The Sanderson Eagles squeezed past the Class AA Marfa Shorthorns here Friday night to continue their winning streak of 2-0 for the season. The winning edge came in the final period with less than three minutes of play. Marfa controlled the ball

during most of the first half and held a half-time lead of 6-0. Their score was in the second period and came on a 1-yard run over the pay stripe by Tony Alvarado, the big Marfa tail-back. The extra point try ended in a blocked kick by Sanderson.

During the first period, following the Eagle kick-off, Marfa had a long pass completion that ended in a fumble which was recovered by Robert Barron. Sanderson was subsequently forced to punt and the Shorthorns marched down the field to threaten Sanderson's goal line. On a play that put the ball into the end zone, the Eagles recovered a fumble there and gained possession on their 20 just before the buzzer sounded to end the first frame.

During the third period Sanderson took the ball deeply into Marfa territory and a fumble was recovered by the Shorthorns who returned the favor and a recovery was again by Barron. Following an Eagle punt, Marfa began another march which was another fumble interrupted b and Manuel Ólivas recovered. The Eagles took the ball to the goal line from where James Druse went over on a quarterback sneak from just inches out. Leslie Hall, halfback who saw lots of action with the ball, did the honors on the placement kick for the extra point.
