Voter Registration Ends January 31

Mrs. A. J. Hahn, deputy tax assessor-collector, reminds citizens of Terrell County that voter registration deadline is January 31. Only 488 voters had registered by Monday and the normal voting strength of the county is around 700.

This year all 18, 19, 20year-olds are eligible to register. Also those who will be 18 before March 1, 1972, may register. All 18-21-year-olds are eligible to vote in federal elections. This happens to be an "off year" but there is always the possibility of a special election to fill a vacancy and there is a school board and water board election set for the voters who register before January 31.

Mrs. Hahn has also advised local residents that her office is closed on Saturdays and registrations in person will have to be made not later than Friday. Registrations bearing a postmark of not later than January 31 will be accepted, she said.

Funeral services were Tuesday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock with Rev. E. H. Carson, pastor, in charge of the services in the First Baptist Church here and the Geeslin Funeral Home of Alpine directing arrangements for burial in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

Miss Mansfield was born on December 13, 1922, in Sanderson, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Mansfield. She had been a life-long resident of Sanderson and was a member of the Baptist Church and Woodmen of the World.

Survivors include three sisters, Mrs. Frazier, Mrs. J. W. Hooten of Del Rio, and Mrs. F. E. Cauttrell of Andrews; three brothers, Francis Mansfield and J. A. Mansfield of Sanderson, and Henry Mansfield of Tyler.


We have had some more response to the plea for pictures, but if you had planned to bring some down to us, don't delay, please, we will keep them, and while you have them ready is the best time to bring them in.



The Balmorhea junior high school girls were in Sanderson Monday night for games and the Little Eagles won both tilts.


