LISTEN TO LUKE

Albert:--
The "clean-up" campaign is well under way by this time and the climax expected to be Saturday of this week.

Since we have no idea at this writing - on Monday - as to the extent of the clean-up, we are not writing in criticism of anything that has been done or is planned for the day. Anything that is done, probably will have been sorely needed and probably will do its particular part in the overall improvement in the appearance of the town.

But there are two things that seem to stand out most in our minds and eyes that need to be done to offer the greatest opportunity for an over-all improvement in the appearance of our town. We sincerely hope that something may be done to correct these two things - old car bodies and weeds!

We wish that we could come up with a suggestion that would be a fool-proof workable plan to insure the removal of these things, but we haven't, and we will not criticize any effort or plan that works toward those or any other "junk and trash" problems.

Personally, we went for the "weed" problem of sterilizing the soil. There was an area in front of our house where we wanted no vegetation and figured this was the best solution. This was our decision for our problem, not for anyone else's. We still have a problem for which we can find no real solution, except temporary, and that is probably what a lot of other people have. There is a large area where we don't want to kill the soil, but would like to kill the weeds, but this is bounded by property that belongs to others who have their own ideas - justifiably - as to what they would want to do, if anything, about weed eradication.

Killing weeds, cutting them, burning them, and those other forms of clearing them, means only that they will come back if the ground is not sterilized. And this is not always the answer.

But we know that until and unless the weeds are cleared, it will be impossible, or useless, to remove any other litter than may be on the premises. In fact, it might be difficult to find some of the litter unless the weeds are removed.

Some property owners here have spent a lot of money in having the ground cleared of weeds by the sprayer that came here recently. This method is a good method - in our opinion - as the weeds wither and die and the lot is bare so that any trash may be removed and the lot kept clean.

This, in our opinion, is the neatest in appearance, but all we can think of to cause this or permit it, is by individual effort.

We wish we knew a better way.

The first frost of the winter was last Friday morning locally and there are some results seen from the early freeze.

Clean-Up Day Is Saturday In Sanderson

Volunteers who can help to cut weeds or clean up special areas are asked to come to the memorial park on the corner of Downie and First Streets Saturday morning at 8:00 a. m. The workers will help spruce up the premises of people who are financially and physically unable to take care of their own property.

Anyone who is needing this kind of help is asked to contact Mrs. H. E. Ezelle at 2963 so that workers may be assigned places to go for a united and planned effort at cleaning up.

Anyone who is not able to work, but wishes to help someone who is financially or physically unable, may make a cash contribution so that someone may be hired to do some of the clean-up work.

The above plans are a part

of the concerted effort of representatives of all local organizations to rid the town of some of the unsightly areas and to get a general clean-up campaign under way for the benefit of appearance and the elimination of hazards.

The cooperation of the students in all three schools has been sought; high school students are painting and filling trash barrels; junior high students are collecting cans to be taken to the home of G. W. Kyle where they will be weighed and a prize will go to the class making the largest collection; and the elementary students have made posters to be distributed around town calling attention to the clean-up campaign.

Absentee Voting Began Wednesday

Wednesday, October 14, to Friday, October 30, inclusive, is the period for absentee voting by personal appearance in the November 3 general election.

Any qualified voter in Texas who expects to be out of the county of his residence on November 3 may cast an absentee ballot. To do so, he should take his voter's registration certificate to the county clerk office during the hours of regular business in the Oct. 14 to Oct. 30 period.

In addition to state, district, and local races, the Nov. 3 ballot will include seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

By subject, the proposed amendments relate to (1) censure and removal of judges; (2) authority for mixed beverage law; (3) assessment of farm and ranch land; (4) reconstitute State Building Commission; (5) county road bonds and assessed valuation; (6) increase value of homestead exemption from forced sale; and (7) authority to consolidate functions of government.

Texas has a record 4, 150, - 645 registered voters this year. Normally, absentee voting accounts for approximately 5% of the total vote turnout.

Eagles Beat Tigers 34-21; Chips Down for Van Horn Till

The Sanderson High School Eagles won their football game against the Bracketville Tigers in that city Friday night of last week. The 34-21 score in favor of the Eagles gave them five wins for the season with their conference play to begin Friday night against the Van Horn Eagles in that city.

Sanderson's first conference foe, the Van Horn Eagles, has won this year over Wink 37-0, over Fabens 63-0, losing to Alpine 41-20, tying Eunice 20-20, and winning over Marfa by 20-17 last Friday night. This is their only mutual foe and Sanderson edged out Marfa 14-13, previously winning over Imperial 22-6, 22-0 over Grandfalls, and then an impressive win over Balmorhea 73-0, followed by the win over Bracketville.

Steve Litton opened the scoring in the game when he caught a pass thrown by halfback Bill Littleton. Litton is an end. The try for the extra point failed.

Sanderson's second and third TDs were in the second period one by Manuel Olivas, full-back, and the other by Littleton. Quarterback James Druse threw to Littleton to score two extra points after the touchdown scored by Olivas.

Sanderson had a 20-13 lead when they broke up for the half and Bracketville's scores were one in each of the first two periods, the first by Johnny Castro and Paulie Lopez made the second. Alfredo Hernandez kicked an extra point after the first TD and the conversion was no good after the second by the Tigers.

In the third frame Druse hit Littleton for a scoring pass and Olivas ran into the end zone for the second third-period score which was the insurance TD for Sanderson. The try for the extra point following the first touchdown of the third period was no good, but Druse passed to Littleton for the two points bonus following the final Eagle tally.

Olivas had his best offensive night of the season, according

to Coach Willie Myers. He led the Eagle offense with 152 yards in 30 carries, making 20 points toward the total 34.

Sanderson had six turnovers in offensive play, having two passes intercepted and losing the ball four times on fumbles. The Bracketville team had no turnovers in their offensive game.

James Druse, Eagle quarterback, was on the front end of all of the scoring passes, completing four of seven for 73 yards. Bracketville's passes were four of 14 complete for 25 yards.

Sanderson made 246 yards rushing against 119 for Bracketville, and led in first downs by 14-9.

Sanderson made the first TD but failed on the point-after try. The Tiger TD was followed by a successful kick for the PAT causing the Eagles to have to come from behind. Two successive scores in the second period by the Eagles, while the defense held the Tigers scoreless, gave the Eagles a 20-13 lead at half-time. They were able to outscore the Tigers 2-1 in the third frame to gain the 13-point margin of victory.

Coach Myers used all 20 of the Eagle varsity squad in the game.

The B-team lost their game against the Iraan B-Braves here last Thursday by 20-6. Bob Murrah threw the touchdown pass to Bill Mott. All of the B-team Eagles saw action in the game against Iraan.

The mother got over her rubella in three days. Unfortunately, her unborn child didn't.



To pregnant mothers, rubella (German measles) means a few days in bed, a sore throat, a runny nose, temperature, and a rash.

But if they're in their first month when they catch it, there's a 40% chance that to their unborn babies it can mean deafness, or a heart condition, or brain damage, or cataracts which cause at least partial blindness.

Only last year, an immunization against rubella became available. But when a pregnant mother gets immunized, the prevention may be as harmful to her baby as the disease.

So if unborn babies are going to be protected, it will have to be by inoculating the kids who infect the mothers who in turn infect the fetuses.

And it will have to be done now. You see, rubella epidemics break out every six to nine years. The last outbreak was in 1964. Which means the next one is due any day now.

In the last epidemic, 20,000 babies were deprived of a normal childhood — and 30,000 more deprived of any childhood at all — because no immunization existed.

It would be unforgivable if the same thing happened again because an immunization existed and nobody used it.

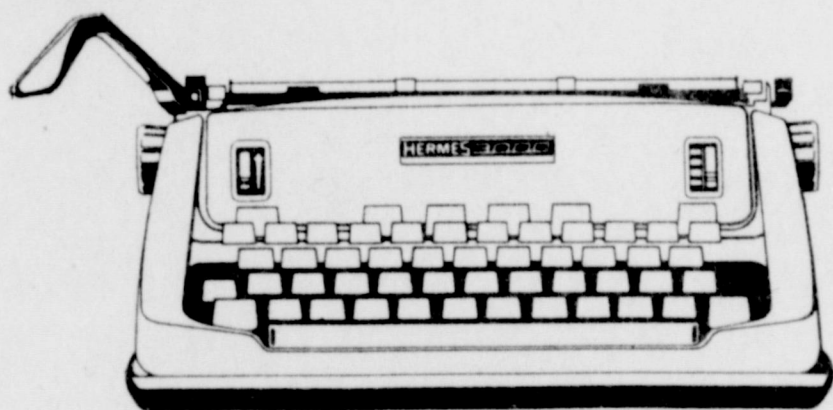

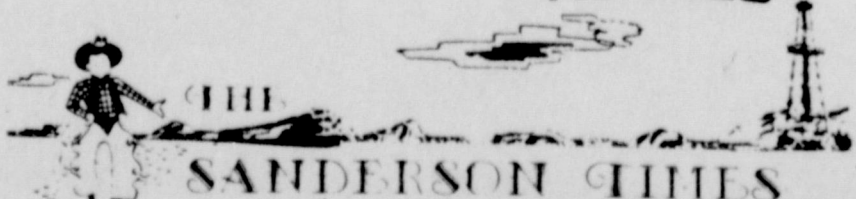
