AREA COUNT IS OVER 24,000

Bale Count Tops 10,000 In Friona; Peak Reached

Over 10,000 bales of cotton had been brought in to the three Friona gins as of 5 p.m. Tuesday, and 10 gins in the Friona area reportedly had weighed in a total of 24,595 bales.

The three Friona gins (Chester-Fleming, Country Club and Friona Farmers Gins) had weighed in a total of 10,097 bales when they were contacted at 5 p.m. Tuesday.

Seven other gins in the Friona area (all gins in the "eastern half of Parmer County) added 14,498 bales to the total. Four gins in the Lazbuddie area had

weighed in 6,938 bales.

The 10-gin average for bales received figured out at a little less than 2,500 bales per gin. Projecting that countywide probably means that around 35,000 bales have been harvested.

A harvest of around 40,000 bales had been predicted by Plains Cotton Growers for Parmer County's 1964 crop, so indications are that the figure will be achieved -- and then some. Somewhere less than 49,000 acres of cotton were planted in Parmer County this year.

Most farmers are figuring a yield of around a bale and one-half per acre, which is good considering the adversities which plagued the crop all year long. For the second year in a row, farmers had trouble getting a good "stand" of cotton due to inclement weather at planting time.

Then, too, the summer growing season was one of the driest in recent years. Much of the crop once again was late, but the late freezing date allowed the cotton to reach its full maturity.

With ideal harvest conditions the first of the week, the cotton harvest reached its peak in the

Friona area. Predication of colder weather and snow to come had farmers swamping the gins with packed trailers.

Mules Back As Chief Opponent For 1965

Coach Don Light has announced the Friona Chiefs' 1965 football schedule, which has one change from the past year.

Sudan, an opponent in football the last three years, asked to be dropped, and Muleshoe, one of Friona's older rivals missing on the 1964 schedule, was added in Sudan's place.

Muleshoe, which has been met by Friona in football at least 18 times, and as early as 1928, will come here for a game October 1. The last time the teams met, in 1963, found both teams fighting for the district title. Muleshoe won the game, 13-0, and went on to upset Denver City in a bi-district game.

The Mules moved into AAA classification the past year, and won only one game of the ten played.

Down at my old hometown of Muleshoe, they've had a big to-do about the statue which is proposed, which will honor the mule, that unsung hero which had an intricate part in the forming of our country.

Latest episode in the story has to do with the model for the statue, "Old Pete," which several people have classed as "too horsey."

A few weeks ago, Old Pete has his mug shot spread across front pages of many Texas daily newspapers, along with a story telling how the contributions to the Mule Memorial Association were coming along, and about the association's decision to build a fiberglass statue rather than a bronze one as was first planned.

Many people, according to Dallas News columnist Frank X. Tolbert, think Old Pete is entirely too refined to be chosen as the model for Muleshoe's monument to the mule.

To add fuel to the fire, Tolbert himself thinks Pete is just a bit too "bla-zey."

A story in this week's Bailey County Journal quotes the following from Tolbert's column:

"A number of letter writers seem to agree with this department that Old Pete, a horse-looking Muleshoe mule with rather small ears, isn't the right model for the proposed statue to the mule in the city of Muleshoe."

One of his letters read: "Tell the people of Muleshoe that I'll furnish them with a picture of a REAL mule for their statue."

Another Dallas resident, who called himself a "Mule Consultant," wrote to Tolbert the following: "I agree with Uncle Wren Smith of Zula Stockage that Old Pete ain't the best-looking mule I ever saw. Old Pete has got to be a snide (a handsome but worthless mule used for trading purposes) because he ain't a "tone mule."

"Surely the folks of Muleshoe will want to use the best-looking mule, a mule that looks like a mule, for their statue," the writer concluded.

So you see there's more to erecting a statue of a mule than meets the eye.

Basketball Games Set Here Saturday Night

The next basketball games for the Friona High School Chieftains and Squaws, originally scheduled here Friday with Muleshoe, has been rescheduled for Saturday night.

Two games will be played, with the Squaws facing the Mulettes at 7 p.m., followed by the Chieftain-Mule battle.

However, the last two games played here between the Chiefs and Mules were thrillers. Muleshoe won one game by three points and another by two.

The games will be the last for the teams until the Farwell tournament, which will be played on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, December 29-31 and January 2.

by the chapter in competition on the state level since 1950.

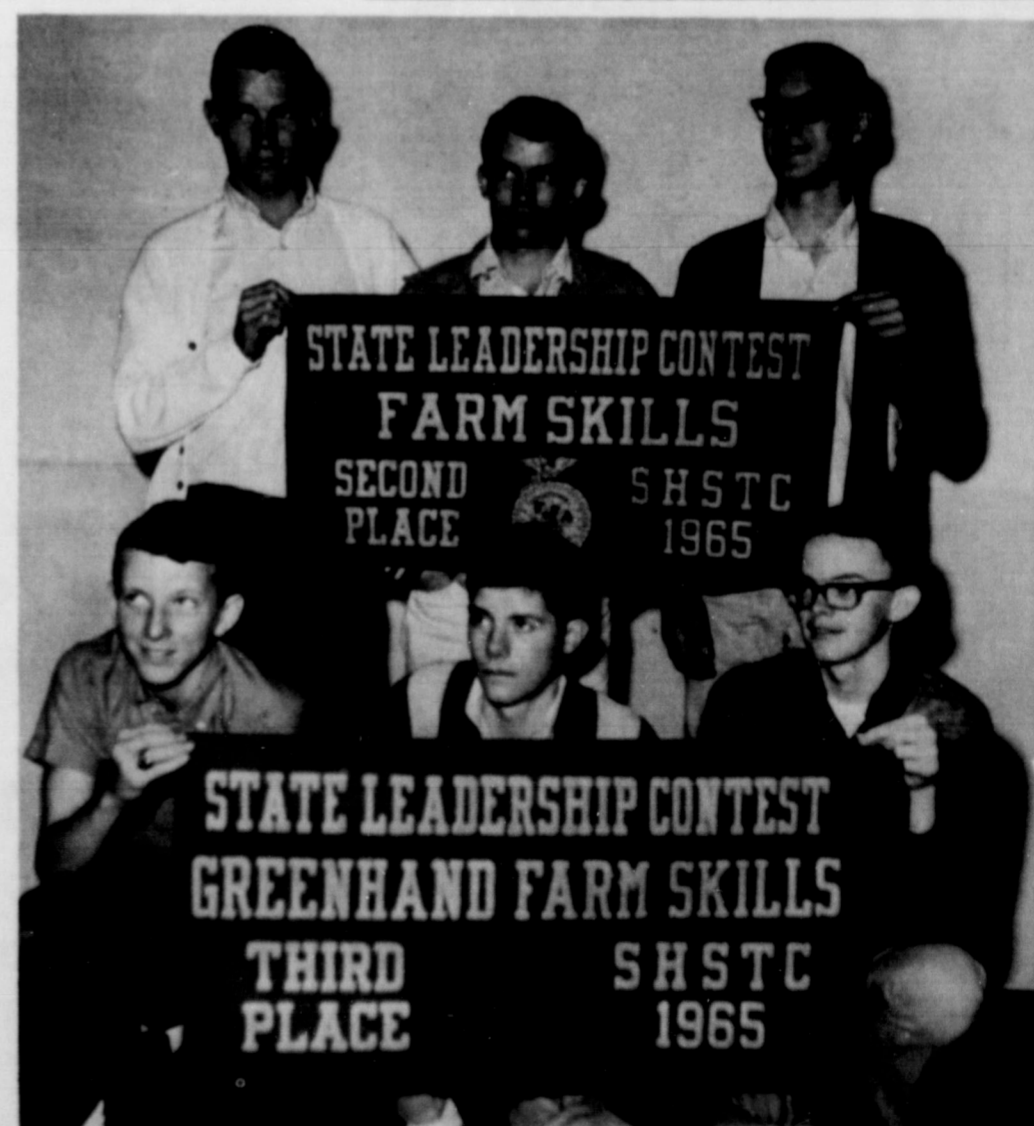

The board received a bid from a Panhandle firm on the job. No action was taken, as board members decided to look at various lighting systems in the area to get a better idea of

what they desired. Porter Roberts, school tax assessor - collector, reported that November's tax collections amounted to \$49,401.40, of which \$198.47 was delinquent. A new teacher for first grade, Sharon Britt of Chillicothe has been hired, Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr announced. She will begin teaching shortly after mid-term. She receives her B. S. degree at West Texas State at mid-term. Farr gave monthly reports to the board on the activity, transportation, cafeteria and general funds.

Eight Rural Accidents Tabulated In November

There were eight rural traffic accidents in Farmer County during the month of November, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, highway patrol supervisor of this area.

From these crashes resulted three persons injured and a loss of \$4,035 in property damage.

Summarizing rural traffic accidents from January through November of 1964, the picture shows 109 wrecks, 10 persons killed, 62 persons injured and \$98,569.00 in property damage, Wells says.

The most deadly month of the year is here again. The patrol supervisor stated that during each month of the past five years there was only one month higher than the month of December. Of the 12,171 persons killed during the last five years over 10 per cent of them were killed during the month of December.

Of the 1,246 persons killed in traffic accidents during the month of December over the past five years over 30 per cent were killed during the Christmas holidays. This means that the Christmas holidays are about three times as deadly as the remaining days during the

month of December. The month of December for 1963 was the most deadly month in the history of Texas. The sergeant appealed to every motorist and pedestrian, "Please do not let this become a reality again."

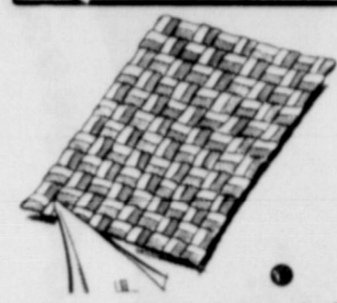

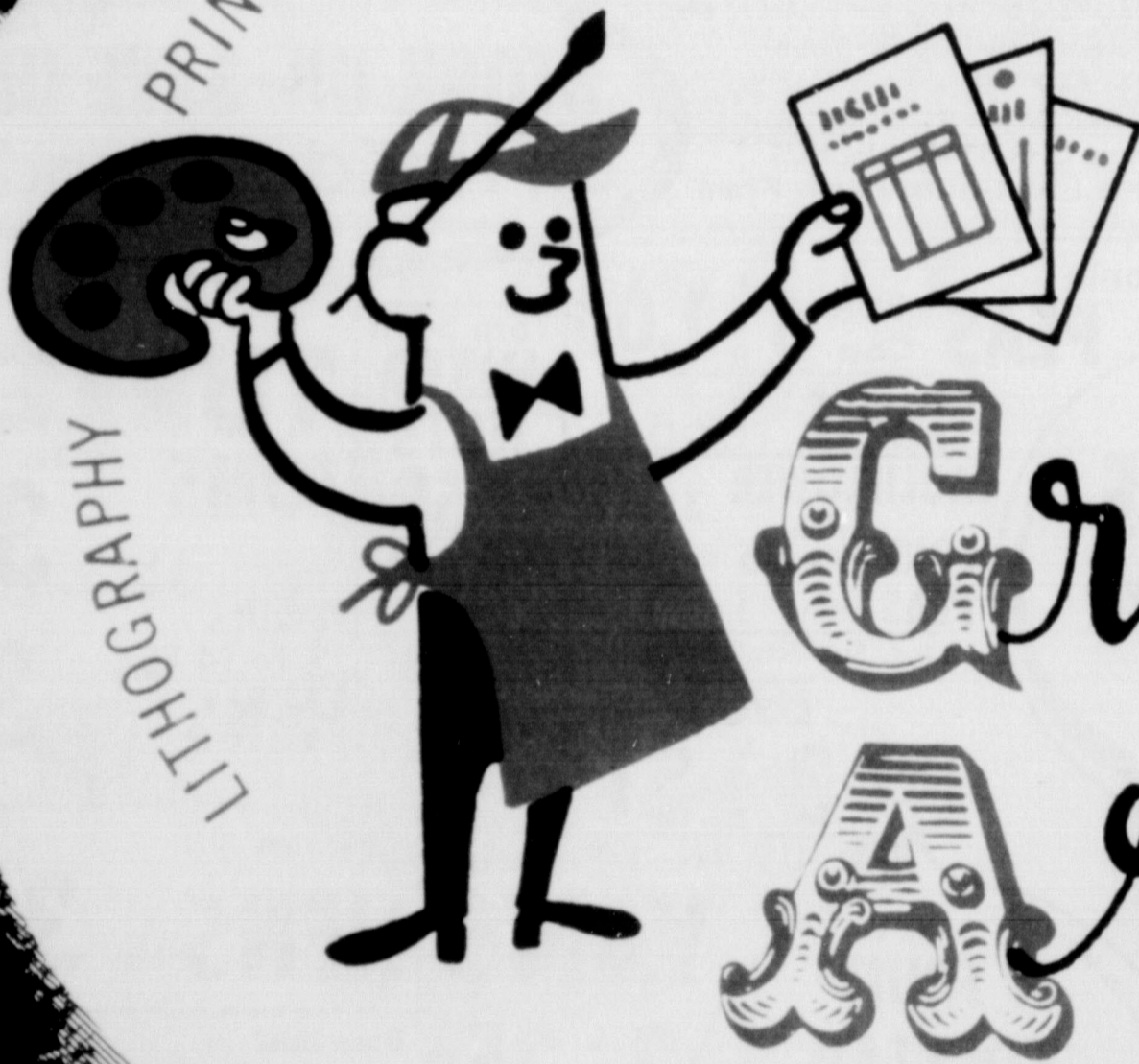

For the second weekend in a row, the Friona High School Chiefs brought home a trophy. The Chiefs took the consolation championship of the Happy tournament, and set a single-game scoring record in the process. In addition, Larry Buckley was named to the all-tournament team.

After falling to tournament champion Adrian in the opening round, 59-51 in an overtime game, the Chiefs came back the following day to wallop Happy's B team, 89-37, for what is believed to be the highest score ever recorded by a Chiefstain team. In the consolation finals, Friona soundly whipped Vega, 62-35.

The Chiefs played the entire tournament without two players who had been starting. Gene Weatherly, who had suffered from tonsillitis, missed the tourney, as did Travis Graves, who was a member of the FFA leadership team which competed in the state finals at Huntsville.

Despite their manpower shortage, the Chiefs fought a polished Adrian team off its feet before finally bowing in the overtime period. Besides the missing starters, two of Friona's players fouled out of the game, and three others had four fouls when the game ended.

Friona took an early lead of 4-0 on baskets by Ray Braxton. The Chiefs had six-point leads twice, at 7-1 and 9-3, but the Matadors stormed back to tie the count at 12-all at the end of the period.

Adrian took advantage of Friona's coldness to vault into a seven point lead midway of the

second quarter, at 23-16 and again at 25-18. However, Larry Buckley engineered a rally which kept the Chiefs from being run out of the gymnasium and actually got the lead back for Friona. Buckley hit a jump shot and tipped in a follow-up shot to cut the Adrian margin to 25-20, and with 45 seconds left in the half he made good a lay-up shot, was fouled and completed the three-point play to bring Friona a 28-27 half-time lead.

Adrian took a three-point lead before Friona could score in the second half, but the Chiefs rallied for a three-point lead of their own. Clutch free throw shooting by Milner and Braxton kept the Chiefstains in the lead. Adrian cut a four-point Chiefstain margin to two with a basket just before the quarter ended. Friona led, 41-39.

The Matadors again forged ahead, 43-41, but Buckley's two free shots tied it and Friona was either ahead or tied the rest of the way until the final minute. Free shots built a four-point bulge for the Chiefs at 47-43, but Friona's efforts to slow down for only good shots didn't materialize, and Adrian tied it at 47-all with 2:07 left.

Adrian went ahead at 49-47, but Buckley's lay-up tied the score. The Matadors made it 51-49 with 30 seconds left, and Friona appeared doomed. However, the Chiefs got possession in the last 15 seconds, and raced downtown, where Braxton's 15-foot set shot ripped the cords just ahead of the buzzer, tying it at 51-all.

The eventual tournament champs poured on the steam,

however, and scored eight points in the overtime while Friona failed to dent the scoreboard.

Everyone saw plenty of action against Happy's B-team. Proving this fact, Bobby Jordan, (Continued on page 2)

Squaws Rebound; Capture Happy Tournament Crown

Rebounding after having to settle for third place in the West Texas State tournament

the preceding week, the Friona High School Squaws swept through three games to take the championship of the Happy Invitational tournament last weekend.

The Squaws didn't, however, have a walk-away in winning the Happy meet. They breezed to an easy 59-33 win over Adrian in the opener, then had to fight for a 48-45 win over Vega to reach the finals.

Against the host team in the finals, Friona had less trouble than they often have had in beating a Happy team, taking

60-42 win in the finals.

Forward Linda Jo Davis, coming up with her most consistent scoring of the season, was named the outstanding player of the girls' division of the tournament, and two other Squaws, forward Teto Jennings and guard Glenda McClellan, were named to the all-tournament team.

Miss Davis scored 61 points in the three games including 15 of 15 free shots. She and Miss Jennings, the other returning starter at forward, did most of Friona's scoring. Teto scored 57 points in the tournament.

Against Adrian, Jennings and Davis scored eight points apiece in the opening quarter as Friona jumped out front, 17-8. Jennings added 12 to her total in the second quarter, and it was 33-20, Friona at the half.

Jennings picked up her fifth personal foul in the third quarter, having already scored 22 points, but by the time the quarter was over, Friona had a 50-25 lead and reserves took over anyway.

Vega gave the team its toughest time in the tourney. Friona took a 16-13 lead after the first quarter, but Vega outscored the state champs 12-11 in the second quarter to trim Friona's half-time lead to 27-25.

Vega again topped the Squaws by a point in the third quarter, and trailed by just one, 40-39, going into the final period. Friona built up a small lead and a stall successfully, with Davis getting four of four free throws, and Jennings two of two as the Squaws hung on for a 48-45 win to reach the finals. At last-second basket by Vega trimmed the final margin.

In the tournament finals Saturday night, the Squaws played steady basketball to sack up the championship. They got off and running to a 14-10 first quarter lead and increased that to 32-20 by halftime.

Going into the final quarter, Friona had increased its lead to 15 points, 43-28, and although reserves played much of the final part of the game the Squaws were still increasing their lead, winning going away.

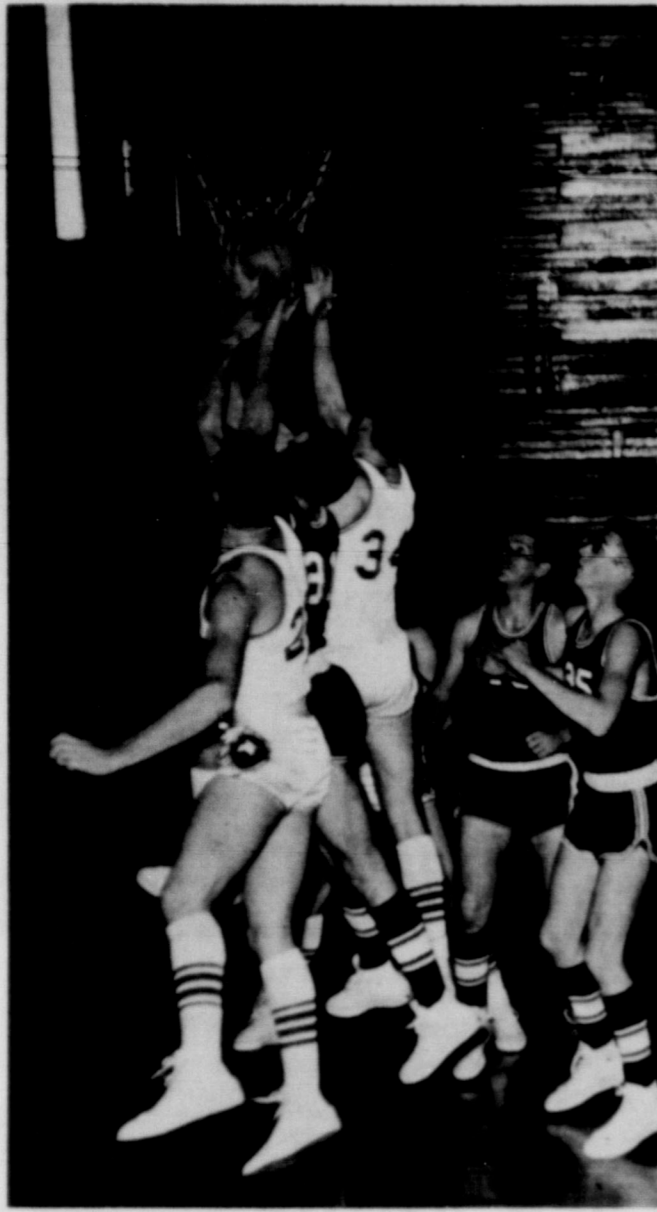

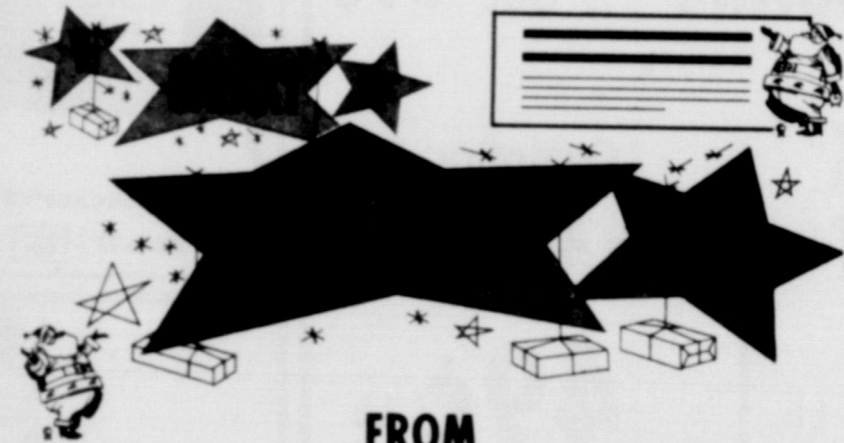

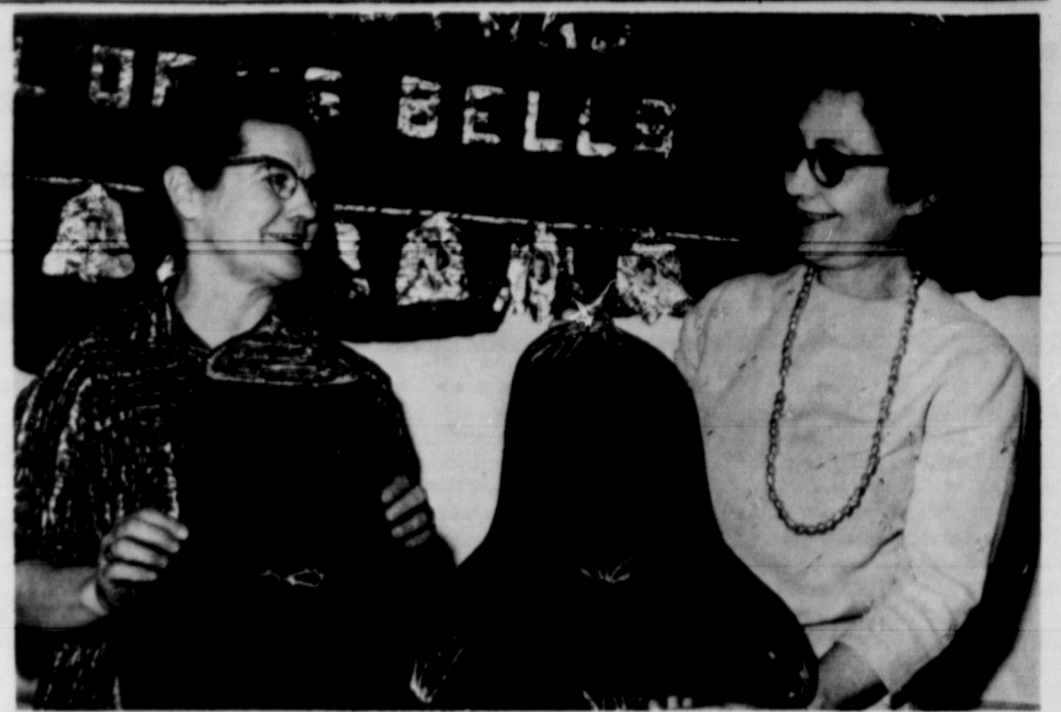

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On The Farm In Parmer County

TREES, SHRUBS FOR WINDBREAKS

Some 17 species of trees or shrubs will be available for planting by Texas landowners, early in 1965, from the Texas Forest Service at a delivered cost of \$1.50 per hundred plus the 2 per cent sales tax.

The trees and shrubs may be used for windbreaks, soil stabilization and Christmas tree plantings but cannot be used or resold for shade or ornamental purposes. All seedling orders will be packed in moss and moisture proof paper and shipped prepaid direct to the purchaser.

Orders for species shown on the application must be in multiples of 50.

This is a real bargain for those of you who need something to slow the wind down around your place. Application forms can be obtained thru the County Agent's office. Orders to the Texas Forest Service must be received before February 12, 1965.

MACHINE STORAGE

Whether you own a two-horsepower lawnmower or a 20-foot combine, a good job of preparing the machine for storage will pay off in longer service and lower repair bills.

Protecting the machine in a building is just a small part of good winter storage. Other things need to be done, but we usually say to ourselves they are too much trouble or we overlook the importance. You need to make sure it won't rust or deteriorate while it sits idle.

No matter what kind of a machine you store there are three things you need to do to get it ready for storage: Clean it. Lubricate it. And eliminate any stress on parts.

We suggest removing trash, lint, dirt and dried grease either by washing the machine with kerosene and rinsing it with water or by steam cleaning.

The machine should be lubricated and then run a few minutes. Chains and adjustment bolts should be coated with a rust preventive oil.

There are eight steps for preparing a motor for storage:

1. Clean the air cleaner and fill the oil cup to the proper level with new oil.
2. Change the oil and oil filter; then idle the engine for 15 min.
3. Add permanent anti-freeze or drain the radiator and engine block. If you drain the motor, leave the radiator cap loose and the drains open

to let condensation drain. We also suggest putting a tag on the machine that says, "Don't use. Cooling system drained."

4. Drain the gas tank to avoid buildup of gum and residue in the fuel line and carburetor jets and passages. Flush diesel tanks with a diesel flushing oil and white kerosene. All fuel tanks except LP Gas should be left empty during storage.

5. Put two tablespoons of oil through the spark plug openings. With the plugs removed crank the engine several revolutions to coat the combustion chambers with oil. Then replace the plugs.

6. Seal the exhaust, air cleaner intake and crankcase breather with tape to prevent the entrance of foreign matter or moisture.

7. If the motor has a clutch, depress the pedal and fasten it to keep the flywheel from sticking to the clutch plate.

8. Store the battery in a cool dry place. Do not place it on a concrete floor because cold tends to make it discharge faster.

Weather and strain hurt rubber parts. If the machine is stored in a building, release tension on belts and block up the machine to take weight off of the tires. If it is stored outside, remove all belts and place them in a cool, dry place. Although few people do it, you should remove and store tires of heavy machines that are left outside.

The last step is to make a list of needed repair parts and order them during the winter.

FARMERS TAX GUIDES

The 1965 edition of the Farmers Tax Guides are now available. These guides contain the new rates and provisions of the income tax law that applies to farmers.

There are several new provisions of the law this year. In seeking to use the best management possible to increase net farm income after taxes are paid, farmers should get a new guide and do some quick figuring to see where they stand before this year closes out.

Copies of the Farmers Tax Guide are available at the Agent's office and at the ASCS office in Farwell. The SCS office in Friona also has copies available to the public. Any one that would like to receive a copy of the guide in the mail can let the county agent's office know and we will be glad to mail you a copy.



At Home In Parmer County

The holiday season is drawing near and homemakers are planning now and getting ready for the holiday season with great zeal.

Fruit cakes are already in freezers waiting till the big day. There are some who have not prepared their fruit cakes and for those who like the candied pineapple for fruit cakes, here is the way to candy your own pineapple.

Three Day Candied Pineapple

- 1 Can (1lb. 4 oz.) sliced pineapple
- 1/2 box confectioners sugar (approx.)
- 1 3/4 cups granulated sugar

FIRST DAY:
Drain pineapple in colander for 10 minutes. Sprinkle half the granulated sugar in a large skillet. Arrange the pineapple slices on the sugar in a single layer. Sprinkle the remaining sugar over the slices. Let stand for 24 hours at room temperature.

SECOND DAY:

Bring the sugared fruit to a boil. Cook, at a boil, for 5 minutes. Lower heat and cook on simmer 15 minutes. Turn over the pineapple slices occasionally, watching carefully to make sure they don't scorch. Let stand until the following day.

THIRD DAY:

Pat side and edges of each slice in sifted confectioners sugar to make a thick coating. Let slices stand on a wire rack for 24 hours. A crusty glaze will form. Store in a loosely covered container. If slices

become moist, re-roll in confectioners sugar. Yield: 10 slices candied pineapple.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

How do you remove candle wax and grease?

ANSWER:

Soften with dry cleaning fluid if necessary. Sponge on dry cleaning fluid, working from outside toward center of soil, blot up. Sponge on detergent and blot. Repeat if necessary.
