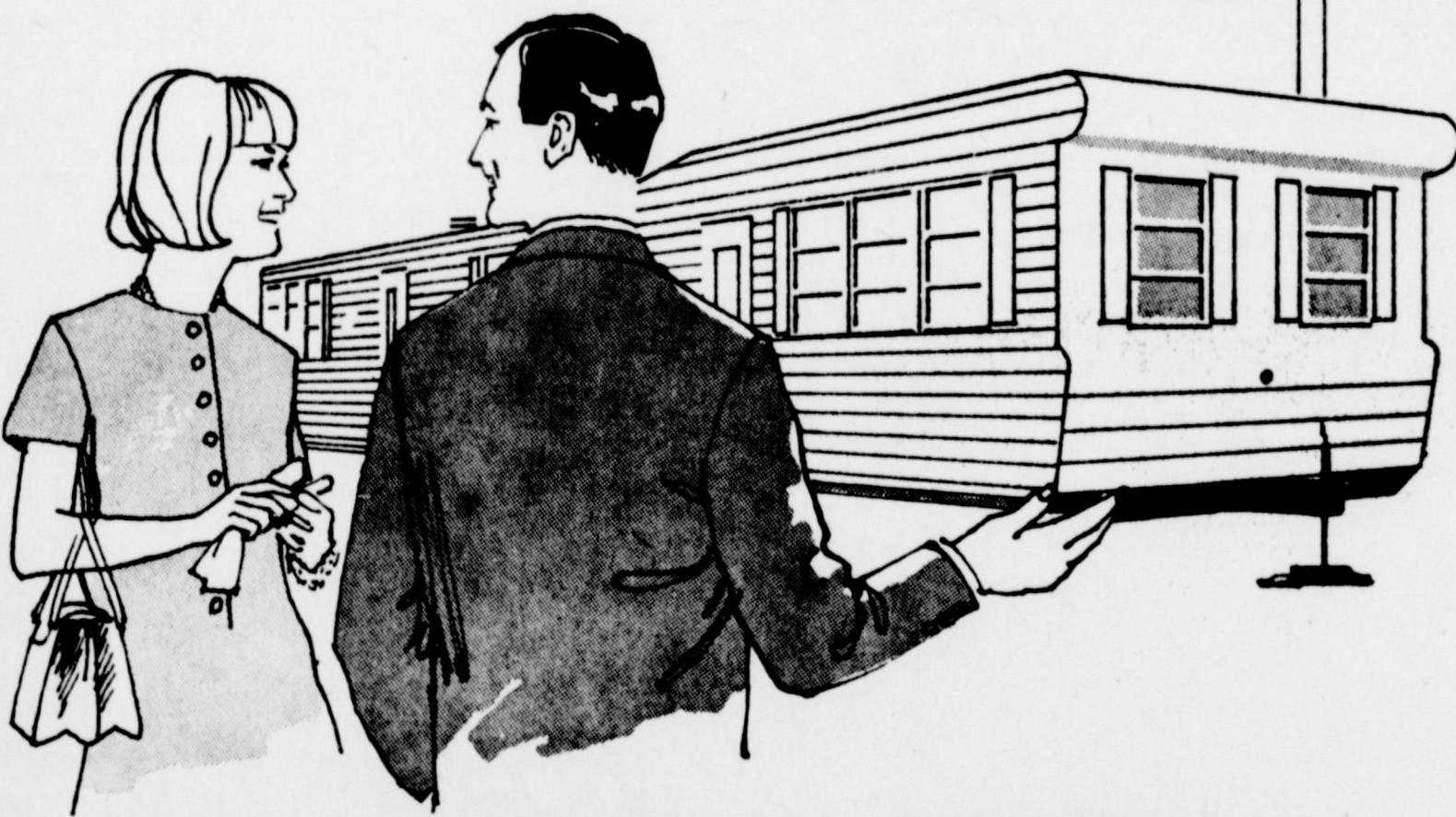

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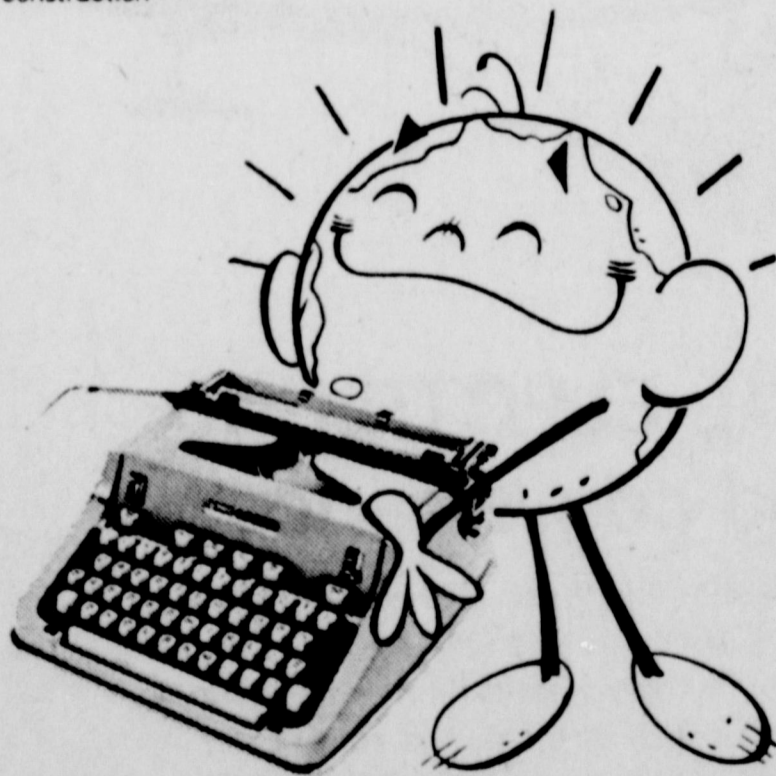

be another step to promote discontinuance of the facility.

Any loss of service or payroll or working hours or personnel or anything locally is a loss to the community, and anything that can be retained or gained is an advantage.

There was some spraying of chemicals on lots over town last week to eradicate the unsightly, hazardous, and possibly unhealthy growth of weeds. This was just a sampling of what is hoped will be a town-wide effort to clean up vacant lots or weeded areas.

A herbicidal company from Hobbs, N.M., was here to do the spraying and will return if there is sufficient work to be done. The company is bonded and insured and the work is guaranteed and there is no tie-in or kick-back to local individuals or businesses. It's just someone who has - by their action - expressed a concern for the appearance and condition of the town. Eradication of weeds or cleaning up property over the town is one way of expressing one's genuine interest in bettering our town. It is the hope of those responsible for making the weed-eradication program possible that there will be a united effort to clean-up Sanderson.

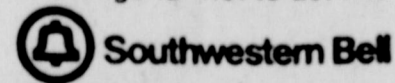
