

## One Killed In Lozier Wreck

One man was killed and four were injured in a one-car accident on the west end of the Lozier Canyon Bridge early Saturday morning. The victim was Sixto Amdazola, 46, and the injured were his wife and three children, all of Fresno, Calif.

The victim was pronounced dead at the scene by Dr. A. N. Clanton, Terrell County Health Officer, and the injured were taken to the Brewster County Memorial Hospital in Alpine. Geeslin Funeral Home in Alpine handled the arrangements for Arr dazola.

According to Terrell County Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, who investigated the accident, the car collided with the west end of the bridge at Lozier Canyon at about the right front wheel of the vehicle.

## Body Found In Rio Grande Friday

A male body was found in the Rio Grande River Friday morning by a Temple man who was making the trip down the river from Stillwell Crossing to Langtry. The body was on the John Harrison ranch, south of Dryden, according to Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey.

A Border Patrol plane from Marfa went to the scene Saturday morning to confirm the find and a group went to retrieve the body from the river. Death by drowning was ruled by Peace Justice W. G. Shoe-

maker. According to information received there was no identifica tion on the body and fingerprints were impossible to obtain, making identification of the body impossible since the body had been in the river for several days.

## Doe Permits Issue Set For Nov. 3

Antlerless deer permits will be issued to the eligible ranchers and landowners in Terrell County at the courthouse on

November 3. To be eligible for permits, the ranch must have a surplus of doe deer as determined by the Parks and Wildlife Depart-

Those ranchers or landowners who wish to have someone else obtain their permits for them, must give that person written authorization to draw the permits. This authorization must be signed by the rancher or landowner and be presented to the issuing officer at the time the permits are drawn.

## **Balloting For General Election** To Be Tuesday

Balloting in the general election will be on Tuesday, Nov. 3. Besides the candidates that are nominees from the farious political parties, there will be seven constitutional amendments for Texans to consider.

There has been a state-wide appeal to the eligible voters to get them to go to the polls on Tuesday to express their choice in the candidates on the ballot. The apathy of the voters has been given as one of the reasons for the apparent decline in many facets of our nation's life and it is hoped that the interest will be manifested by the majority of the qualified electorate.

here Friday night. In their first offensive series, the Braves miscued on a lateral which was picked up by Bill Littleton on the Iraan 21-yard line. The Eagles pushed to the 5-yard line from where Halfback Leslie Hall ran over. He kicked the extra point following the TD.

In the same period Iraan was in a punt formation and the snap from center was over the head of the punter and Jim Cash recovered the ball on the Iraan 20 to end the first quarter. On the first play from scrimmage in the second period, Quarterback James Druse carried over for six points and the point-after try failed. Very shortly after the ensuing kickoff, Druse and Cash teamed up to recover another bad pass from the Iraan center to the punter, giving the Eagles the ball on the Iraan 1-yard line from where Fullback Manuel Olivas scored. He caught a pass from Druse to add two points and the final scoring of the Eagles.

The last half of the game was

scoreless. Statistics showed Sanderson trailed in first downs 9-10, leading in yards rushing 152 -119, and total yards gained 155-139. The Eagles were able to complete only 1 pass of 12 tries and it was for only three yards, while the Braves completed 4 of 18 for 20 yards. Sanderson had one pass intercepted and Iraan had three. Sanderson punted nine times and Hall had an average of 32 yards per punt. The Braves punted six times for a 35-yard average. There were 20 turnovers in the game.

Mrs. Grigsby will sponsor the local group again this year for 7th and 8th grade students.


WM. E. COTERMARSH, 83, BURIED IN EL PASO TUESDAY





By subject, the proposed amendments relate to: 1)censure and removal of judges;2) authority for mixed beverage law;3)assessment of farm, ranch and forest lands;4) reconstitute State Building Commission;5)county road bonds and assessed valuation;6) increase value of homestead exemption from forced sale;and 7)authority to consolidate functions of government.

Texas has a record 4,150,645 registered voters this year. Normally, absentee voting accounts for approximately 5% of the total vote turnout.

Dr. George M. Leiby of El Paso, who recently conducted the TB Survey and chest clinic in Fort Stockton, discussed TB along the border in the Trans-Pecos area. He stated that medication has changed the approach of treatment and that length of stay in the hospital can br shortened to about six weeks. Once a person is on medication the possibility of infecting another person is remote. When a patient shows response to medication, he is sent home.

The TB surveys' prime target is to trace household contacts in order to treat new cases. The most important aspect in the survey is to minimize contact from infected persons.
